Vienna, April 18. N. S. The Government having discover'd, from the Examination of some Hungarian Prisoners, that Incendiaries have been sent abroad with Orders to set on Fire several Houses in different Corners of this Town, a narrow search has been made these two Days past after all Strangers that can give no good Account of themselves; and Orders have been given to the Inhabitants of the Town and Suburbs to keep a strict Watch over their

Some Days ago there pass'd by this Place a great Number of Boats for Hungary, laden with all sorts of Grain, to be distributed in the Magazines of Presburg, Javarin and Comorra, for the Subsistence of the Imperial Army.

General Heister, at the Head of some Dragoons and Hussars, has given Chace to the Malcontents that block'd up Ebenfurt and Oedenburg, and is since return'd thither.

Letters from Alba Regalis of the 29th of the last Month bring Advice, That on the 24th a Detachment of the Garrison, reinforce'd by some Citizens, had sallied out upon the Hungarians who kept that Place block'd up, and that having surpriz'd their Advanc'd Guard, they kill'd several of them, and put the rest to flight. They who fled had not time in the Surprize to mount on Horseback, but left as Præy to the Garrison 122 Horses, three Standards and some few Prisoners. There are Advices from the Frontiers of Moravia, That the Hungarians have made an Inroad there in two several Places; That they have plunder'd about nine Villages, set Fire to others, and carry'd off all the Booty they could find.

Vienna, April 25. N. S. On the 23d Instant about 10 a Clock at Night the Marriage between the King of Spain and the Princess of Wolfenbuttel was solemniz'd at a Country Church call'd St. Mary Jetzing, which is about a League from this Town, the Emperor standing Proxy for his Catholick Majesty. The Emperor, with the Empress Consort, and Princess, din'd that Day at Schonbrunn, whither the Empress Dowager and the Arch-Duchesses her Daughters went in the Afternoon; and in the Evening the Bride herself set out dress'd in her Wedding Garnment, which, as well as that of the Emperor, was made after the Spanish Fashion. The Procession of the Court to Church was in the following Order:

The Empress Dowager, with her three Daughters, went, as in private, a little before the rest of the Court; in the next place the Emperor, preceded by the chief Ministers of the Court, and follow'd by the Empress and Bride, the latter walking on the Left Hand of the Empress; the Queen's Train was carry'd by the Princess of Lichtenstein, Wife to Prince Anthony of Lichtenstein; the two young Arch-Duchesses, Daughters to the present Emperor, took the next rank. The Emperor, Empress Consort and Bride went into the same Coach, the Bride sitting backwards. When they came to the Church Door, the Bride was conducted in between the two Empresses, the Emperor walking before, and the five Arch-Duchesses in their Ranks after them. The Cardinal of Saxe-Zeits, assisted by four Bishops, perform'd the Ceremony of joining them in Marriage. After the Office of Matrimony was ended, *Te Deum* was sung under a triple Discharge of a Battery of 26 Pieces of Cannon, planted near the Church on purpose for that Solemnity. The Bride was reconducted to her Coach in the same manner that she was brought into Church. At the Church Door she took leave of the Emperor, the Empresses, and the Arch-Duchesses, and went into her Coach attended only by the Princess of Lichtenstein, and lay that Night at a Gentleman's House call'd Haderstorf. The Imperial Court return'd to Schonbrunn, and next day went and din'd with the Queen of Spain at Haderstorf. Most of the Foreign Ministers took leave of the Queen the Day before she left Vienna. The Deputies of the States of Lower Austria, the Ministers of the Imperial Court, and some others, took leave of her Majesty yesterday at Haderstorf. This Morning she continu'd her Journey to Spain; her Mother is to meet her as she passes thro' Bavaria, and there to take leave of her.

The Prince of Lorrain, who has the Care of conducting the Queen, goes no farther than Genoa, where her Catholick Majesty is to be receiv'd by the Officers of King Charles's Court. The Queen has about 500 Persons in her Train, of which 200 are to return from the Place where she takes Ship. Baron Imhoff, the Duke of Wolfenbuttel's Minister, accompanis her Majesty to Spain.

Major-General Palmes arriv'd here last Night.

Hanover, April 27. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough left the Hague on Sunday in the Evening, and arriv'd the next Night at Almelo, on Tuesday at Schape, Wednesday at Diepedau, and yesterday in the Evening came to this Place, Prince Eugene having join'd my Lord Duke at the last Stage. At Night their Highnesses had Audience of the Elector, the Electress and Prince Electoral, from whence they were both conducted to Apartments in the Court. They have this Day been in Conference with the Ministers.

Hague, May 4. N. S. On Sunday in the Afternoon the Conferences ended at Hanover. Prince Eugene went immediately for Vienna, intending to take the

Way of Dresden, in Order to treat with King Augustus to send some of his Troops to the Rhine or the Moselle. My Lord Duke of Marlborough left Hanover on Monday Morning, and arriv'd here Yesterday in the Evening.

Hague, May 7. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough sets out from this Place to Day, and will lye to Night at Moerdyke, to Morrow at Antwerp; Wednesday at Ghent, where he will stay all Thursday, and go on Friday to Brussels; 'tis intended we shall take the Field on the 17th. This Morning at the Hague the President of the Assembly of the States came with their Compliments to my Lord Duke, and to wish his Grace a successful Campaign: He had the like from all the Foreign Ministers and Persons of Distinction.

We have repeated Advices, that the Elector of Bavaria is to Command on the Moselle, and will set out within few days towards those parts. They write from Paris, that the Army in Flanders will be under the Command of the Duke of Burgundy; and that the Duke of Berry and the Pretended Prince of Wales will make the Campaign. 'Tis said the Duke of Berwick will be at the Head of the Troops on the Rhine, and Marechal Villars be sent into Dauphine.

Moerdyke, May 8. Yesterday His Grace the Duke of Marlborough came hither by Water from Rotterdam, and met in his Passage Part of the Fleet with our Transports, and to his great Satisfaction has since heard of their safe Passage and Landing.

Whitehall, April 30. Her Majesty has been pleas'd to appoint the Earl of Rivers General of the Horse, and the Duke of Northumberland Major-General of Her Majesty's Forces. Sir Philip Meadows, Jun. Knt. and Thomas Broderick, Esq; are constituted Comptrollers for the Accounts of the Army; Sir John Stanley, Bar. is Commissioner of the Customs, in the room of Thomas Hall, Esq; Craven Peyron, Esq; has the Employment of Warden of the Mint, upon the Removal of Sir John Stanley; and Thomas Hall, Esq; is made Comptroller of the Salt, in the room of the abovenam'd Thomas Broderick, Esq; James Cardonnel, Esq; is appointed Commissioner for the Duties on Salt. Sir Charles Turner, Bar. is of the Commission for Trade and Plantations, in the Room of George Stepney, Esq; Deceas'd. Richard Martin, Esq; is one of the Commissioners for executing the Authorities and Powers granted by Act of Parliament touching Duties arising upon stamp'd Vellum, Parchment and Paper. Extract of a Letter from Capt. George Rogers, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Seaford, dated in Dublin Bay the 20th of April, 1768.

On the 16th I receiv'd their Excellencies Orders to sail for Chester-water, and Convoy such Ships as were ready to sail to this Port, and on the 17th near Holyhead I met with a French Privateer of St. Malo, Capt. Grand Maison, with ten Guns, 74 Men, which I took and brought into this Port. He had been out 13 Days and had taken no other Purchase than a small Coal Bark, which he burnt two Days before I took him.
