Venice, June 3. N. S. We have receiv'd Advice, That the German Troops were advanc'd to the State of *Urbino*, in their Way to *Loretto*, where General *Thaun* is to open his second Letter of Instructions how to proceed on his March towards *Naples*. General *Wetzel*, and other German Officers, are at *Rome*, where they demand of the Pope to set at Liberty the Four Neapolitan Princes, who have been long confined in the Castle of *St. Angelo*, and the German Captain who was imprisoned for secretly raising Soldiers to serve in the Reduction of the Kingdom of *Naples*. The Pope hath taken off the Excommunication of the Viceroy of *Naples*; and we hear Cardinal *Pignatelli* is on his Departure for that Kingdom, to take Possession of the Archbishoprick of *Naples*, in which he hath been oppos'd for some Years, being a declar'd Friend of the House of *Austria*.

Berlin, June 11. His Majesty diverts himself, during the Heat of the Summer, in removing from one Country-House to another, having Variety of pleasing Seats at a small distance from this City. The Court attended His Majesty this Morning to *Oranienberg*, whither the Prince and Princess Royal will follow in a few Days. It being the first time of the Princess's visiting that Place, there will be Illuminations and several extraordinary Diversions prepar'd for her Entertainment. The British Ambassador intends to go thither at the same time, by a particular Invitation from His Majesty, who, with the Prince Royal, did that Minister the Honour to sup with him on Wednesday last at his Excellency's House of Retirement near the Town. The King took the Diversion of sailing down the River from *Charlottenberg* in his Yacht, and was received at his Landing by his Excellency, who attended his Arrival with a Train of Five Coaches, his Excellency's Body-Coach, in which the King rode, being drawn by Eight Horses. The King having written some time since to the Elector of *Hanover* on the Occasion of his Electoral Highness's interfering with him in the Affair of the County of *Mansfeldt*, which King *Augustus* was willing to engage for a Sum of *Money*, has lately receiv'd for Answer, That the Elector had only accepted the Offer made by King *Augustus* without any previous Advances on his side. It is said that *Montieur Oberg*, who is now in *Saxony*, has concluded this Negotiation for the County of *Mansfeldt*; and that his Electoral Highness is to lend upon it *600000* Dollars. The Ministers of *Hanover* having desir'd His Majesty to communicate to them the Instructions he has given to his Deputies design'd for the Visitation of the Chamber at *Wetzlar*, and having signified his Electoral Highness's Intention of acting in Conformity with his Prussian Majesty for the Reformation of such Abuses as have crept into that Court of Justice, they have accordingly receiv'd from the King's Ministers a Copy of their Instructions. Letters from *Lublin* of the 23th of May advise, That the Great Council open'd there on the 23d with the usual Solemnities, but had not then enter'd on Business, the Primate having adjourn'd the Session for some Days, to give Time for the Arrival of the Deputies.

Leipsick, June 11. On Thursday last the King of *Sweden*, accompanied by King *Stanislaus*, did Major-General *Mayerfeldt* the Honour to be present at his Marriage with *Mademoiselle Tornflycht*, Sister to the Countess *Piper*. Major-General *Wrangel* is lately dead of a Fever, and much lamented by this Court: He was Captain-Lieutenant of the King's

is Engagements through the whole Course of the present War. His said he took Leave of the King, who visited him on his Death-bed, in a very moving manner; and ascribing his Distemper to the many Toils and Hardships in which he had accompanied his Majesty, conjur'd him to be more careful of his Person, and not expose a Life of so great Importance to such frequent Hazards and Fatigues. King Augustus, attended by Mr. Robinson and Baron Crantenburg, is now reviewing the Regiments which are taken into the Service of the Queen of Great Britain, and the States General, which are now Cloath'd, well moun'd, and in a readines to march.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Melaert, June 13. On Friday last his Grace the Duke of Marlborough began the Review of the Troops, with the British Foot, who being drawn out at some distance from the Line, perform'd their Exercise to the entire Satisfaction of his Grace and the Generals: The whole appear'd very compleat, and in as good Condition as they have been any time this War. On Saturday his Grace review'd in like manner the Hanover Foot, and this Day that of Prussia; both which made a very graceful Appearance. His Grace will continue the Review of the rest of the Troops. On Saturday one of our Parties met with a Party of the Enemy's Hussars, of which they took Twelve, and Twenty three Horses: And Yesterday another of our Parties, consisting of Fifty Men, having Notice that 110 of the Enemy's Horse and Dragoons were advancing towards a Place where some of our Horse were grazing, attacked 'em, and killing several, took 9 Officers, 56 private Men, and 66 Horses. Seventy of the Enemy's Hussars are come over to us within these two Days. Our Army and that of the Enemy are still in their former Camps; but upon Advice that the French have detached 2000 Horse towards Flanders, Two Battalions and Eight Hundred Horse are ordered to reinforce the Body of Troops under the Command of Lieutenant-General Fagel.

From the Duke of Marlborough's Camp at Meldert, June 16. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough has for three Days past continued the Review of the Dutch and Danish Foot: They all appear'd in very good Order, and perform'd their Exercise with great Readiness. On Tuesday a Lieutenant of the Danish Troops, with 30 Men of a Detachment posted near Louvain, being sent out to observe the Enemy, surpriz'd 45 of their Men resting themselves in an Inn, which our Men surrounded, and after a short Dispute, kill'd 7, and took a Lieutenant, and 28 private Soldiers, having only one Man killed in the Action. Our Army, as well as that of the Enemy, continue still in the same Camps.

Paris, June 15. N. S. The King hath lately received fresh Accounts, from the Intendants of Lions and Dauphiné, of the Murmurs and Discontents in those Parts of the Kingdom, and the great Disposition of the Inhabitants, as well the old Roman Catholics as the new Converts, to favour the Duke of Savoy's Invasion, which they look upon as the most effectual means to put an end to the present War. The King hath therefore ordered all the Cavalry that was under the Count de Medavi to extend themselves in several Quarters on the Borders of the Rhone, as far as from Lions to Vienne. They are in such Apprehensions of popular Tumults, that the Governor of Chambery permits only one Gate of that Town to be left open, under pretence that he hears the Prince of Hesse is marching thither with 15000 Men, over the little Mount St. Bernard. Orders are sent to the Marshal de Thesse to break and ruin all the High Ways that cross the Alps from Piemont to Dauphiné and Provence, in order to render those Countries inaccessible to the Army of the Enemy. We hear, that several of the King's Officers, whom the Intendant of Dauphiné had sent to collect the Taxes in the Countries of Chausau, les Baronnies, and Trièves, were assaulted by the People, who kill'd some of them, declaring that they hoped suddenly to be delivered from such Oppressions by the Duke of Savoy. It is said that the Forces under his Royal Highness's Command, when assembled, will amount to above 50000 Men, notwithstanding the Detachment which hath been made out of them for the Kingdom of Naples.
