Whereas by section 30 of the Greenwich Hospital Act, 1865, 28 & 29 Vict. c. 89, it is enacted that the Admiralty, with the approval of Her Majesty in Council, may from time to time make free grants of land, part of the lands vested in them by virtue of the Act, and grants of money for the erection of buildings and providing conveniences for places of worship, residence of ministers, education of children, or other public purposes (so that any such grant of land do not include any right to the minerals under the land granted, or comprise more than two acres in any one parish):

And whereas the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty in their capacity as Trustees for Greenwich Hospital are possessed of ten cottages known as Restoration Cottages situated at Scremerston in the County of Northumberland and they are desirous of granting the said Cottages free of charge to the Rural District Council of Norham and Islandshires in the County of Northumberland for the purposes of the housing of the people of those parts:

And whereas the said Rural District Council of Norham and Islandshires are willing to accept the said cottages as a gift for the purpose hereinbefore

mentioned in the exercise of their powers to provide for the housing of the people of those parts:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in pursuance of the said section 30 is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve that the said cottages, together with adjacent land not exceeding two acres, may be granted free of charge by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty to the Rural District Council of Norham and Islandshires.

This Order may be cited as the Greenwich Hospital (Grant to the Rural District Council of Norham and Islandshires) Order, 1962, and shall come into operation on the 9th day of February 1962.

EXPLANATORY NOTE

(This Note is not part of the Order, but is intended to indicate its general purport.)

This Order approves a free grant of land by the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, in their capacity as Trustees for Greenwich Hospital, to the Rural District Council of Norham and Islandshires. The land consists of a terrace of ten cottages, known as Restoration Cottages, situated at Scremerston, Northumberland.

Whereas the Minister of Housing and Local Government, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of New Hythe, East Malling, in the County of Kent, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act, 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in the Churchyard of Holy Trinity, New Hythe, in the Civil Parish of East Malling in the said County.

Provided that—

In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any member of the family of the person or persons heretofore buried in such grave, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.
