THE humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Deputy Lieutenants, Grand Jury, and other Gentlemen of the County of Radnor, at the General Quarter Sessions hold at Pr. *Refuge* for the said County on Tuesday the 7th Day of October, in the Sixth Year of present Majesty's Reign, of Great Britain, &c. Presented Her Majesty by their Representative in Parliament.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

Most Gracious Sovereign,
NOT to mention those glorious Successes Abroad, wherewith You hath pleas'd the Almighty God to crown the few Years of Your Majesty's happy Reign, permit us (most Gracious Sovereign) to address Your Majesty upon Two most important Articles in the Union of Your Two Kingdoms of England and Scotland upon Your Majesty's being the first Monarch in this Island who hath appear'd at the Head of a Parliament of Great Britain: This (Madam) will add a greater Lustre to the same in all Generations to come, than even reducing the greatest Power of France. The Uniting of Wales to England by Act of Parliament, is justly accounted one of the great Arguments of the Reign of a great King, one of Your Majesty's great Prerogatives; and we all, especially we of these Parts of Your Majesty's Dominions, do to this Day feel the good Effects of the said Union. We can wish our selves, and our Brethren of North Wales, no greater Happiness, than that Your Majesty's long and happy Reign may be long, and that their Union with England may be as advantageous to them, as ours was to us, and that the same may improve to the same Purposes that we have done; and that the same may be as full of Duty and Loyalty to Your Majesty, as ours has been to Your Majesty.

Your Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

October 8. N. S. On the 4th Instant his Royal Highness a Courier from Sufa with Advice, That the Garrison of Sufa, which was reduc'd by the Soldiers, and 30 Officers, were made Prisoners at Sufa. Prince Eugene gave Orders, That the Officers should not be taken from them. On the same Day General Reinbender, who commands in chief the Palatine Troops that are in the Pay of Her Majesty of Great Britain, arriv'd here from Pignerol, and on the 10th Instant arriv'd here to receive his last Orders concerning the Disposal of those Troops, which are now present, in an Uncertainty whether they shall serve in his Royal Highness's, or in Spain. The Regiment of Sufa is on the March to Final, in order to be transported to Catalonia. On the 6th Four Troops of his Royal Highness's Horse-Guards arriv'd here, and the rest of his Horse-Guards have march'd through this Place to their Winter Quarters. The same Day the Garrison of Sufa march'd into Sufa, where it is believ'd they will remain till they are reduc'd. Yesterday Prince Eugene, accompanied by his Royal Highness's Son, Prince Emanuel and Prince Maurice, came hither to Sufa, and immediately went to the Vineyard of the said City, to wait upon their Royal Highnesses; whence he will return in few Days to Sufa, and give necessary Orders there. The Marquis de Carail, Governor of this City, has presented the Governor of Sufa to their Royal Highnesses, by whom he was receiv'd very graciously: when time the Duke thought fit to acknowledge to him, the Treatment he had always given his Highness's Subjects who traded between this Place and Savoy.

October 11. The Marquis Visconti, who went to Sufa in some Affairs with Prince Eugene, is on his Return to Sufa, where they are disposing all Things for the Winter Quarters of the Imperial Forces. Five and twenty Regiments of Horse have begun their March to the Mountains of Ferrarce. On the 9th Instant a Courier from Sufa arriv'd, with the News, That the Imperialists, on the 6th of the last Month, had made a general Assault upon the Garrison, with such Success, that they became Masters of the Place, and put all to the Sword whom they found in the City. The Duke of Escalona, with the Neapolitan Lords, follow'd his Fortune, as well as several Officers and Men, retir'd into the Citadel, where they were all made Prisoners of War; and the Troops met with a great quantity of valuable Plunder. The Besiegers lost 100 Men in the

Attack, and General Vaubonne was dangerously wounded. We have sung *Te Deum*, and had all our Artillery, on this extraordinary Success.

Neufchatel, October 14. The French Competitors, notwithstanding their Protest, and Departure thereupon, stopt at Pontarlier, about 10 Leagues off; and being encourag'd by their Party here, sollicit the French Court to earnestly to interpose in their behalf, that they have at last procur'd Orders to Monsieur de Pultieux, the French Ambassador, to make very vigorous and lively Representations to the Three States here. Accordingly two Days ago he sent his Secretary hither with a Memorial to them; wherein, having tax'd them very freely with Injustice and Partiality in their Proceedings, he demands of them Three Points, and unless they are granted, threatens them not only with an Interdiction of Commerce, but even with War it self. The Three Points are, 1. That a Delay be granted sufficient to give the French Competitors Time to return hither, and pursue their Claims. 2. That the Pretenders Claims be judg'd separately, by a particular Sentence for each, and not jointly and by one single Sentence for all. And, 3. That they absolutely chuse one of the French for their Prince. This Memorial was read by the Three States, who, after some Debate thereupon, declar'd they could not change any thing in their former Sentences. However, Monsieur de Pultieux is not discourag'd by this Refusal; but hath sent Word, He will come hither himself on the 16th, the Day before the Tribunal meets, in Hopes his Presence and Threats may make them change their Resolution; so that we are like to be in a great Ferment for some Days. In the mean time the King of Prussia's Minister uses all possible Means to encourage and fortify his Friends in their Resolution against any Delays; the Success of which a few Days will shew.

Potsdam, October 15. On Sunday last the King commanded Monsieur Briou, Captain of one of his Majesty's Troops of Guards, to take Monsieur Hamroth, Privy-Councillor and Master of Requests, into Arrest, and convey him to Spandaw; which was immediately executed. The Disgrace of that Minister is principally attributed to his suppressing Petitions to his Majesty, and interrupting the Way to his Royal Favour by indirect Arts. Letters from Warsaw advise, That Prince Menzikoff having wanted Intelligence of the March of the Swedes for the Space of Four Days, sent Orders to Colonel Schultz to bring in some Swedish Prisoners, at the Hazard of his Head. Upon which the Colonel advanced and attack'd the Van-guard of the Swedes, who were already arriv'd at Kalish; in which Action he kill'd 10 Men, and took 4 Prisoners: After which he join'd General Hensky near Sobula. These Letters add, General Reinschild was at Kalish with 4000 Men, and, having left General Meyerfeld in the Place, had pass'd the Warla, with Design to cut off the Retreat of General Hensky; who receiving Advice of it, had retir'd to Lowitz. 'Tis said, his Czarish Majesty is at Werdla, and makes all possible Preparations against General Lewenhaupt.

Dusseldorp, Octob. 18. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough left the Army on the 15th in the Morning, lay that Night at Liere, the next at Grave, and the following at Wesel; from whence his Grace arriv'd here about Four this Afternoon. An Alarm of several
