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Turin, Febr. 18. N. S.

Letters from Genoa say, That the Confederate Fleet was seen before Roses, on the 24th of the last Month, in its Way to Barcelona. The same Letters inform us, That two Days before their Date Captain Delaval, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Falcon, dy'd at Genoa of the Small-Pox. Recruits come in hither in such Numbers that his Royal Highness's Troops are almost compleat. By the last Advices from our Frontiers we have Intelligence that the French are in Motion: His Royal Highness has sent the necessary Orders to the Baron St. Remi, who commands at Susa, to be in readiness to receive 'em.

Venice, Febr. 25. N. S. On the 19th of this Month the Prince Ercolani made a magnificent Entertainment in his Palace; and on the last Day of the Carnival, the Earl of Manchester, Ambassador Extraordinary from Great Britain, gave a sumptuous Banquet in Celebration of her Majesty's Birth-day. The Doge has receiv'd Advices from Signior Guistiniani, Ambassador from this Republick to the Port, that the Grand Signior had discontinu'd his Preparations both for Sea and Land. They write from Parma, that the Prussian Troops proceeded on their March thro' the Milanese to Neufchatel, notwithstanding the late ill Weather; and that those of the Pope's Forces which lay in Parma and Piacenza, had Orders to march into Ferrara.

Vienna, Febr. 25. N. S. The Court has taken the most effectual Methods for prosecuting the War the ensuing Campaign; and his Imperial Majesty omits no Endeavours to bring on the Treaty of Presbourg. In the mean time the Malecontents continue to commit Outrages, and having lately pass'd the Waag, plunder'd a Village in the County of Posen, and carry'd off a considerable Booty of Cattle. They write from Alba Regalis, That the Malecontents had unexpectedly surrounded the Place, and drove the Cattle belonging to it from their Pastures before they were observ'd; but upon the firing of a Gun, the Garrison was alarm'd, and made a Sally, in which they repuls'd the Enemy, and took several Prisoners and Horses. Letters from Warsaw of the 10th Instant confirm the Advices we had before receiv'd of the Defeat of Prince Wisnowieski, and say, That the Muscovites came upon him so suddenly, that he had not Time to put himself into any Posture of Defence. General Lewenhaupt has been also routed, and is retir'd to Riga, where he has quarter'd some Thousands of his Men, to preserve it from the Insults threaten'd by General Baver. They add, that General Lewenhaupt expected to be reliev'd by the King, his Master; but that the continual Rains, and the great Expedition which his Majesty made in his March, had fatigu'd the Troops so much, that he had not, at the Date of their last Letters, come on as far as Grodno.

Berlin, March 3. N. S. The Prince Hereditary of Hesse-Cassel is arriv'd here, and has been receiv'd by his Majesty with great Distinction. This Day the Battalion of the Prince of Holstein, which is marching towards Italy from Prussia, pass'd in Review about 14 Miles from this Place, and appear'd in very good Order, 300 Men drawn out of Regiments which have been in much Service march with that Body, in order to recruit those Battalions which are to remain in Italy. The Prince of Hesse was the other Day to have din'd with his Majesty at the British Ambassador's, but was taken dangerously ill; he seem'd Yesterday in a fair way of Recovery, but this Day his Distemper return'd with more Violence. Letters from Warsaw of the 21st of Febr. confirm the Account of the Retreat of the Muscovites from Grodno and Wilda, upon the Approach of the Swedes. They add, that the Muscovites, the next Morning after they had retir'd from Grodno, came up in a Body of 2000 Men to Grodno, and had surpriz'd his Swedish Majesty in his Quarters, had they not unseasonably beat their Drums, which alarm'd the Swedes by whom they were repuls'd with great Loss. His Czarish Majesty has retir'd towards Minsk with his Troops, and is follow'd by the Swedes. General Czermetow has receiv'd Orders to advance towards Polozko, where he is to lye in readiness to oppose any Design of the Swedes against Somolensko.

Berne, Febr. 29. N. S. This Canton Yesterday sent an Answer to the French Ambassador's Letter, wherein he had acquainted 'em that he believ'd the King his Master would not agree to the Alterations they had made in the Project of Neutrality for Neufchatel, but was of Opinion that these Changes would hinder the Conclusion of the Affair. The Canton tells him they are surpris'd to hear he has already sent that Project to Court, since it was only an unfinished Draught, and communicated to him only by way of Information, and not as a settled Resolution. They say, his Haste in that Matter was the more unexpected, because their Deputies at the same time told him they could not agree to it but under the Correction of their Superiors; who having since disapproved it, the Project was consequently become void. They add, that they found those Alterations so necessary and essential to the Peace and Security of Neufchatel, that they cannot depart from them; and conclude in a Request, that he would employ his good Offices towards disposing the Court to agree to them. Our Letters from Milan of the 21st of this Month say, That a Courier was come to Genoa with Advice, that the Confederate Fleet with the Land Forces, were safely arriv'd at Barcelona.

Hague, March 9. N. S. The States of Guelderland have oblig'd the Town of Nimmegeu to retract those Acts which have occasion'd the late Disorders, so that all things now are in perfect Tranquility. We hear from Ratisbon that the Diet had come to a Resolution of granting the Million of Rixdollars, demanded by the Elector of Hanover, for the Service of the Empire, and to take three thousand Saxon Horse into the Imperial Pay. Our Advices from France mention Preparations which are still making at Duukirk and other Ports, but the States have taken such Precautions, that we are in no Apprehension upon that Occasion. In the mean time new Ships are fitting out in all our Docks, and an Em'argo laid on all such as appear proper for Transports. We have some Advices from Barcelona, which say, the Succours to his Catholick Majesty out of Italy arriv'd there on the 28th of January.

Whitehall, March 4. On the second of this Month, Josiah Burchet, Esq; Secretary to his Royal Highness, Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, &c. was unanimously elected a Baron of the Cinque-Ports, to serve in Parliament from the ancient Town and Port of Sandwiche.

Falmouth, Febr. 28. This Day came in the Fortune Dogger off and for Flushing, Anthony Arder Master, from Bourdeaux, laden with Wine, having been five Days in her Passage. The Master reports, that the Duke of Orleans was come to Bourdeaux in his way to Madrid before he came out; and farther adds, that a Galliot-Hoy had brought into that Port a great number of Prisoners, who had been taken by three Dutch Privateers, the Derboug, Griffin and Diana, which having fallen in with 14 Sail of French Ships bound for the West-Indies, had taken 12 of them.
