To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

May it please Your Majesty, TO admit our Congratulation on the Glory of Your Reign, in the Union of Your Kingdoms; which has completed the Happiness we have by our Subjection to Your Family. The Success of Your Arms, the Conservation of our Laws, and the Safety of our Church, were all we knew to pray for: But now we shall add to our daily Devotions, That God may give us Grace to repay to You in Duty what we receive by Your Protection.

The following Address from the Borough of Maldon was likewise presented to Her Majesty.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Bailiffs, Aldermen, Capital Burgesses, and Commonalty, of Your ancient Borough of Maldon.

MADAM, THE numerous Blessings which frö Your Majesty's auspicious Reign, raise in the Hearts of us, Your faithful and loyal Subjects, an equal Wonder and Complacency. Pardon then, Dread Sovereign, our repeated Approaches to Your Royal Presence, who, being thus affected, take every Occasion that may augment the Lustre and Glory of Your Government, to cast our selves in great Humility at Your Royal Feet, and testify our just Acknowledgment and Satisfaction.

It is the remarkable Advantage of Your happy Administration to give uncommon Instances to Your People, of a prudent Conduct and Management in Peace as well as War; and to have Your Councils produce Effects little less stupendious than Your Arms. The Union of Your Kingdoms of England and Scotland, so frequently attempted by Your Predecessors in vain, and so quickly and amicably effected by Your Princely Wisdom, is an Event perhaps as unexpected and surprising, as the Victories of Blenheim and Ramillies.

May it please him by whom Kings Reign, who hath inspired Your Royal Heart with great and noble Designs, and blessed them with the best Issue, to attend this great Undertaking with a Success agreeable to Your Majesty's pious Intentions and Desires; that may essentially tend to the firm Security of the Protestant Religion, especially of the Church of England as by Law established, (the chief Bulwark and Support of the Protestant Interest) and to the lasting Weal and Happiness of all Your loving Subjects; that they may mutually conjoin in a closer Union of Hearts and Affections; and Your Majesty long enjoy these happy Fruits of Your tender Care for the Good and Welfare of Your People. Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Genoa, June 9. N. S. Dr. Newton, Envoy Extraordinary from the Queen of Great Britain, is on his Departure for Florence, having been treated during his stay here with particular Marks of Distinction. His first Audiences were attended with unusual Honours; the Republick being willing to shew their great Respect to Her Majesty in the Person of Her Minister. Having received his Credenciar Letters; and Notice thereof being given to the Senate, Signor Clemente Doria and Signor Paolo Gieronimo Palavicino, who had been formerly Envoys Extraordinary from the State to the Court of England, with Francesco Torre and Gio Agostino Scaglia, being appointed Deputies by the Republick to attend the Envoy, first made him a Visit at his House, with a Compliment from the State; after which he was admitted to a private Audience of the Doge.

As soon as his publick Audience of the Doge and Senators was appointed, the Master of the Ceremonies came to the Envoy's House about 11 in the Morning, to inform him that the Deputies of the State, with the Nobility, were below to attend him to the Palace: Whereupon the Envoy, being accompanied by the Consuls of England, Holland, and Hamburg, with the Merchants and Gentlemen of those and other Nations in Her Majesty's Alliance, went down, and found the Deputies at the Door; whence they proceeded in the following Manner: First the Footmen of the Envoy in their Liveries, conducted by two of those of the Republick: After them the Retinues of the Gentlemen who accompanied him, immediately preceding his own Domesticks, attended by those of the Duke of Moles, and the Marquis Minari the Imperial Resident. In the next place appeared the Consuls, with the Gentlemen of the several Nations, followed by the Envoy
