## A PROCLAMATION.

ANNE R.

**W** Hereas we have receiv'd Information, that some Persons have landed from on Board the French Fleet, when it lately appear'd on our Coasts in Scotland in an Hostile manner, threatening an Invasion upon us and our Kingdom. and in particular James Ogilvie the younger of Boyn, Esq; was one of them, who came on Shore from the said Fleet. and now lies conceal'd; we do therefore, by this our Royal Proclamation, fully charge and command all our loving Subjects forthwith to apprehend the said James Ogilvie, or any of the said Persons, and commit him or them for High-Treason: And we do hereby command, That no Person do presume to Receive or Harbour him the said James Ogilvie, or any of them, upon Pain of being proceeded against for High-Treason, according to the utmost Rigour of the Law. And we do hereby further declare, That whoever shall Discover the said James Ogilvie, and shall cause him to be apprehended and brought before any of our Judges, or other chief Magistrates, within any of our Realms and Dominions, shall have a Reward of Three Hundred Pounds Sterling; And whoever shall Discover and Apprehend any of the said other Persons, shall receive a suitable Reward for such his Service.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Twenty Second Day of March, 1707. In the Seventh Year of our Reign.

The following Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers, was presented to Her Majesty by Mr. Daniel Wilkins, accompany'd by several others; Introduced by the Rt Hon. the Earl of Sunderland, one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State.

The humble Address of the Protestant Dissenting Ministers of the several Denominations.

May it please your Majesty.

**O**N the first Advice of the designed Invasion of this your Kingdom, we thought our selves oblig'd, after earnest prayers to God, humbly to address Your Majesty, to signify our deep Repentment of the Attempt of the Pretender; whose usurp'd Title can no more recommend him to the British Nation, than his Religion, and the Power that supports him.

Nor can we forbear to express the utmost Abhorrence of the Presumption of the French King, who takes upon him to impose Princes of his own forming upon other Nations, and having oppress'd and enslav'd his own.

We are so entirely in the Principles of the late happy Revolution, That we account the British Monarchy, and the Blessing of your Majesty's Reign; too valuable to omit any thing that lies in our Power for the Support and Defence of your Royal Person and Government.

While the faithful Alherence of our Brethren of North Britain to your Majesty in this juncture gives us a very particular Satisfaction, we take leave to renew to your Majesty the Assurance of our inviolable Fidelity: And what we say on this Occasion, is not only our own, but the unanimous Sense of the People under our Care, who all own your Majesty's rightful and lawful Title to the Imperial Crown of this Realm; and would be thankful for a greater Capacity, to shew that their Zeal for your Service is not inferior to that of the most approved and loyal of their Fellow-Subjects.

The late Union of England and Scotland, the wise and early Precautions taken by your Majesty and your Council, to prevent the Designs of the Enemy, the prudent and vigorous Resolutions of your Parliament; and above all, your Majesty's pious Dependence on the divine Aid and Protection, from very happy Prefaces of Success and Victory; and

we do hope, That God has reserved for your Majesty the

Honour of effectually securing the Protestant Succession at Home, of advancing the Interest of the reformed Churches Abroad, and of completing the Recovery of the Liberties of Europe.

That the Great God would continue to guard your Sacred Person, to preserve the Life of your Royal Consort, to bless your Majesty's Counsels and Arms, and those of your Confederates; and that, after a very long and glorious Reign, your Majesty may exchange your Temporal for an Eternal Crown, is the Prayer of your most obedient and faithful Subjects.

**I**T is still fresh in our Memories from what Eminent Danger both our Religious and Civil Rights have been rescu'd, with what a vast Expence of Blood and Treasure they have ever since been as bravely maintain'd; all Persons ought to be entirely satisfy'd with what Steadiness your Majesty has pursu'd these Glorious Ends, since your happy Accession to the Throne, how truly you have always consulted the Interest, Glory and Happiness of your Kingdoms; this has rendred your Majesty's Government a Publick Blessing to your People, and this should firmly unite us all, who have any real value for our Constitution, to make our utmost Efforts for its Preservation: It is the dismal Effects of our Divisions alone that has encourag'd our Enemy to make the present Desperate Attempt upon us; but surely there are none who have the least Notion of the Benefit we enjoy under a free-born English Liberty, but must think it a Cause worth Hazarding our Lives and all we have, to Defend to the last Instance; for what is all we have in the World to be esteem'd, if Popery and a French Power should ever get Dominion over us?

We humbly beg Leave therefore to offer our most earnest Endeavours and Prayers against the Pretender, and all his Adherents; and that your Majesty may long be preserv'd with Glory from all the restless Attempts of the Inveterate Enemy of our State and Nation; and that your Arms may be prosper'd with Success, to bring that Great Disturber of Mankind within due Bounds; that such Signal Victories as Blenheim and Ramilly may again put him in Mind, that the French Sword is not always so fortunate as their Vanity would represent it to be. In Testimony whereof we have unanimously caus'd our Common Seal to be put the 18th Day of March, in the Seventh Year of your Majesty's most Gracious Reign.

**W**HEN We consider that Heaven seems engag'd in defence of Your Majesty, We think We may, with a justifiable Boldness, bid Defiance to all Your Enemies. But when We reflect on the Attempt now on foot, to invade Your Majesty's undoubted Right to these Your Realms, by the French King; in Favour of a Popish Pretender, and with

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what an inconsiderable Force it is beg in from abroad. We conclude it is carry'd on by elevated Hopes from no small Party at home.

May Your Majesty's Justice, by a condign Punishment, timely overtake the Abusers of Your Clemency. And may the great God vouchsafe Your Majesty a long, peaceable, prosperous Reign over Us. So pray Your Majesty's most humbly devoted Subjects.

for the County of Kent, at the Assizes held at Maid-  
stone, March the 16th, 1707-8.

Permit us (most Gracious Sovereign) to renew the  
unfeigned Assurances of our Fidelity and Readiness  
to support your Majesty in the defence of your just Title  
to the Imperial Crown of Great Britain, and in the Main-  
tenance of the Protestant Succession against all your En-  
emies whatsoever, and particularly the Popish Pretender,  
whom the French King is now endeavouring to impose  
upon us. A Design so much to be abhorred by every  
true Subject, that we hope, by the Blessing of God on  
your Majesty's Fleet (so surprizingly set out) and the  
faithful Assistance of your good Subjects, will soon be  
totally put to Confusion, and only crush the Heads of  
those amongst us who have been Traiterous enough to  
encourage it, and are ready to embrace all Opportunities  
of disturbing your Majesty's most happy Reign.

We hope this Trial may give your Majesty an Oppor-  
tunity of knowing who are your undisguis'd sincere Sub-  
jects, whilst we solemnly declare to your Majesty, and  
all the World, That as we have been steady ever since the  
happy Revolution, so we are now firmly and fully re-  
solv'd, at the Expence of our Lives and Fortunes, to  
make good these our repeated Engagements to your Ma-  
jesty, the Glorious Protector of our Laws, Liberties, and

Venice, March 16. Prince Alexander Sobiesky, Son of  
the late King of Poland, is arriv'd here, and resides with  
his Sister, the Electress of Bavaria: That Prince's Equipage  
is preparing against his Journey to Rome; where it is said  
he will be made a Cardinal. Six British Ships are now in  
this Port, one of which call'd the Weston-Gally, has ta-  
ken a French Tartan of six Guns laden. They write  
from Leghorn, That a Dutch Privateer had come in there  
with a French Vessel, in which she had taken 100 Sol-  
diers that were to be transported to Messina. The Fleet  
of British Merchant-men, which lately sail'd from Leg-  
horn, is safely arriv'd at Gibraltar.

Berlin, March 24. His Majesty has sent an Har-  
binger, to order all things to be in a readiness for his Re-  
ception at Carlestad; and 'tis believ'd, the King, after his  
return from the Bath, will go into Holland. The State  
of Guelderland has lately given a Sentence, that the House  
of Deering, which belong'd to the late King William,  
is now the Legal Right of the Princess Dowager of Anhalt,  
Aunt to that Deceas'd Prince, by which Judgment it falls  
to his Majesty of Prussia, to whom that Lady formerly  
resign'd her Title to that Estate. Mr. Gronckaw, who  
is to attend his Grace the Duke of Marlborough this  
ensuing Campaign, has taken his Leave, and sets out to-  
morrow for Hanover, with Dispatches to his Electoral  
Highness; from whence he is to proceed to the Hague.  
Monsieur Seirsdorff, who was sent hither in behalf of the  
Chapter of Cologne, has settled the Affair of Quarters  
with this Court, not only in relation to the time past,  
but also for the next Winter. Count Metternich, Son to  
his Majesty's Minister at Neufchatel, is declar'd one of  
his Chamberlains, and at the same time has obtain'd leave  
to travel. The Court has consented that King Augustus  
shall change the Rout of a third part of those Troops de-  
sign'd for Italy, which are to march through his Coun-  
try; and application will be made to the Imperial Court,  
to admit of their Marching through Tirol. The States General  
having complain'd of certain Difficulties their Merchants  
meet with in the Sale of Salt at Konigsberg; and the British  
Envoy having represented the like inconveniencies which  
those of Great Britain suffer in their Commerce with  
that Place, his Majesty has given directions for the  
more easy dispatch of Strangers, and in order thereunto  
remov'd several Officers of the Town, who have not  
promoted it as much as they were oblig'd by their Sta-  
tions. Letters from Warsaw of the 17th advise, that the  
Grand Chambellan of the Crown had given fresh Orders  
to the Army to be in a readiness to march on the fourth  
of the next Month. An Imperial Courier who arriv'd  
at that time, had a long Conference with him at  
Lemberg; and the Day following hasten'd to the  
Muscovite Army, with Letters from the Emperor to the  
Czar.

Berne, March 17. 1708. Count Metternich has given  
a Memorial to this Canton, which contains in Substance,  
That it is very reasonable Berne should be cas'd of the  
great Charges it has been, and still continues to be at for  
the Defence of Neufchatel, and therefore he proposes a  
Levy of a Body of Troops (without fixing the number)  
to be taken into the King his Master's Service, leaving it  
to them, either to receive such Subsidies as shall be agreed  
upon, and pay the Troops themselves; or else to put  
them into his Master's Pay. He likewise offers it to their  
Consideration, whether they think fit to add any Troops  
of the other Protestant Cantons, to engage them the  
more heartily in the Cause; and asks their Opinion, what  
Number of Men it may be necessary to keep on foot; and  
upon what Terms: He concludes with representing to  
them, the Necessity of having Neufchatel own'd to be  
part of the Helvetic Body, and desiring them to treat of  
these Matters at the Diet of Arrau, which meets on the  
21st Instant. This Memorial having been read Yester-  
day in the Great Council, was refer'd to a select Com-  
mittee, who are to prepare the Instructions of the De-  
puties to be sent to the Diet, which they have not yet  
finish'd.
