Whereas the Commons of Great Britain in this present Parliament assembled, have by their Humble Address besought Us, That We would be Graciously Pleased to Use forth Our Royal Proclamation, Requiring all Justices of the Peace, Magistrates, and other Officers, to use their utmost Endeavours, and by frequent Meetings for that Purpose, strictly to put in Execution the Act made in this present Session of Parliament, For the better Recruiting Our Land-Forces and the Marines, for the Service of the Year 1708: We have therefore thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy-Council, and in pursuance of the said Address, to Issue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby strictly Charging and Commanding all and every the several and respective Justices of the Peace of every County, Riding, Liberty and Place, within this Our Kingdom of Great Britain, and every Mayor and other Head Officer and Officers of any City or Town-Corporate within this Realm, who are Qualify'd by the above-mention'd Act to put the same in Execution, That they do for that Purpose frequently Meet in such manner as the said Act does prescribe, and do every way from time to time that the said Act does Authorize and empower them to do, for the better Recruiting Our said Land-Forces and the Marines. And we do hereby further, at the Desire of Our said Commons, strictly Charge and Command all Officers of Our said Forces in all Parts of Great Britain, not to Refuse to Receive and List any Person or Persons who shall be any way fit for Our Service, and shall either Offer themselves, or be brought to them for that Purpose. And We do by this Our Proclamation likewise declare, That We will show Our utmost Displeasure to such Officers as shall, for Money or other Pretence, Dismiss any Person so Listed, or shall otherwise Neglect, or be Wanting in their Duty.

Given at our Court at St. James's the First Day of April, 1708. In the Seventh Year of our Reign.

Venice, March 30. N. S. We hear from Naples, that 10000 Imperial Horse are march'd to the Abruzzo. At the Request of the Pope those Forces are to advance by Ascoli in Romagna, where they are to be furnish'd with all necessary Provisions, for which the Country is to receive punctual Payments. Most of the French Prisoners

of Quality are Transported with these Troops, in order to be confin'd in several Castles in the Milanese. Letters from Rome of the 24th say, that an Expres was at that time arriv'd there from the pretended Prince of Wales to the Pope, wherein he gave him an ample Account of the intended Expedition into Scotland, the great Preparations made for it in France, and the numerous Adherents expected in Great Britain. Upon receiving this Advice, the Colleges of the Nations of England, Scotland and Ireland order'd public Prayers for the Success of that Undertaking.

Vienna, March 31. N. S. This Day the Prince of Lichtenstein and Count Traun, who are deputed by his Imperial Majesty to assist at the Diet of Hungary, began their Journey to Presburg; General Heister set out some Days before for the same Place, to take upon him the Command of the Army in Hungary. That Body of the Hungarian Malecontents which lately took the Fort of Capuwar by Capitulation, after having demolish'd it, have march'd to Scharawar, with a Design to attack that Castle. They continue their Preparations at Hatwan, and seem to have in their View some considerable Enterprize; the Country is summon'd to bring in 500 Waggon, and 6000 Portions of Bread are demanded of the Island of Ratzenmarkt. Some Boats that were going up the River from Buda and Gran were attack'd by a Party of Malecontents near to Nefmil, but Part of 'em were sav'd by retiring behind a small Island, and Part by returning to Gran. The Domesticks and Equipage of the Princets of Wolfenbuttle are on their Journey for Italy.

Berlin, April 7. N. S. Monsieur Pacheco, Envoy Extraordinary from his Portugueze Majesty to the King of Prussia, has had his public Audience of the King according to the Establish'd Ceremony, to congratulate his Accession to the Regal Dignity, and is to return very suddenly to the Hague. Many Informations have been given to this Court against the Magistrates of Aix la Chapelle, relating to the Money which was sent thither for the Payment of the Brandenburg Troops. The Officers of that Place are accus'd of betraying that Treasure to the French, and shewing 'em a way to carry it off in the Night. The King has sent Mr. Karz to examine into this Affair, who is instructed, if certain Allegations are made out, to demand Satisfaction. Upon the Solicitation of his Electoral Highness of Hanover, who acts herein in Conjunction with the King of Sweden, his Majesty has order'd two Regiments of Horse, one of Dragons, and three Battalions of Foot to March towards Hamburg. They are to Rendezvous at Lintzen, from whence they are to March and join the Troops of Sweden and Brunswick, with which Courts the King enters into an Alliance, for quieting the Troubles of that City. Monsieur Gurken is Commission'd to settle matters for the carrying on all necessary Operations, with Directions at the same time to endeavour to compose things amicably, before they proceed to Force. The first Minister of the Duke of Mecklenberg is arriv'd here, in order to inform himself of the Intentions of this Court relating to Hamburg, to the Territories of which his Master's Dominions are contiguous, and has receiv'd full Satisfaction in that Particular. Letters from Warsaw of the 27th of the last Month say, that an Agreement is made with the Partizans of King Stanislaus, that the Palatine of Kiow shall resign his Office of Grand-Marshal of the Crown to Monsieur Siniowsky. They write from Wilda of the 25th of the same Month, that King Stanislaus was receiv'd in that Place with great Satisfaction of the People; and that the Magistrates had presented him with the Keys of their Gates.

Hague, April 13. N. S. It is said his Grace the Duke of Marlborough will return for England within few Days. The Account of the Return of the French Fleet into Dunkirk is confirm'd; and according to the Advices we have receiv'd this Day, the pretended Prince of Wales arriv'd there on the seventh Instant. Monsieur d'Auverquerque is very much Indispos'd at Brussels.
