Since their Arrival a Project of Neutrality is agents. is agreed upon, which was brought hither Yesterday from Arrau by one of the Deputies of Berne, and is at this Hour under Examination in the great Council, where there appears a general Disposition to ratific it. It contains in Subfance, That Neufchatel shall remain in Neutrality till the General Peace, according to the Treaty of perpetual Alliance with France.

Berlin, March 31. N.S. His Majesty has lately receiv'd the News of the decease of the Margrave of Culmbach, who had some Years before transferr'd to the King all his Pretentions to the Succession of Barieth-Culmbach and Anspach. An Officer was immediately disparch'd to Beverling, where the Margrave died, with Directions for his Interment with all the Solemnity that is due to his Quality. The Court is in Mourning on this Occasion, and the Regiment which the Deceas d Commanded is given to his Eldest Son, who, with his Brother, is at the King's Expence a Student at Utrecht. There are many Pretenders to the Order of the Prussian Eagle, in which there is a Vacancy by his Death; but it is thought it will be given to the Prince of Saxe-Eisenach.
