In the London Gazette of the 7th September 1948, it was announced by the Lord Chamberlain's Office that permission was given, as a temporary measure, for miniatures of Orders, Decorations and Medals to be worn with Dinner Jackets by those not in possession of full Evening Dress on all occasions when Orders, Decorations and Medals were to be worn with full Evening Dress. This Regulation is now amended.

The Queen has approved that in future, in addition to Miniatures of Orders, Decorations and Medals, one Star and one Neck Badge may be worn with Dinner Jackets. Knights of the Garter, Knights of the Thistle, Knights Grand Cross and Knights Grand Commanders will not wear their Broad Riband and Badge with Dinner Jackets.

Detailed instructions for the wearing of Orders, Decorations and Medals with Dinner Jackets are as follows:—

1. *Knights of the Garter and Knights of the Thistle*
Star on left breast. Broad Riband and Badge will not be worn.
- Knights Grand Cross and Knights Grand Commanders*
Star on left breast and miniature Badge on medal bar. Broad Riband and Badge will not be worn.
- Knights Commander*
Star on left breast; neck Badge, close up below the tie, and miniature Badge on medal bar.
- Companions and Commanders*
Neck Badge, close up below the tie, and miniature Badge on Medal Bar.
- Officers and Members*
Miniature Badges on medal bar.
2. The Badge of the Order of Merit and the Companion of Honour may be worn, close up below the tie, with a Dinner Jacket.
3. Baronets may wear their Badge, close up below the tie, with a Dinner Jacket.
4. Knights Bachelor may wear their Badge on the left breast with a Dinner Jacket.
5. Not more than one Star (or the Badge of a Knight Bachelor) and one neck Badge will be worn. The number of miniature Badges and Medals on a medal bar is not limited.
6. The present regulations for the wearing of Orders, Decorations and Medals by Ladies are not affected by these instructions.
7. Orders, Decorations and Medals may be worn with Dinner Jackets, as described above, with shirts having a stiff collar or soft collar.

8. In future, on occasions when it is desired that decorations be worn, Invitations should state either "Evening Dress Decorations" (signifying White Tie with full Orders, Decorations and Miniatures) or "Dinner Jacket, Decorations" (signifying Black Tie with Orders, Decorations and Miniatures as described above). When "Evening Dress, Decorations" is prescribed, those not in possession of full Evening Dress may wear Orders, Decorations and Miniature Badges and Medals as described above with a Dinner Jacket.
