PRIVY COUNCIL OFFICE

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 16th day of March 1960.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 4th day of March 1960, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, in pursuance of the Church Patronage Act, 1870, and of the Acts therein mentioned, have prepared the following Scheme for effecting a transfer of the ownership of the advowsons or perpetual rights of patronage of and presentation to the churches and cures (hereinafter called 'the said benefices') of Saint Mark, Broadwater; Frant; Rotherfield and Rottingdean, all situate in the County of Sussex, and in the diocese of Chichester.

"SCHEME

"Whereas we are satisfied that the Most Honourable John Henry Guy, Fifth Marquess of Abergavenny, O.B.E., of Eridge Park, near Tunbridge Wells, in the County of Sussex (hereinafter called 'the said Marquess of Abergavenny') is the patron or person entitled to present or nominate to the said benefices:

"And whereas the said Marquess of Abergavenny desires to transfer the advowsons of the said benefices to the Bishop of Chichester for the time being and is consenting to this Scheme (in testimony whereof he has executed the same):

"And whereas we are satisfied that the transfer will tend to make better provision for the cure of souls:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Roger, Bishop of Chichester (in testimony whereof he has executed this Scheme), we, the said Church Commissioners, humbly recommend and propose that upon and from the day of the date of the publication in the *London Gazette* of any Order of Your Majesty in Council ratifying this Scheme and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly gazetted Order, the whole advowsons or perpetual rights of patronage of and presentation to the said benefices shall be transferred to the said Roger, Bishop of Chichester, and his successors in the same Bishopric and shall thereupon and thenceforth become and be absolutely vested in and shall and may from time to time be exercised by the Bishop of Chichester for the time being."

And whereas the said Scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said Scheme, and to order and direct that

the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately upon the publication of this Order in the *London Gazette* pursuant to the said Acts.

And Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Chichester.

Whereas the Church Commissioners have duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a Scheme bearing date the 4th day of March 1960, in the words and figures following, that is to say:

"We, the Church Commissioners, acting in pursuance of the Pastoral Reorganisation Measure, 1949, the Union of Benefices Measures, 1923 to 1952, and the Diocesan Stipends (Funds) Measure, 1953, now humbly lay before Your Majesty in Council the following Scheme which we have prepared with the consent of the Right Honourable and Most Reverend Arthur Michael, Archbishop of York (in witness whereof he has signed this Scheme) for effecting the union of the benefice of Crayke, the benefice of Brandsby and the benefice of Yearsley (the church or chapel whereof is situate within the parish of Coxwold) and for altering the boundaries of the parishes of Coxwold and Brandsby, all of which benefices and parishes are situate in the diocese of York.

"SCHEME

"1. *Union of benefices.* The benefice of Crayke, the benefice of Brandsby and the benefice of Yearsley shall be permanently united together and form one benefice with cure of souls under the style of 'The united benefice of Crayke with Brandsby and Yearsley' but, subject as hereinafter provided, the parishes of the said benefices of Crayke and Brandsby shall continue in all respects distinct.

"2. *Taking effect of union.* Upon the day when any Order of Your Majesty in Council affirming this Scheme is published in the *London Gazette* the union shall forthwith take effect and the Reverend William Francis Cotton, if he is then incumbent of the said benefice of Crayke shall, with his consent (which has been given to us in writing) be the first incumbent of the united benefice.

"3. *Parsonage House.* Without prejudice to the exercise before the date when the union takes effect of any of the powers conferred by the Parsonages Measures, 1938 and 1947, upon the union taking effect, the parsonage house at present belonging to
