THE humble Address of the Bayliff, Aldermen, Common-Council, and other Inhabitants, of the Town and Borough of New Radnor: Presented to Her Majesty by their Representative in Parliament.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

May it please Your most Sacred Majesty,  
 There have been Instances in most Ages of the World of ad-  
 ding one Country and Kingdom to another by such Methods  
 as the Ambition, Wisdom and Power, of Princes and States sug-  
 gested to them: But to make two independent Kingdoms one,  
 not in Affection and Interest only, but to make them one Bo-  
 dy, one Empire, and Kingdom for ever, in such manner as that  
 both Kingdoms are justly pleased, and think themselves happy  
 in so doing, is not by Conquest, unless it be that of the Hearts of  
 Your Subjects of both Nations; not by Intrigue, but by free De-  
 bates and Parliamentary Proceedings, and letting both King-  
 doms into the Secret of their common Interest, and all this done  
 at a Time when the common-Enemy thought to make our Division  
 of great Service to him; and in such a Juncture, that the  
 Day of all the World were turn'd upon the Successes of Your Ma-  
 jesty's Councils and Arms Abroad, and had Reason to believe  
 that the Royal Thoughts were entirely employ'd that way: To  
 say, as I say, Two Kingdoms offer such a manner, is what no  
 Prince Earth ever did before Your Majesty, and may be lastest  
 Many will have but this one single Instance to admire: It is  
 not known, that this glorious Union was often attempted, but in  
 vain, upon nearer Views, looked upon as a Thing scarce  
 possible, the exceeding desirable: But the Glory of reducing to  
 practice what, upon many Tryals, was thought to be a meer Spe-  
 culation in Politicks, was reserved for Your Majesty. The nearest  
 to the faint Resemblance of this mighty Performance, is one of  
 Your Majesty's Royal Predecessors uniting Wales to England by  
 Act of Parliament. We of these Parts of Your Majesty's Domi-  
 nions having, the Course of so many happy Reigns, reaped so  
 many Advantages by an Union with England, that we must be  
 allowed to speak on this Head with a greater Sense of Thankful-  
 ness and Gratitude than any other of Your Majesty's Subjects,  
 and to be convinced of the blessed Fruits and Effects that may  
 be expected from this Union, and what an unspeakable Happi-  
 ness it is to be made free of England.  
 The Height therefore of our good Wishes to our Brethren on the  
 other side the Tweed, is, That their Union with England may  
 turn to us good Account to them as it did to us; and that they  
 may make as good Use of it as we have done, by all Returns of  
 Duty and Loyalty to Your Sacred Majesty and Royal Successors  
 for ever. In Testimony whereof, we have hereunto affixed the  
 common Seal of the said Borough of New Radnor, this Sixth  
 Day of October, in the Sixth Year of the Reign of our Sovereign  
 Lady ANNE, by the Grace of GOD, Queen over Great  
 Britain, &c. Defender of the Faith, &c. Annoq; Dom. 1707.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Venice, October 7. N. S. Letters from Rome of the  
 first Instant say, That Signior Battista Nani, Amba-  
 sador from this Republick, not having been invited  
 to the Chapel which was to have been held the next  
 Day, left that City on the 26th of last Month. He  
 was attended at his Departure by the Cardinals Col-  
 loredo, Ottoboni, and Priuli, and a great Number of  
 Prelates; but an Express follow'd him to Spoleto  
 with a Project of Accommodation: Upon which  
 his Excellency dispatch'd Orders to Rome to forbid  
 his House being unfurnish'd, with Directions to re-  
 ceive again into his Service some Domesticks he had  
 dismiss'd. The Pope has appointed the Palaces of  
 Castel-Candolfo and Albano for his Residence, till he  
 thinks it convenient to return to Rome.

Frankfort, October 20. The Elector of Mentz arri-  
 ved here Yesterday, and the Elector of Hanover is  
 expected this Evening; as is also his Grace the Duke  
 of Marlborough. The Conference was at first to  
 have been held at Mentz; but his Electoral Highness,  
 to avoid several Ceremonies, in which he must have  
 been engag'd at that Place, chose rather to have it  
 in this City. Letters from the Imperial Army ad-  
 vise, That, by the Care of his Electoral Highness,  
 the Troops have Plenty of all manner of Necessaries;  
 and, if there should be occasion, can be supply'd with  
 them in the Field a Month longer. He has given Or-  
 ders, That the Magazines of Philipshourg, and other  
 Frontier Places, be immediately fill'd with Stores.  
 The Baron Reyschack and Monsieur Elstern are sent  
 to the Black Forest, in order to make a Report  
 of what Measures are to be taken for the forming a  
 new Line to cover that part of the Country. The  
 Army of the Marshal de Villars is in great want of  
 Forage, and ruine the Country wherever they come.  
 They have forag'd in the Town of Baden, tho' the  
 Princess was there, and had at that time Safe-guards  
 granted her for the Protection of the Place.

Paris, October 21. N. S. On Tuesday last a Courier  
 arriv'd at Fontainebleau from Spain, who brought  
 the King Advice, That the Trenches were open'd  
 before Lerida the Night between the 2d and 3d In-  
 stant: He reports, That the Duke of Orleans ob-  
 serving that the swelling of the Segra had very much  
 incommoded their Works, and given the Enemy  
 Opportunity to prepare for the Succour of the Place,  
 call'd a Council of War, to consider whether it was  
 not advisable to raise the Siege. The greater Num-  
 ber of the General Officers thought the Enterprize  
 impracticable; but the Duke of Berwick being of  
 another Opinion, he at length prevailed with the rest  
 to follow his Sentiments. Monsieur d'Aubigny is  
 also come from Spain, with the Particulars of the  
 taking of Ciudad-Rodrigo: He says, That the Mar-  
 quis de Bay having made himself Master of the  
 Counterscarp, our Men broke into the Town a-  
 mong the Enemy, kill'd 200, and made the rest of  
 the Garison Prisoners of War. This Success has  
 not made up our Misfortune in the Loss of Su-  
 fa, by which Dauphiné lies open to the Enemy,  
 and the Entrance of Italy is shut against us. The  
 Campagne in Flanders being at an end, the Ge-  
 neral Officers return daily to Court, where 'tis said  
 the Duke of Vendosme will arrive on the 27th of  
 this Month; and the Household Troops will be  
 here next Week. Ninety five Squadrons are to be  
 drawn out of Flanders, and to have their Win-  
 ter-Quarters near Paris; which it's hoped may be of  
 some Advantage to the People of these Parts, who  
 are promis'd to be paid in Money for what Forage  
 and Provision they are oblig'd to furnish. The Pro-  
 ceedings at Neufchatel are highly reſented by the  
 King, who has sent Orders to the Duke of Villeroy  
 and Monsieur de Matignon to stay at Pontarlier; and  
 at the same time directed Monsieur Puisseux to re-  
 pair to Neufchatel, and reside there till he receives  
 further Instructions. The Prince of Conti is much dis-  
 pleas'd

pleas'd with the Duke of Villeroy and the Marquis de Matignon, for having given out, That his Highness, after having fail'd in his own Pursuits, sollicit'd against their Pretensions in Favour of the King of Prussia. The sudden overflowing of the Loire has done incredible Damage to the Country between Orleans and Blois. The River swell'd 22 Foot high in one Night, laid the Country under Water for Eight Leagues from its Banks, overwhelm'd 27 Villages, destroy'd above 30000 Pieces of Wine, with vast Quantities of Corn, and drown'd 5000 Persons, with great Numbers of all sorts of Cattle. The Torrent broke down its Banks at the Trois-Volets, near Saumur, for the Space of 250 Yards, overturning the Church, and all the Houses of the Place, in its first Violence: And we hear, the Losses occasion'd by this dreadful Inundation cannot amount to less than 20 Millions of Livres. They write from Germany, That the Marshal de Villars, with a Party of 1500 Horse, having march'd out of his Camp to observe the Enemy, very narrowly escap'd falling into an Ambuscade of 4000 Horse; which was discover'd by an advanc'd Party of Hussars, who immediately rode back, and gave the General such timely Notice of his Danger, that he retir'd in Safety to his Intrenchments.
