"All that part of the parish of Long Ashton (coloured pink on the map annexed hereto) lying to the west of an imaginary line commencing at a point on the boundary between the parishes of Long Ashton and Barrow Gurney in the middle of The Wild Country Lane opposite the southeastern corner of Close No. 212 on the map, proceeding thence northwards along the middle of The Wild Country Lane, north-eastwards along the middle of the main Bristol—Weston-super-Mare Road (A.370), thence north-westwards along the middle of Warren Lane to the south-eastern boundary of Close No. 70 and generally north-wards along the western boundaries of Closes Nos. 70, 40A and 40 to the northern boundary of Close No. 30 westwards along the last mentioned No. 39, westwards along the last-mentioned boundary, northwards along the eastern boundary of Close No. 38A and westwards along the northern boundary of the last-mentioned Close and the southern boundary of Close No. 31 to the boundary which divides the parishes of Long Ashton and Wraxall."

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, and the Union of Professional Reorganisation (1922).

and the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Reverend Tom, Bishop of Hereford (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme), for effecting the union of the benefice of Holme Lacy and the benefice of Dyndor, both situate in the diocese of Hereford.

- "1. Union of Benefices. The benefice of Holme Lacy and the benefice of Dyndor shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'the United Benefice of Holme Lacy with Dyndor' but the parishes of the said benefices shall continue in all respects distinct.
- "2. Taking effect of union. Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the London Gazette the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend Edward Frederick Holwell Dunnicliff; it he is then incumbent of the said benefices of Holme Lacy and Dyndor, shall, with his consent (testified by his signature hereto) be the first incumbent of the united benefice and his admission thereto shall be without any form of, or fee for, presentation or nomination and he shall not be required to pay any fees in respect of his collation, institution, licence or induction to the united benefice beyond such fees or induction to the united benefice beyond such fees as he would have been liable to pay if his admission to the united benefice had been an admission solely to that one of the said two benefices for the holding

of which in plurality with the other a Dispensation was heretofore granted to him.

"3. Parsonage House. Without prejudice to the exercise of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, upon the union taking effect and pending the provision of a new house approved by us as suitable to be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice, of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice, the parsonage house at present belonging to the benefice of Dyndor shall, if at that date it so belongs to the said benefice, be the house of residence of the incumbent of the united benefice.

"4. Patronage. After the union has taken effect the right of presentation to the united benefice shall be exercised by the patrons of the two benefices alternately the patron of the benefice of Holms.

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the New Parishes Measure, 1943, have prepared and humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme for (1) constituting a new parish to be taken out of the parish of Allesley and (2) altering the boundaries of the parishes of Allesley and Saint George, Coventry, both of which parishes are situate in the diocese of Coventry.

"Whereas we, the Church Commissioners, are satisfied (1) that the spiritual interests of the area defined in Part I of the subjoined Schedule and delineated on the map hereto annexed would be best served by constituting it a new parish and that a suitable endowment thereof will be provided: and (2) that it is desirable that the boundaries of the parishes of Allesley and Saint George, Coventry, should be altered in the manner described in Part II of the said Schedule and delineated on the said map:

"And whereas we have not approved any consecrated church within the said area as suitable to be the parish church of the new parish:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Cuthbert, Bishop of Coventry (in testimony whereof he has set his hand and affixed his episcopal seal to this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, do humbly recommend and propose as follows, that is to say:

## "1. Constitution of New District

"(a) As from the date of the licence thereto of a Minister the area defined in Part I of the sub-joined Schedule and delineated on the map hereto annexed shall be a separate district for spiritual purposes.

"(b) As from the date of the consecration of a church within the said area approved by us, the said Church Commissioners, as suitable to be a parish church, or if the church is consecrated before such approval, the date of the approval, the said area shall become a new parish.

"(c) The name of the district (or parish as the case may be) shall be 'The District (or Parish) of Allesley Park'.

"(d) The district (or parish) shall be in the Archdeaconry of Coventry and in the rural deanery of Kenilworth.
