On the 22d the Army march'd to Offois, where his Royal Highness receiv'd Advice, That the French had abandon'd Modene. A Detachment was immediately made to take Possession of that Post, which was perform'd; and the next Day the whole Army mov'd thither, continuing their March to St. Jean de Morienne. At the Approach of his Royal Highness the French reind out of Savoy, part towards the Country of Gex, and pir towards Fort Barraux. General Schulemberg, who pis'd through the Tarentaise to join his Royal Highness, made the Regiment of Durfort Prisoners of War on his March, and routed another Party, in which were kill'd the Lieutenant-Colonel and 60 Men of the Regiment of the Lieutenant-Colonel and 60 Men of the Regiment of the Melitia of Bugey and Valromey were possed along the khone, and those of the Country of Gexwere order d to be in a Readiness at the first Alarm.
