Malaga, Dec. 29. Sir Thomas Allen with a squadron of his men of war having been ranging the coasts of Barbary and Spain, found none of the Turks to relift him, he has lately sent in hither two prizers one a Portuguez laden with Mafts, the other an English ship, both of them retaken from the Enemy, they left Sir Thomas in chace of a Turks man of war and visibly gaining upon him, so that tis believed he could hardly escape. Five French men of war are cruifing off of Cape de Gaeta 3 most of the Turks men of war are cruising without the Streights, whom if the Levant wind continues, Sir Thomas intends to look after, or otherwife to expect their return, their provisions and time being neer our.

Gadis, Mn. 12. We have yet no certainty of the return of our New Spain Fleet, but its believed they may atsend the arrival of the Gallions at Havana, to return home in their company, and if fo, they cannot at soonest be expected before the end of March; we have some jealoufie lest the Turks of Algiers (who are said to have about 25 sail of ships abroad, shost of them in these seas) may have some design upon this expected Fleet, which has put us to a more then usual expence in hiring 5 lusty Merchant ships, viz. The Zealand Convoy arrived here the 30th past, and fince on the geb instant the Convoy from Rotterdam that f om Hambourg came in the oth instant, and there is now in view before this Bay a Fleet of 22 fail of thips from Rotterdam, which may this evening put into this Port.

The Mary Rose Reer Admir'al Kempthorne came in hi her the 30 past, having the day before had a strarp dif-pute with 7 Turks Men of War for 3 or 4 hours, in which he brought their Admiral, Vice Admiral and another by the Lee, and forced them to quit the fight to repair their harts, which were very confiderable. Reer Admiral Kempthornes, who behaved himself with much Conduct and Gallantty im this action, is here ordering the refitting of his ship, having had his Main mast and Mizen mast lamed, and all his Yards disabled belonging to his Main mast, Fore mastrand both the Top masts; 12 men killed and 18 wounded.

The inhabitants about Presbourg were during the late frost in great fear of the Turks, who had deawn together a confiderable ft ength from Mewhaufell, with an intention to have taken the advantage of the frost to pass the River 1868; but the weather suddenly changing prevented them in their design, and eased the people of their sears.
