Genoa, June 9. N. S. Dr. Newton, Envoy Extraordinary from the Queen of Great Britain, is on his Departure for Florence, having been treated during his stay here with particular Marks of Distinction. His first Audiences were attended with unusual Honours; the Republick being willing to shew their great Respect to Her Majesty in the Person of Her Minister. Having received his Credenciar Letters; and Notice thereof being given to the Senate, Signor Clemente Doria and Signor Paolo Gieronimo Palavicino, who had been formerly Envoys Extraordinary from the State to the Court of England, with Francesco Torre and Gio Agostino scaglia, being appointed Deputies by the Republick to attend the Envoy, first made him a Visit at his House, with a Compliment from the State; after which he was admitted to a private Audience of the Doge.

As soon as his publick Audience of the Doge and Senators was appointed, the Master of the Ceremonies came to the Envoy's House about 11 in the Morning, to inform him that the Deputies of the State, with the Nobility, were below to attend him to the Palace: Whereupon the envoy, being accompanied by the Consuls of England, Holland, and Hamburg, with the Merchants and Gentlemen of those and other Nations in Her Majesty's Alliance, went down, and found the Deputies at the Door; whence they proceeded in the following Manner: First the Footmen of the Envoy in their Liveries, conducted by two of those of the Republick: After them the Retinues of the Gentlemen who accompanied him, immediately preceding his own Domesticks, attended by those of the Duke of Moles, and the Marquis Minari the Imperial Resident. In the next place appeared the Consuls, with the Gentlemen of the several Nations, followed by the Envoy

in the midst of the Deputies, and a very great Number of the Nobility: The Procession was closed by the Envoy's Chair of State, and the Chairs of several Persons of the First Rank who attended him. At the Entrance of the Palace the Guards were drawn up under Arms, and in the Court on each side to the Foot of the great Stair-Case. The Envoy, under the Conduct of the proper Officers, ascended into the Room of Audience, where the Doge and Senators sat expecting him in their Robes; who at his Entrance came down from the Throne to receive him. An Elbow-Chair being plac'd for him over-against the Doge, being seated and covered, he address'd his Serenity, and their Excellencies the Senators, in an elegant Latin Speech. As soon as he had concluded, he was brought by the Doge and Senate to the middle of the Room where he was first received, and afterwards conducted in the same manner as he came to the Door of the Palace, where he took Leave of the Deputies and the Genoese Nobility who had accompanied him, and entered into his Chair. Litters were provided by the Republick for the Gentlemen that were with him, who waited upon him to his House. This Entry was attended by a greater Number of Nobility than has before been known at any in Genoa.

About 3 in the Afternoon, the Envoy having declared, that he would admit of Visits for 3 Days from the Nobility, he was during that time attended by successive Visitants of that Quality, to the Number of 300; among whom were many of the greatest Distinction under the Throne, and several that had been Senators.

Rome, June 12. N. S. General Weizell had some Days since a long Audience of the Pope, in which he demanded, That the Investiture of the Kingdom of Naples should be immediately given to King Charles the Third; intimating at the same time, That if it should be delayed till that Kingdom was reduced by Force of Arms, the Right of Conquest would exempt it from any such Subjection to the Holy See; and that therefore this was the last time that the Pope might be complimented with the like Demand. He propos'd also, That the Cannons removed out of the Castle of St. Paolo into that of St. Angelo should be restored to Don Livio Odescalchi, with other Particulars that lie under Consideration of the College of Cardinals. They have resolv'd in a late Congregation to bring into the City of Rome the Militia of the Country, with the Companies of Urbano, and to raise new Levies for the Security of the State. Vast Quantities of all kinds of Provisions are brought together in the neighbouring Parts, for the Subsistence of 13000 Men and 5000 Horses; by which Means we hope to facilitate the March of the Imperial Army, and give them a speedy Passage through this Country. We hear, that there are great popular Commotions in the City and Kingdom of Naples; and that, notwithstanding the extraordinary Vigilance and Activity of the Viceroy to keep all things quiet under the present Establishment, there seems an irremediable Tendency in the People to a Revolution.
