Two Statutes made by the University of Oxford, on the 30th June 1964, have been submitted for the approval of Her Majesty in Council, and notice of their having been so submitted is published in accordance with the provisions of the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge Act 1923.

The QUEEN has been pleased to issue a Warrant under Her Majesty's Royal Sign Manual to the following effect:

ELIZABETH R.

GREETING!

Whereas We have taken into Our Royal consideration the need to mark the great constitutional change which will result in the Independence of Malawi.

Which will result in the independence of ivalawi. And whereas We are desirous that selected individuals in Malawi in Our Legislature, in Our Armed Forces, in Our Civil Service, in Our Police Force, and amongst other residents of Malawi who have rendered outstanding public service to the country, should bear some form of recognition of this important event.

We do by these Presents, for Us, Our Heirs and Successors, institute and create a Medal for Malawi.

- Firstly: The Medal shall be designated and styled "The Malawi Independence Medal."
- Secondly: The Medal shall be circular in shape, one and a quarter inches in diameter, of cupronickel and shall bear on the obverse Our Royal Effigy Crowned and on the reverse the Malawi Coat of Arms surrounded by the inscription "Malawi Independence, 6th July 1964".

- Thirdly: The persons eligible for the Medal shall be selected from those of Our faithful subjects or others, male and female, who were serving in established posts on the strength of Our Armed Forces in Malawi, or in established posts in Our Police Force in Malawi, on 6th July 1964, those of Our faithful subjects or others, male and female, serving as members of the Civil Service, and other residents in Malawi who have rendered outstanding public service to the country, all on a basis of meritorious and faithful service.
- Fourthly: The Medal shall be worn on the left breast suspended by a ribbon one and a quarter inches in width, of three vertical stripes in the order, black, red, green, the black stripe being worn farthest from the left shoulder.
- Fifthly: The Medal shall be worn after all Efficiency and Long Service Decorations and Medals and in front of the Service Medal of the Order of St. John.
- Sixthly: It shall be competent for Our Governor-General for the time being to cancel and annul the award to any person of the above Medal, and thereupon the name of such person in the Register shall be erased, but it shall be competent for our Governor-General to restore any Medal which may have been so forfeited.
- Seventhly: It shall be competent for Our Governor-General to make Regulations to carry out the purpose of this Warrant.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twentyninth day of May One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-four in the Thirteenth year of Our Reign.
