Their Parties spread themselves through all the adjacent Countries, and make Excursions as far as to the Danube, committing great Ravages among the People, or extorting Money from them for their Exemption. Last Week there were 4 Waggons sent to Strasboung, under a Guard of 450 Men, with Money that had been gathered in the Circle of Swabia; which are to be fellowed by others loaden with the Contributions and Spoils of that Country. These unexpected Advantages, though obtained without Opposition, have exalted the Enemy to an insupportable Vontry and Insolence.
