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Vienna, July 7. N. S.

THE Count de Rechteren, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, came to Presburg the 26th past. Mr. Stepney, Her Majesty of Great Britain's Envoy Extraordinary, and Monsieur Bruyminx, who has the same Character from the States, arrived there the 28th; and those three Ministers, who are Mediators for the Treaty with the Malecontents of Hungary, having that Evening received from the Emperor's Commissioners his Imperial Majesty's Answer to the Proposals of the Malecontents, set out the same Night for Tirnav, being accompanied by Count Wratislaw, one of the said Commissioners, who had a Conference there on the 29th with Count Berzen, and the next Day made a Visit to Prince Ragotzi at Newhausel; from whence he returned to Tirnav the 2d Instant in the Morning, and arrived here the 3d at Night, to give the Emperor an Account of what passed at those Conferences. The Bishop of Osnaburg, another of the Imperial Commissioners, arrived here the 5th. The Mediators continue at Tirnav to carry on this Negotiation; in order whereunto the Cessation of Arms is prolonged to the 25th Instant. Monsieur Van Huldeberg, the Elector of Hanover's Resident, has lately had Audience of the Emperor, to notify the Marriage between the Prince Royal of Prussia and the Electoral Princess of Hanover. Count Straetman, his Imperial Majesty's Envoy to the King of Poland, returned hither from thence the 4th Instant. Letters from Barcelona of the 9th of June, which came by the way of Genoa, give an Account, That on the 31st of May the Sick and Wounded whom the French left behind them when they fled from Catalonia, were sent away by Sea for Toulon, in order to their being exchanged for a like number of our Prisoners. The first of June a further Reinforcement of 900 Men was sent to Girona, whither 1300 Men were marched 5 Days before. The 2d Major-General Stanhope set out for that Place, to put it into a good Posture of Defence, and to give the necessary Directions for fortifying the Passes by which any of the Enemy's Troops might attempt to make Incursions from Rouffillon into Catalonia; the like Care having been taken on the Side of Lerida. That Day 15 Pieces of Cannon and 5 Mortars were sent away for Girona. The 4th an end was made of levelling the Enemy's Trenches between Barcelona and Fort Montjuich; and the remainder of the Bombs and other Stores which the Enemy left behind them in their Retreat was brought into the Town. The 5th Letters came from Valencia with the following Advices, That on the 15th of May the Conde de las Torres, who commands the Duke of Anjou's Forces in those Parts, came before Xativa with 2000 Foot and 1500 Horse, and the 17th he began to fire upon the Place from a Battery of 6 Pieces of Cannon. The Garrison consisted only of 100 Men of regular Troops, with some Militia, and was commanded by General Ramos: That the 20th the Enemy made an Assault, and were repulsed with the Loss of 400 Men, among whom were reckoned several Officers of Note: That the 22d the Conde de las Torres summoned the Governor, who returned Answer, That he would rather sacrifice his Life than that any Place where he commanded should fall into the Enemy's Hands; and that Day he received a Supply of Men and Provisions from Valencia: And that they continued firing very briskly on both sides till the 24th, when the Enemy raised the Siege, which had cost them about 1500 Men killed and wounded. The 6th of June his Catholic Majesty appointed Commissioners to visit the several Towns in Catalonia, in order to the regulating of Matters in relation to the respective Magistrates, and the Administration of Justice. The 8th Baron Marialba was sent to Lerida to view the Fortifications of that Place, and to give the necessary Directions for their being repaired and augmented, as also to visit the Works which had been ordered to be made in the several Passes on that side, for the better Security of the Province of Catalonia from any Attempts of the Enemy.

Strasbourg, July 14. The Imperial Army is preparing to pass the Rhine. A Detachment has been sent under the Command of General Mercy with a Supply of Men and Provisions for the Garrison of Landau, where they arrived yesterday Morning. The French Army is within their Lines at Croon-Willkumburg. Most of their Generals are gone to Strasbourg, where they are to hold a great Council of War.

Paris, July 16. N. S. Letters from the Camp before Turin of the 7th Instant give an Account, That they met with such great Difficulties in the Attack of the Citadel of that Place, that it was believed they would be obliged to alter the Dispositions of the Siege, and carry on their Approaches round some other part of the Town; That a Detachment of their Troops had possessed it self of Mondovi, where the Prince of Carignan and some other Persons of Note were taken Prisoners; and that the Duke of Savoy was near Saluces. The Marquis de Goesbriand, with a Body of French Troops, was advanced towards Coni. The Count d'Estain, with some Forces of the Duchy of Milan, was besieging the Castle of Aiti, and the Marquis de Marignane, with another Detachment, that of Ceva; both which Places made a vigorous Defence.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Helchin, July 20. N. S. On Friday the 16th Instant the Prince Royal of Prussia arrived here with his Highness to his Quarters, and the General Officers. His Grace conducted his Royal Highness to his Quarters, and entertained him at Dinner. The next Morning his Grace ordered the first Line of the Army to draw out, and pass in Review before his Royal Highness, who was extremely well pleased with the good Condition the Troops appeared in. On Sunday Morning my Lord Duke, with the Prince Royal, and several General Officers, went with a Guard of 2000 Horse and 600 Foot to a rising Ground within a Mile of Tournay, where they took a View of the Place, and returned about Noon to the Camp. The same Day one of our Parties met with 4 several Parties of the Enemy, and defeated them, killing several of them on the spot, and brought in 38 Prisoners, and 35 Hulfars, with a Lieutenant and a Quartermaster, came over to us from the Enemy with their Horses and Arms. My Lord Duke went yesterday Morning early to view Monsieur d'Auverquerque's Army, which came on Saturday to St. Eloy-Vive, beyond Harlebeck, on the Lys, where they continue, for the better Subsistence of the Troops. His Grace at the same time ordered that River to be viewed; and finding that the Enemy, by making Sluces, had so drained the Water, that instead of Five Foot necessary to bring up the Boats with the Artillery, in

many Places there is not One Foot left, General Salisch will be ordered Morrow with a strong Detachment to break all the Sluces between Armentiers, Menin and Courtray.

The Troops of Prussia and Hanover marched from Alost on Saturday and arrived yesterday in the Rear of our Second Line, where they encamp till further Orders.

Hague, July 20. N. S. The 17th Instant in the Afternoon the King of Prussia came from Cleves by Water on board one of the Yachts of the State to Gees-Brugge, about half a League from hence, where his Majesty took Coach, and went to Houslaerdyke, that Palace being prepared for his Reception; and yesterday Morning the Earl of Portland, and the Secretary Honart, Wiften and Baert, went thither to compliment his Majesty in the Name of the States. The Foreign Ministers and several other Persons of Quality have also been there to wait upon his Majesty. The States of Holland and Westfriesland adjourned the 17th Instant for a Fortnight. A Cart has been published here for opening the Trade with such Places in Spanish Netherlands as now are, or hereafter shall be, under the Dependence of their lawful Sovereign King Charles the Third. There are Letters from Milan which say, the Garifon of Turin had made several Saucers wherein they had nailed up the Cannon of two of the Enemy's Battalions and killed a considerable number of their Men. They write from Genoa that the Duchesses of Savoy, with the rest of his Royal Highness's Family were come to Oneglia, and were shortly expected at Genoa. The Duke of Halifax set out from hence the 18th for the Duke of Marlborough's Camp.
