Venice, Jan. 23. N.S. Prince Eugene set out from Carzago the 24th past for Vienna, having left General Raventlau to command the Imperial Army in his Absence.

The German Forces in the Veronesi have of late been considerably reinforced. The Po has again overflowed its Banks, and done very great Damage to the neighbouring Country.

Dantzick, January 30. Our last Advices from Poland say, That the King of Sweden having passed the Bug with his Army on the 18th Instant, marched that day to Popolavia, near Branski; and that he was since advanced within 4 Leagues of Tikozy: Upon Notice whereof the Muscovite Forces were preparing to leave that Place, and to march to Grodno, where the King of Poland was assembling his Army. They write from Courland, That the Magazine of the Dunamunder Fort near Riga was lately blown up by Accident, and 300 of the Swedish Garison there were buried under its Ruines; and that General Bawer, who commands the Muscovite Forces on that side, was marched from Mittau with a Body of 4 or 5000 Men, in order, as was supposed, to lay hold of this Opportunity to seize that Castle.

Vienna, Jan. 30. Prince Eugene is frequently in Conference with the Ministers of this Court, in order to concert Measures for the effectual carrying on of the War in Italy; for which purpose his Army will be very considerably reinforced. We have an Account from Hungary, That a Body of Imperial Troops had obliged the Malecontents who were before Trenschein to raise that Siege, having forced their Intrenchments, killed many of them, and taken several Prisoners. We hear also, that General Herbeville having entirely driven the Malecontents out of Transilvania, and refreshed his Troops in that Principality, is now on his March back again to Hungary, where his Arrival will soon put a stop to any Progresses the Malecontents might make on that side: But it is hoped, that the Posture of their Affairs on one hand, and on the other his Imperial Majesty's Clemency, and the Declaration which is to be sent them from hence by Count Rechteren, will encline them to take such Resolutions in their Assembly at Miskortz, as may put an end to those unhappy Troubles, and restore the Peace and Tranquility of their Native Country.

Berlin, January 30. The Differences between the Elector of Hanover and the Duke of Wolfembutte, concerning that Duke's Pretensions upon the Country of Saxe-Lawembourg, are now ended, by an Agreement lately concluded, by which the Duke, in Consideration of a certain Sum of Money to be paid him by his Electoral Highness, desists from those Pretensions. Upon the late Motions of the Forces on both sides in Poland, our Court has thought fit to send a Reinforcement of about 4000 Men to their Troops in Prussia, for the better securing of those Frontiers, and maintaining our Neutrality between the several contending Parties. Our Officers are raising Men with all possible Expedition, in order both to recruit and augment our Troops.

Francfort, Febr. 7. The Diet of the Circle of the Upper Rhine continues assembled here, to settle several Matters in order to the bringing their Quota of Troops early into the Field the next Campaign. The Garison of Fort Louis being still very closely blocked up by our Forces, is in great Distress for want of Provisions, Fuel, and other Necessaries, and we hope will shortly be obliged to surrender. They write from Munich, That

4 Inhabitants of that Place had been put to Death, for being some of the chief Promoters of the Insurrection in Bavaria.

Paris, Febr. 6. Commissions are given out for the levying of several new Regiments; but, besides the want we are in of Money to support so great an Expence, Men are become so scarce, that we can hardly get a sufficient Number to recruit the Troops now on foot; and must therefore expect to find it very difficult to raise more Forces. Monsieur d'Ibberville, who formerly was Resident from this Court at Geneva, is going with the same Character to Genoa. The Duke of Vendosme is daily expected from Italy. There has been a Discourse, that we should open the next Campaign in that Country with the Siege of Turin; but it is now said, that Design is laid aside, our Forces not being in a Condition to attempt it. The Castle of Nice is demolishing, and our Forces, which have been employed in the Siege of that Place, are to continue there till it be entirely razed. Monsieur de Lapara is made Governor of the Country of Nice, and is to have his Residence at Villafranca.

Hague, Febr. 12. N. S. The States of Holland and Westfriland have been assembled these two days, to consider of the Means to raise what is yet wanting of their part of the necessary Supplies for carrying on the War the next Year. The Count de Lecheraine, Envoy from the Elector Palatine, and the Baron de Bothmar, Envoy from the Elector of Hanover, went both yesterday from hence for Dusseldorp. Letters from Flanders say, That the Marshal de Boufflers was viewing the French Garisons on those Frontiers, and would afterwards return to Lille. They write from France, That a Squadron of Men of War is fitting out at Toulon.

Falmouth, January 31. The 29th Instant arrived here the Prince Packet-Boat from Lisbon, having been 7 days in her Passage. Not long before she came away, an English Man of War and a Dutch Privateer carried into Lisbon as Prizes two Spanish Privateers of 18 Guns each.

Dartmouth, Febr. 1. Yesterday came into this Port the Dolphin, a Privateer of Middlebourg, of 26 Guns. This day came in the Hunter, a Privateer of Guernsey, Capt. Robinson Commander, of 6 Guns, and brought in with him as Prize a French Ship of 4 Guns, laden with Wine and Brandy from Nantz, which he had taken off of Alderney, bound for Dunkirk.

Cowes, Febr. 2. Yesterday came into our Road the London Galley, Captain Brown Commander, from Leghorn.

Bristol, Febr. 4. On the 2d Instant came in here the Marlborough Galley, William Freake Commander, in 23 days from Virginia. This day came in the Dragon Galley of this Place, George Hart Commander, from Zant, but lost from Gibraltar.

St. James's, February 6. This being Her Majesty's Birth-day, but happening to fall on Ash-Wednesday, it was observed yesterday, with great Solemnity. There was a very magnificent Appearance at Court of the Nobility and Gentry, where there was an Entertainment of Musick before Dinner, and a Play in the Evening. The great Guns of the Tower, and those of St. James's Park, were discharged: And in London and Westminster there were Bonfires, Illuminations, Ringing of Bells, and other Rejoycings suitable to the Occasion.
