Now we need neither King's Troop, nor the Pike Wall to defend us: You have aar- ried the Luffre of the Three Flower de Lucez, and render'd a Tour on the Lions ramparts: You have kept the Belgick Lion from being laid; You have kept open and diſplayed the Wings of the Britiſh Eagle; and You have ſaved up her Young. May the good God continue His Bleſſings upon You; which will make us and our Children's Children happy. That Your Maſteſty may be over us and them, ſhall be our ſincere Prayers. Francfort, June 22. N. S. The Army commanded by Marſhal de Villars is decamp'd from Canſtat, and, by their Motion, ſup- poſed to march towards Ulm, being join'd by the Detach- ments that were at Sturgard. They are laying together great Stores for a Magazine at Schoondorf, and building Ovens for the Supply of their Army with Bread. Their Parties ſpread themſelves through all the adjacent Countries, and make Excur- ſions as far as to the Danube, committing great Ravages among the People, or extorting Money from them for their Exemption. Laſt Week there were 4 Waggons ſent to Strasbourg, under a Guard of 450 Men, with Money that had been gathered in the Circle of Swabia; which are to be followed by others laden with the Contributions and Spoils of that Country. Theſe unexpected Advantages, though obtain'd without Op- poſition, have exalted the Enemy to an intupportable Vanity and Inſolence. The following Letter was lately written by the Marſhal de Villars to the Magiſtracy of Ulm, upon a diſputable Point, relating to ſome Prifoners in their Cuſtody.

S I R S,
I F my Mercy did not withhold my Juſtice, you ſhould before now have felt the Effects of it. I command You to ſend back, this very Inſtant, M'ſieur a'Angelo, and the other Priſoners, whom you unjuſtly detain contrary to the Treaty I made with your Deputies. If you fail doing it, expect to ſee all your Towns, Bourgois, and Villages, aſſaſſed by Fire and Sword. Do Juſtice on your ſelves, if you would ſave my doing it.

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
