We beg Leave to assure your Majesty of our steady and firm Resolutions, to defend your Majesty's Person and Government, with our Lives and Fortunes, against the Pretender and all other your Majesty's Enemies, and to give such Proof of our Loyalty in this Juncture, as may convince your Majesty how false and groundless any malicious Innuitions to the contrary are, which have been made by those who are Enemies to the Peace and Quiet of your Majesty's happy Reign; which we pray Almighty God may be long and prosperous.

A Popish Pretender is such a Contradiction to your Majesty's Right, and to the Holy Religion which
