The Queen has been graciously pleased, on the advice of Her Majesty's Canadian Ministers, to approve the award of the British Empire Medal for Gallantry (Military Division) to the undermentioned:

226126 Corporal George John Metka, C.D., Royal Canadian Air Force.

An Air Canada DC 8 aircraft crashed at Uplands Airport, Ottawa, killing all three crew members and totally demolishing the aircraft. In response to a crash alarm Corporal Metka went immediately to the burning and exploding wreckage and on his own initiative immediately entered the burning wreckage and began a search for survivors, working with bare hands and in shirt sleeves. At one point, a sizeable explosion occurred in the area of the front undercarriage. In spite of this hazard as well as other small explosions that were occurring, and the possismall explosions that were occurring, and the possibility of a gas tank explosion, Corporal Metka proceeded with his self-assigned task of searching the wreckage, and was personally responsible for the recovery of the remains of the three crew members before they were consumed by fire. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, and clearly showing that his concern for others was far greater than for himself, Corporal Metka worked in a most efficient and thorough manner throughout the evening efficient and thorough manner throughout the evening of the crash, although in the course of his efforts, his hands were burned. Corporal Metka displayed conspicuous courage and outstanding devotion to duty.
