with Succours, and had retaken the Castle of St. Philip from the Moors. The Duke of Orleans open'd the Trenches before the Castle of Lerida on the 16th of the last Month; But the Besieged made so constant a Fire with their Cannon and small Arms, and the Place it self is so advantageously situated, that these Letters report the Success of that Enterprize to be very doubtful. They add, That his Highness having certain Intelligence that the Enemy had assembled a great Number of Miquelets, and made large Detachments of Foot out of their Garrisons, and fearing at the same time the overflowing of the Segra, had on the 21st retir'd with his Troops from the Left of the River, and drawn all his Forces on the same side with the Town.

*Whitehaven, Nov. 16.* Yesterday arrived here the Mazarine, and Patience, Joseph Younger, and William Smith, Masters, both of this Port, from Virginia, having been 8 Weeks in their Passage.

*Falmouth, Nov. 17.* Yesterday came in here the Concord of Guernsey from St. Ubes, laden with Oranges and Lemons for London. This Morning 3 French Privateers, from 12 to 20 Guns, attack'd a Dutch Ship of 200 Tuns off the Lizard, who maintain'd a running Fight till she had lost her Fore-mast; after which she was forc'd to submit to the Enemy.

*Plimouth, Nov. 18.* On the 14th Instant came in the Flying-Fish of Amsterdam, with Fruit from Lisbon, and on the 16th sail'd for London. This Day sail'd Her Majesty's Ships the Southampton and Lizard for Milford, and the Arundel for Ireland.

*Dartmouth, Nov. 16.* Yesterday Morning sail'd hence the Neptune, Captain Souter Commander, for London, with a fair Wind, who put in here two Days before by contrary Winds, laden with Oranges and Lemons from Lisbon. There only remains in this Port the Hawk Galley, Captain Muggrige, from London, bound to Lisbon, with the first Convoy.

*Yarmouth, Nov. 21.* On the 18th Instant pass'd through our Road Her Majesty's Ship the Dreadnought to the Southward to refit, having a Jury Main-mast. Her Majesty's Ship the Edinburgh, with divers Ships under her Convoy from Scotland, sail'd also at the same time out of our Road for the River of Thames. The light Colliers that sail'd lately hence to the Northward, are put back by contrary Winds; and several other light Colliers belonging to this Place are this Day come hither from the Southward, to lay up in our Haven for the Winter.

*Portsmouth, Nov. 20.* On Sunday last Her Majesty's Ships the Exeter, Northumberland, Canterbury, and Monk, sail'd from Spithead to the Downes. Sir John Leake, on board Her Majesty's Ship the Nassau,

*Brussels, Nov. 10. N.S.* By Letters from Paris we are inform'd, That the Troops which were in Dauphine are to have their Winter Quarters in Savoy; And that the Marshal de Tessé had taken all possible Precautions to oppose any Irruption of the Enemy, to which the Country lies expos'd by the taking of Sufa. He has fill'd the Magazines with Stores of Ammunition and Provisions, and fortified all the advanc'd Posts. Those Letters mention a Report, That the King had order'd some Troops to march into the Franche Comte, to influence, by their Approach, the People of Neufchatel, who have shown so little Regard to the repeated Memorials of his Ambassador in favour of the French Pretenders to that Principality. Letters from Spain say, That the Prisoners which were taken at Ciudad-Rodrigo were conducted to Salamanca; That the new Governor of Oran was arriv'd at that Place
