Milan, Dec. 20. N. S.

Prince Eugene came hither the 14th Instant, and the Marquis de Prie, Commillary-General in the Emperor's Service, arrived the 16th from Parma, where he has made an Agreement with that Duke; that his Country shall be exempted from Winter Quarters, provided he pays 100 Ducats, by way of Contribution, towards the Maintenance of the Imperial Troops; and frequent Conferences are now held between Prince Eugene and the Marquis, to consult upon the providing Quarters for those Troops, which were designed to have been quartered in the Parmesan. The Troops of the Blockade of Cremona, which is commanded by Prince of Hesse-Cassel, who has taken his Quarters in Mantua. The French, who are quartered in and about Mantua, frequently send out Parties to disturb us; but they are generally routed, the Confederates keeping always a very good Guard every where. The Winter Season hinders the attacking of Cremona in the way of a formal Siege, as it does likewise the Siege of our Castle; and renders the Attack much more tedious than was expected. The Garrison of Casal is employed in repairing the Fortifications of that Place. There were found in it, when lately taken by the Confederates, 75 Pieces of Cannon, and great Quantities of Ammunition, and almost all kinds, which the Enemy had laid up there.

Dec. 22. Prince Charles of Lorraine, Bishop of Munster, set out from hence the 20th Instant for Prague, and the Princess Sobieski for Gratz in Austria. The Elector Palatine is shortly expected here at Dusseldorp; as Prince Eugene likewise is from Count Windisgratz, a Colonel of the Danish Regiment in the Emperor's Service in Hungary, arrived the 18th Instant from the Army commanded by General Rabutin, which he left the 29th past near Carlin. They write from Gran, That a Party of Garrison lately defeated one of the Malecontents, killed many of them, and taken several Prisoners. Malecontents have lately made some Incursions, burnt several Villages on the Frontiers of Stiria.

Dec. 24. The Swedish General Meyerfeldt departed the 23d Instant from Alt-Ranstad, the Capital of Sweden's Quarter, with an Invitation from the Princes James and Constantine Sobieski: They accordingly set out for that Place yesterday Morning, and were met about 3 Leagues off by Prince Alexander their Brother, who went back with them towards Alt-Ranstad. The King of Poland is shortly expected here from Leipzick, as are also the Queen from Bareith, and the Electress Dowager, the Electoral Prince, from the Duchy of Holstein.

January 4. N. S. The Deputies of the States General had a Conference the first Instant with the Ambassadors of the Allies residing here. The same Day General Dopff left this Place, in order to go to March, and afterwards to Brussels. The Officers in the Army of this State have begun to raise Recruits, in the Spring. Letters from Rastad give an Account, that Prince Lewis of Baden received the Extreme Unction the 24th of the last Month, and was looked upon to be in a dangerous Condition. They write from Saxony, That the King of Poland made another Journey to the King of Sweden at Alt-Ranstad the 23d Instant, and went the next Day to Dresden, intending to continue there a Week, and to return afterwards to Leipzick. They write from the French Conquests, that there is to be an Alteration in the several Commands of the French Generals the next Campaign, the Duke of Orleans being to command in Alsace, the Duke of Vendosme in Italy, and Marshal Catinat in Flanders. Letters from Paris say, they had Advice that the Marquis de Bay came the 15th past with a Bo-

dy of French and Spanish Troops before Alcantara in Estramadura, and retook that Place, which the Confederates had taken from the Enemy the last Campaign.

Falmouth, December 23. Yesterday a Ship of about 100 Tuns, without Masts or Men, was driven on shore near the Deadman's-Point. The same Day came in the Winter of Amsterdam, a Dogger, laden with Wines from Bourdeaux; and homeward bound. This Day failed hence the Griffin of Middlebourg, Captain Huy Commander, to cruise; as did also the Expedition Packer-Boat for Lisbon; and the Dove Gailey, Henry Sherbone Master, for Viana.

Plymouth, Dec. 24. Yesterday arrived here Sir William Whetstone, on board Her Majesty's Ship the Suffolk, with the Bristol, Reserve, and Vulcan Fireship, and 6 Merchantmen from Jamaica. This Day came in the Penrose of Falmouth from Rotterdam; the Lexington, bound for the Canaries; and the Lewis, for Jamaica. At the same time failed hence several of Her Majesty's Ships to the Westward, and the Expedition, and 8 Swedish Ships bound for Portugal. This Evening failed the Chester, and about 10 Merchant Ships from Virginia, bound for Bristol.

Dartmouth, Dec. 24. Yesterday failed hence the Phenix Sloop, Captain Coach Commander, bound for Oporto; the Lewis Sloop, Captain Fernando, for Jamaica; and the Penrose Brigantine, Captain Peacock, for Lisbon.
