1. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury hereby give notice that Tenders will be received at the Chief Cashier's Office, at the Bank of England on Friday the 8th September 1967, at 1 p.m. for Treasury Bills to be issued under the Treasury Bills Act, 1877, the National Debt Act, 1889, and the National Loans Act, 1939, to the amount of £260,000,000.

2. The Bills will be in amounts of £5,000, £10,000, £25,000, £50,000 or £100,000. They will be dated at the option of the tenderer on any business day from Monday the 11th September to Saturday the 16th September 1967, inclusive, and will be due 91 days after date.

3. The Bills will be issued and paid at the Bank of England.

4. Each Tender must be for an amount not less than £50,000 and must specify the date on which the Bills required are to be dated, and the net amount per cent. (being an even multiple of one penny) which will be given for the amount applied for. Separate Tenders must be lodged for Bills of different dates.

5. Tenders must be made through a London Banker, Discount House or Broker.

6. Notification will be sent by post on the same day as Tenders are received, to the persons whose

Tenders are accepted in whole or in part and payment in full of the amounts due in respect of such accepted Tenders must be made to the Bank of England by means of cash or by draft or cheque drawn on the Bank of England not later than 1.30 p.m. (Saturday 11 a.m.) on the day on which the relative Bills are to be dated.

7. Members of the House of Commons are not precluded from tendering for these Bills.

8. Tenders must be made on the printed forms which may be obtained from the Chief Cashier's Office, Bank of England.

9. The Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury reserve the right of rejecting any Tenders.

HIGHWAYS ACT 1959

The Llandilo—Carmarthen Trunk Road (St. Peter's Street and Church Lane, Carmarthen Detrunking) Order, 1967.

The Secretary of State hereby gives notice that he has made an Order under section 7 of the above Act providing that a length of the Llandilo—Carmarthen Trunk Road which has been superseded shall cease to be a trunk road as from the date of the coming into operation of the Order, (when the County Council of Carmarthen will become the highway authority responsible for that length).

Copies of the Order, the title of which is "The Llandilo—Carmarthen Trunk Road (St. Peter's Street and Church Lane, Carmarthen Detrunking) Order, 1967", (S.I. 1967 No. 1185) can be purchased, price 5d., either through any bookseller, or direct from any branch of Her Majesty's Stationery Office.

Copies of the Order and of the relevant plan have been deposited at the Welsh Office, Roads Division, Graham Buildings, Newport Road, Cardiff, where they are open to inspection free of charge at all reasonable hours. Certified copies have also been deposited at the offices of the County Council of Carmarthen, County Hall, Carmarthen, where they are similarly open to inspection.

Any person aggrieved by the Order and desiring to question the validity thereof, or of any provision contained therein, on the grounds that it is not within the powers of the Highways Act 1959, or on the ground that any requirement of that Act, or of regulations made thereunder, has not been complied with in relation to the Order, may, within six weeks from 1st September 1967, apply to the High Court for the suspension or quashing of the Order or of any provision contained therein.
