Hereas We have received certain Information, That the Person who, during the Life of the late King James the Second, Pretended to be frace of Wales, and since his Decease has taken upon him-liftihe Stile and Title of James the Third, King of En-end, and James the Eighth, King of Scotland, being fred up in the Popish Superstition, and instructed to introthe the French Government into all Our Realms and Domons, Openly and Traiterously has undertaken an Inva-ing this Our Kingdom of Great Britain, with an Armed time of the French Kings Troops, Our declar'd Enemies, and divers of our Rebellious Subjects, who have Trai-tently adhered to Our faid Enemies, in manifest Violation of Our Lawful and Rightful Title to the Crown of these Our Lawful and Rightful Title to the Crown of these Reams, and of the several Acts of Parliament made, as well in Recognizing the same, as for Settling the Succession the same as for Settling the Succession the same and wherein the faid Pretended Prince stands now Attainted of High-The laid Pretended Prince stands now Attanted of High-Institute of Parliament made in England in the Desirable Tear of the Reign of Our late Brother King Windishe Third of Glorious Memory, and all manner of Originalence with the said Pretended Prince, or any of Malerents, is thereby forbid to all Our Subjects, upon the of High Treason: And although all Persons, as well Criminal as other Cases, are bound to take Notice of the lim at their Peril: wereno the Intern that none may think In at their Peril; yet to the Intent that none may think Wistape due Punishment, by pretending Ignorance of the Nature of their Crimes, and that nothing may be wanting Our Part, for the Defence and Preservation of Our withful and Loving Subjects; We have therefore thought his ine Advice of Our Privy-Council, and in pursuance the Humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Tempolish Commons in this present Parliament Assembled, Fublish and Declare the said Pretended Prince, and all Accomplices, Adherents, Abettors and Advisers, to be Taurs and Rebels. And We do hereby strictly Command Require all Our good Subjects to use their utmost Enwours to Seize and Apprehend the said Pretended Prince, the shall at any time be found within any Part of Our Raims of Dominions, and all his Traiterous Confederates and Albertents, and all and every Person and Persons who will be Aiding and. Abetting to the aspresaid Traitors and libet, and to Secure their Persons till our further Pleafall be known. And we do hereby further strictly the said Command all Popish Recusants. Natives and Denicens, who shall be above the Age of Sixteen Years, they dos according to the Statutes in that behalf made, Repair to their respective Places of Abode, and do not thence ove or Pass above the Distance if Five Miles until Our Will and Pleasure be further Declared. And We do descripe Charge and Command all Papists, and Persons remid 6 to be, except Merchait Strangers, Settled House-leders, and other Persons excepted in the Statutes made in the behalf, on or before the Eleventh Day of this Instant fatch, to Depart out of Our Cities of London and West-minster, and from all Places within Ten Miles Distance of the same. And We do hereby Command the Lord Mayor of London, and all the Talling of the Pages and other Off London, and all other Justices of the Peace, and other Offi-That they make Search for, and Proceed against all such stem as shall presume to Remain, Repair, or Return within the Limits aforesaid, by Tenaring to them the Decastion mentioned in the Statute made in the First Year the Reign of Their late Majesties King William and Statute Mary, of Blessed Memory, Intituled, An Act for the Months and Penisted Papilles from the Cihe amoving Papifts and Reputed Papifts, from the Ciof London and Westminster, and Ten Miles Distance

from the same. And We do likewise Charge and Com-mand all Justices of the Peace, who shall know or be in-formed, That any Person is Suspected to be a Papist, or Disaffected to Our Government, to Tender to such Person the Declaration as foresaid, and Proceed thereupon by Seizing the Horses and Arms of such Person, and otherwise, according to One other Act made in the said First Year of the Reign of their said late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, Intituled, An Act for the better Securing the Government, by Disabling Papists and Reputed Papists. And for the better Discovery of Persons who are Discovery effected to Our Government, We do likewise Command all Justices of the Peace, and other Officers in that behalf Authroized, to Tender unto such Person or Persons, as they shall find or be informed are Suspected not to be Well-affected to Our Person or Government, the Oaths that are Appointed by an Ast made in the said First Year of the Reign of Their said late Majesties King William and Queen Mary, Instituted, An Act for the Abrogating the Oaths of Supremacy and Allegiance, and Appointing other Oaths: And in case any such Person or Persons shall Resuse to take the same. We do hereby Require due Prosecution to be made thereupon: And in Order thereunto, the said Justices of the Peace are to make and keep Entries and Records of the reace are to make and keep Entries and Ketords of fuch their Proceedings, that the faid Oaths may again be Tendred to the Person or Persons who shall so Results fame. And we do hereby particularly Charge and Require all Deputy-Lieutenants and Fustices of the Peace, That they do frequently meet to Enquire into, and Inform themselves, of the Affairs of their respective Counties in relation to the Premisses, and take special Care to Preserve the Peace, and Prevent all Unlawful Meetings and Assemblies; and that from time to time they do give Information of their Proceedings and Discoveries to the Lords of our Privy-Council. And We do likewise hereby Charge and Command all Our Lordieutenants, Deputy Lieutenants, Sheriffs, Bailiffs of Regalities, Fusices of the Peace, Mayors, Provosts, Bailiffs, and all other Our Officers Civil and Military, strictly to put in Execution all Laws and Statutes what soever now in Force within Our Kingdom of Great Britain, against such Persons as have Resused, or shall Resuse to take the Oaths Required by Law.

Berne, March 3. N. S. Answers are return'd from all the Cantons, to the Circular Letters they received from hence, concerning the Alterations that Berne defines may be made in the Project of Neutrality for Neutrality most of them advise this Canton to agree to the Project. as it was deliver'd to the French Ambasiador, without infissing any longer upon Amendments. They make it an Argument for acquiescing in the Affair, That the French King has agreed to the Project as now stated; which has been signify'd by his Minister. This Canton hereupon call'd a great Council, and confider d what Instructions they should give their Deputies against the next Diet. In order to which two Points were propos'd; one was That they should send to Count Metternich to know his Sentiments about the Project, and what Terms he was willing to agree to. The fecond, That they should know of him in what manner the King of Prussia and his Al lies would reimburse their Charges in maintaining 4000 Men for the Safety of Neufchatel, with relation to past and future Occasions. The first of these Points was carry'd, and Orders font to the Deputies at Neufchatel to confer with Count Metternich on that Subject; but it was thought fit to defer the Consideration of the second Point 'till a more feafonable Opportunity
