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Falmouth, Nov.

**T**He 4th instant the wind coming fair, gave an opportunity to a Fleet of about 20 Merchants ships, that have been long confined by cross winds, to put out to sea, most of them intending for France, the rest for Bilbao.

This day came in the Eagle Ketch with several other vessels bound for Burdeaux to lade Wines, where they affirm the French are building divers ships and suddenly expect to be upon action.

Deptford, Nov. 18. On Monday last a large ship of about 530 Tuns, called the *Berkley-Castle* was launched at this place, the name upon the desire of the owners having been given by the Right Honourable the Lord *Berkley of Berkley*; his Lordship having likewise an interest in her, accompanied by several persons of Quality there present at the Ceremony; it being observed that this Noble Lord hath been always a lover of Merchants and an encourager of Trade.

*Craovie*, Octob. 26. The States of *Craovie* having by a new Patent Assembled themselves and made choice of some persons to be their Representatives in the greater Assembly; the said persons have been refused entrance into the Diet, as have been also excluded eight other Provinces whose Assemblies broke off before the Coronation without any agreement.

The Palatine of *Sandomir* having generously remitted the Government of *Krosna* into the Kings hands, an assignation was presently made according to a former Act of 30 thousand Liures a piece to the two Palatinates of *Kiois* and *Schernokovis*, but of which a distribution is to be made to such of the Nobles in the said Palatinates as were formerly damaged by the Rebellion of the Cossacks in the Province of *Ukrania*; Since this the Deputies of the Palatinates of *Braslavitz*, *Podolia* and *Volynie* have put in their claim for a re-employment of their Nobles out of some other vacancies whose example is like to be followed by the rest of the Provinces, whose importunities if complied with, will much prejudice His Majesties Sovereignty by taking out of his hands the Collation of all Charges and Governments till the States shall judge the suffering persons to be sufficiently recompensed.

His Majesty having taken into his consideration the many differences and animosities amongst the Nobles, which have put a stop to all proceedings relating to the publick, was pleased to employ several of the Senators to them, viz. the Bishop of *Biskop* and the Palatines of *Pesheria*, and *Traki* in his name, to invite them to Unity, and to consider the present ill condition of the affairs of the kingdom, which having not had those good effects which were desired, His Majesty yesterday called His Privy Council to consider of the present posture of affairs, wherein a proposal was made for the dissolution of the present Diet, and calling another to be held in February next.

The Count de *Lianze* is lately arrived here in the name of His most Christian King his Master, to Compliment His Majesty upon his Coronation, and to solicit for the nomination of the Bishop of *Beser* to the dignity of Cardinal.

*Genova*, Nov. 13 Two days since sailed hence the three men of war which *Signior Hippolito Centurione* engaged in the service of His most Christian Majesty. Here is now upon the departure the *Mary of Fowey* with part of her lading of Pilchards intending for *Legorn*.

*Signior Pallavicino's* Daughter may in few days imbarke in order to her voyage for *Rome*, all things being adjusted which relate to her Marriage with the Popes Nephew, and 6 of this States Gallies appointed to attend her thither, the Popes being not yet returned after their return from the unsuccessful expedition to *Candia*.

Letters of the 8th instant from *Tunis* inform us of the arrival of the *Centurion*, with another Fregat of *Sir Tho. Allens* Squadron in that Bay, where they were civilly Treated by the Dey, who has declared his resolution of maintaining the peace with England according to former Articles, the people there desiring nothing more then to continue their Traffique and Commerce with the English without intersting themselves at all in the affairs of *Algier*.

They farther say that the Dey had declared war against the French, in prosecution whereof a French Sailia was lately brought in there as prize, and the people on board made slaves, upon which the French Consul made his application to the Dey, but was returned with a short answer; That he should if he please, inform the King his Master that he would have no peace with him.

From *Milan* we are advised, that the 28th past the Ecclesiastical Censures were publisht according to the Popes Order against *Signior Paolo Zaccaria* Provost of the Collegiate Church of *Stala*, for taking possession for his Catholick Majesty (whose Collector he is) of the Goods and Estates of the Religious houses lately suppressed: the Provost has for his security retired himself to the *Citradell*, where he intends to continue till some issue can be put to this affair, which tis hoped may admit of a composition by the endeavours of the Marquis *Ismbaldi*, who has received a Commission for that purpose.

We have here a confident report of a Treaty now on foot for a Marriage between the Duke of *Mantoua* and a Daughter to the deceased Duke *Francis d'Este*, and that several conferences had been held at *Viadana* by the Marquis *Canazza* and the Cardinal d'Este upon this subject, where also were made some proposals of another Marriage between a son of the Duke *Francis* and the Princess of *Guastalle*.

*Venice*, Nov. 16. Notwithstanding the peace lately made with the Ottoman Port; we are informed by a Caich from *Zara*, that the Turks either not knowing or pretending not to have there received due information of the Treaty, got together in a great body and made an incursion into that Province, but finding the Countrey in a posture of defence, with our Militia's in good readiness to oppose them, were forced after some small rencounters and losses to return without any considerable booty, and that the Morlachs had made a return of their visit by a more effectual inroad into the Ottoman Territories, from whence they brought away many Slaves and a booty of an hundred head of Cattle, but the Proveditor General of the Province being informed of the disorders, had ordered immediate restitution to be made of all that the said Morlachs had taken, and giving strict Charge for the future prevention of farther excursions, having also sent to make complaints to the Turkish Basha of the provocation given, and to re-establish a mutual Amity and Commerce according to the intention of the late peace.

Our Generalissimo *Morofini* is every where visiting our Ports and Garrisons both in *Candia* and the neighboring Islands. The Senate hath taken all convenient care for the disposal of those distressed Families which left their Habitations in *Candia* upon its surrender, and have ordered

dered provision to be made for their reception and maintenance in the Towns of *Pola* and *Parenzo* in *Istria*: the Archbishop of *Candia* being deprived of his Charge, has upon application to the Senate, obtained the Church of *St Gregory* in this City, whose revenues are to be assigned towards the support of his Dignity, and two of the Canons of the said Church are dispatched to *Rome* to procure power from the Pope for the settlement thereof.

From the *Levant* we are told, that a Turkish Corsair had lately since the Treaty seized on a Tartan a Christian Vessel, and carried her into *Lepanto* as prize, of which, complaint being made to the Bassa of those parts, the Vessel and Goods were presently ordered to be restored; but the Corsair dissatisfied with the loss of what he thought to have made his own, put out again to sea and seized another Christian ship which he carried away with him for *Barbary*.

The Senate have lately ordered the dismissal of several ships which they had hired for their service during the war, and the unloading of several others that were designed for *Candia*.

*Vienna, Nov. 8.* The Fort near *Comorra* being by the Emperours permission, slighted, that the Turks might not upon that account take an occasion to violate the League; we find not that they are yet satisfied, but are like to insist with as much eagerness upon the demolishing of our new Fort of *Leopoldstadt* near *Neubausl*, to which the interest of our Territories will not easily permit us to comply.

These and other considerations oblige the Emperour to give out strict Orders for the reinforcement of all our frontier Garrisons, i being much feared lest the Turkish force being diverted from the Venetians may search an employment to our disturbance; for which end General *Montecuculi* is speedily to return into *Hungary* to give such Orders as are necessary for the furnishing our Magazines, the strengthening of our Garrisons, and the completing and reparation of our fortifications; and since we have had intelligence that *Moravia* was in danger to be over-run by the Turks, the Regiment of *Rabatta* was ordered to march to the River *Waag* to oppose them in their passage, if they should proceed in such a design.

The 6th instant the Court appeared in extraordinary Gallantry, in Compliment to his Catholick Majesty whole Birth-day it was.

We talk here of a great change of Officers in this Court, the Prince *Lobkowitz* to be declared Chief Minister of State; Count *Lambert* to be promoted to the Charge of Great Master of the Emperours Household, his vacant Office of Great Chamberlain to be conferred upon the Master of the Horse, he to be succeeded by the Count d' *Harach*, and the Prince d' *Aversberg* to have the inspection of all the affairs of *Austria, Stiria, Carinthia*, and *Carniola*, with some other places.

The Popes Nuncio has not altogether discouraged the Emperour from soliciting the Pope for an equal share of his kindness with the Crowns of *France, Spain* and *Poland*, in conferring a Cap at his Nomination upon the Prince de *Baden Dourlac*, of which the Emperour desires speedy satisfaction, and the 2d instant dispatcht an Express to *Rome* to know the Popes final resolution in that particular.

*Brussels, Nov. 26.* The Constable of *Castille*, being informed that the French forces are by Order from His most Christian Majesty drawing towards the frontiers; and that more then ordinary care is lately taken to furnish the Magazines in the new Conquests with all sorts of necessities for the war, has thought it also to take care for the reinforcing such of his Garrisons as lie most exposed to danger, and particularly has ordered two Tercias of Spanish Foot to march to *Ipres*, where the Citadel is well advanced and near perfection; and on Sunday last one Regiment of Foot marched to *Valenciennes*, and another to *Conde*.

Yesterday arrived *Don Antonio de Cordoua*, Lieutenant-General of the Horse, with a List of such Regiments and Companies as have been lately Reformed. The Deputies of *Artois* have made an agreement with *Don Antonio Pimentel* to entertain 3 thousand Foot and 3 hundred Horse.

Since the death of *Don Fernando Solis* late Governour of the Castle of *Antwerp* *Don Antonio Pimentel* is for the present appointed to take Charge of the Government.

The University of *Louvain* having been taxed by the Pope with a Breach of their Statutes, and consequently with the forfeiture of the Privileges granted them by his Predecessor Pope *Paul V.* instancing in many particulars in a Book printed for that purpose; the University have lately publisht their answer by way of vindication; which not satisfying, the Popes Internuncio has summon'd them to appear by their Deputies in *Rome* before *Christmas*, there to make their defence, or else to expect Sentence, which the University refuses, pretending the matter on which the dispute is grounded, relates to the Civil power; and that they cannot make the appearance required without leave from His Catholick Majesty.

*Hague, Novemb. 29.* On Wednesday last the two Marshalls of the Camp, Prince *Maurice*, and the *Heer Wurts* went to the Assembly of the States of *Holland*, where they had a long Conference about the raising of the New Forces, which they seem resolv'd to put into speedy execution. The Council of State having given in their Judgments for the necessity of Raising of 14 thousand Men, Viz. ten Regiments of Foot and 4 of Horse; the report whereof has fill'd this place with Officers, who come to offer their service to the States, who have already Publisht the Capitulation to be observed by such of them as shall be entertained in their service.

'Tis confidently said, that his most Christian Majesty has demanded of the States Restitution of all Estates belonging to the Ecclesiasticks within the Territory of *Hulst*.

The States are now upon the Nomination of several Persons to be sent into *England, France, Spain* and *Poland*, under the character of Ambassadors; the *Heer Marshall* the *Swedes* Minister intends in few dayes to return Home.

*Plymouth, Nov. 29.* Yesterday and on Wednesday put into this Port 27 sail of ships, most of them English from *Burdeaux*, bound for *London* and others of our Ports; the rest of them Dutch and French ships, all of them expecting the opportunity of a fair wind to invite them out to sea to compleat their voyages.

*Exmo, Novemb. 21.* Yesterday arrived here the *French* of this place from *Morlaix*, telling us, That an Order has been Publickly Read in all the Churches and Publick places of that Town, strictly commanding all Seamen to make their Appearance, and to Enroll themselves in His Majesties Service, according to His Majesties late Edict for that purpose.

On Saturday last was put in here by contrary Windes a small Fregat of *Haver de grace*.

The *Charity* of *London*, bound hither from the *Canaries*, is now in *Tarbay*, and may take the opportunity of the first High-water to put into this Harbour.
