From the French Camp before Nice, Decemb. 2. N. S.

**W**E have not yet raised our Batteries against the Castle of Nice, that work having been delayed by the ill Weather; nor can we expect they can be in a readiness to play upon the besieged before a week or 10 days hence. The Besieged fire very warmly upon us with their Cannon; and we have had several Men killed, and a Colonel with divers others wounded.

*Vienna, Dec. 4.* An Express passed lately through this City, going to Vienna, with the welcome News of the Surrender of Barcelona, and the further Progress of the Confederate Troops in Catalonia. The hopes of the French Armies in Lombardy continue in the same Posts; and, according to our Letters from Trent, a great Number of Recruits passed lately through that Place, in order to join the Imperial Army. Our last Advices from Constantinople say, That all Things continued very quiet there since the suppressing of the last Conspiracy; and that the Ottoman Porte does still appear entirely well disposed to maintain the Peace concluded at Carlowitz, with the Emperor, and the other Powers concerned in the late War between the two Empires.

*Vienna, Dec. 6.* General Sarsenberg, who lately came from Piedmont, has passed through this City, in his way to Vienna. There are daily marching through this Place Recruits and other Reinforcements for the Imperial Army in Italy.

*Ratisbon, Dec. 10.* Colonel de Went has possessed himself of Burghausen, one of the Towns which the Bavarians, who lately took up Arms against the Emperor, had surpris'd; and we hear this day, that the Emperor have made some Proposals for laying down their Arms, and submitting to his Imperial Majesty. Five Regiments of the Imperial Troops, which were to be employ'd in the suppressing of this Insurrection, are advanced to Donawert and Ingolstadt, where they are to pass the Danube; and they are followed by the rest of the Troops which are appointed for this Service with all possible Expedition; so that we hope these Troubles will in a very short time be entirely compos'd.

*Dresden, Dec. 12.* We have an Account from Lulaua, That the Body of Swedish Forces which lay encamped at Meseritz, is separated and gone into Quarters; and that General Renchild, who commanded it, is oblig'd to wait upon the King of Sweden at Pommern. The Saxon Army, which was encamped near Guben, is also marched into Winter Quarters; and the necessary Or-

ders are now giving out for Recruiting and Augmenting our Forces against the next Campaign.

*Falmouth, Dec. 13.* On the 11th Instant came in the Poplar Frigate, John Penington Commander, of London, from Barcelona, who parted with 5 Sail more 10 days ago in bad Weather. Yesterday put in here by contrary Winds the Admiralty Galley for Leghorn, and the King William Packet from the West-Indies, who both came out of Plymouth the 11th Instant. This day arrived here the Alliance Packet-Boat from Lisbon, Captain Green Commander, having been 8 days in her Passage. Just now arrived here the John Pink Store-Ship, Henry Arthur Master, from Newfoundland; who came from thence in the Company of 48 Sail of Merchant-Ships, most of them bound for Lisbon.

*Dartmouth, Dec. 15.* On the 10th Instant came in here the Exeter Merchant, Captain Walter Prideux Commander; The 13th came in the Thomas and John of London, Captain John Ayrs Commander; And the next day the Nicholas of London, Robert Newman Commander; being all Transport-Ships, homeward bound from Barcelona. On the 12th arrived here the Sarah of Poole, Samuel White Commander, homeward bound from Newfoundland. This day came into our Port the John of Limericke, Anthony Apps Master, laden with Salmon, Beef and Butter, from thence.

*Plymouth, Dec. 16.* On the 12th Instant came in here the St. Peter, Young Tobias, and the Archelaus of Stockholme, for Bourdeaux; the Merry Frigate, of and for London, Thomas Pook Master, from Newfoundland; and the William and Mary Tender, and Crown and Scepter, from Barcelona. Yesterday sail'd to the Eastward the Warwick, Smirna-Factor, and the William and Mary Tender. Last night arrived here the Mary and Ann of London, from Barcelona, laden with Fruit.

*Bristol, Dec. 17.* Yesterday came in here the Charles-Galley, Edward Boid Commander, being one of the Jamaica Fleet, which was put into New England. The same day came in Her Majesty's Ship the Guernsey, the London-Bridge, the Margaret-Galley, the Dorset-Brigantine, and the Johnson-Frigate: They all parted from Boston in New England on the 18th of September last. On the 15th at night came in the Swallow Dogger of this Place from Newfoundland. This day came in the Mary of this Place, and the Adventure, both in 4 weeks from Newfoundland. On the 14th Instant came in here the Isabella from Cork, but last from Milford; and the Robert from Londonderry.

*Cowes, Decemb. 15.* On the 12th Instant Her Majesty's Ship the Loo, homeward bound from Newfoundland, coming in at the Needles, unfortunately run ashore: The Men were saved; and the Ship, notwithstanding the great Seas which the stormy Weather had raised, sits upright; and it's hoped she may be got off.
