*Lisbon, July 28. N. S.* The Marquis de Frontera having receiv'd Intelligence, that the Forces of Andalusia were march'd to *Cadix*, and only one Regiment of Foot, and one of Horse, left upon that Frontier, made an In-cursion with four Regiments of Horse and four of Foot, into the Spanish Territories. Upon his Approach the Governor of *Alqueria* surrender'd that Fort, where he had a Garrison of 200 Men; and 13 Pieces of Cannon. Our Horse advanc'd into the County of *Nicbla*, plunder'd se-

veral Towns and Villages, and exacted 10000 Crowns from *Gibraltar*, as also great Sums from other Places; besides which, they have brought away a vast quantity of Oxen and Mules, which were very much wanted in this Country, and will be of great use in the ensuing Campaign.

*Venice, August 3. N. S.* Letters from Rome say, that the Pope continues with all imaginable diligence to augment his Troops, and to raise Money for the Payment of them. He publishes frequent Edicts to invite the People to bring their Plate and Cash into the Mint; for which he gives Demands upon his Treasury bearing extraordinary Interest. He has also issued a Proclamation, whereby the Clergy, as well as Laymen are oblig'd to give an exact account of all their Revenue in the Ecclesiastical State, within a Month from the Date of that Edict; in order to their being Taxed in proportion to their Income; upon which several Persons of distinction have brought in large Sums of Money by way of voluntary Gift, and others have undertaken to raise Men at their own Expence. The Emperor hath sent a Circular Letter to the Cardinals that reside at Rome, and in each Letter a Manifesto, Printed at Vienna; explaining his Imperial Majesty's Reasons for what has been lately acted in Italy by the Imperial Troops; whereupon the Pope hath held a general Congregation, wherein that Manifesto hath been examin'd, and resolv'd that an Answer be sent to his Imperial Majesty by an Express: They write from Naples, that Cardinal Grimani renders himself every Day more acceptable to the People, by his great application in reforming several Abuses, especially in the Courts of Justice.

*Vienna, August 4. N. S.* The Hungarians having laid Siege to *Neustertel* on the *Waag*, Marshal Heister march'd on the 27th of the last Month, with the Imperial Army from *Presburg*, in order to raise the Siege; and 'tis said, the Hungarian Troops which had invested the Place, repass'd the *Waag* upon the Approach of the Germans. The Hungarian Parties have lately made another Inroad into *Sileisia*, where they have committed great Disorders to the utter Ruin of the Inhabitants. Prince *Ragotzi* and Count *Berczeni* are encamp'd near the Banks of the *Waag*, with an Army of 30000 Men; and 'tis thought they may be inclin'd to hazard a Battle before the Arrival of the Danish Succours, which are now very soon expected. On *Wednesday* last the Emperor went to *Laxemburg*, to review Prince *Eugene's* Regiment of Dragoons in their Passage to *Hungary*. They had Orders to march to *Oedenburg*, but have been oblig'd to make an halt, upon Advice that the Hungarians, on this side the *Danube*, were moving towards the Frontiers of *Austria*. The Bishop of *Munster's* Envoy received, some Days ago, the Investiture of that Bishoprick. And yesterday the *Electors* Palatine's Ministers receiv'd the Investiture of the Fees in the *Upper Palatinate*, which are held of the Crown of *Bohemia*.

*Berne, August 8. N. S.* The Detachment of about 9 or 10000 Men which the *Electors* of *Hanover* has made towards the *Black Forest*, and a quantity of Warlike Necessaries, which are put into *Rhinfelden* very lately, have alarm'd the French, and make them fear the Allies have a Design to pass the *Rhine* and the *Swiss* Territories, in order to enter the *Upper Alsatia*, and from thence penetrate into *Franche Comté*. Accordingly Monsieur de *St. Colombe*, who is Secretary to Monsieur de *Puisieux*, and acts as Minister of France, 'till the Arrival of a new Ambassador, has written a Letter to this Canton upon that Subject. The Canton has return'd an Answer in general Terms to Monsieur de *St. Colombe's* Letter; wherein they assure him, that they will punctually perform all their Alliances and Engagements; but say, the Affair he writes about does concern the whole *Helvetic Body*, and therefore desire him to apply to it in general, that they may consult together about proper Measures to be taken, in case the Allies should attempt to pass through their Territories. The Letters from *Geneva* of Yesterday, say, That the *Duke of Savoy*, after having drawn the greatest part of the *Franch* Troops into *Savoy*, is turn'd back by the *Col de la Roue*, and the *Valley of Bardonnache*; and having made himself Master of *Mount Genevre*, is preparing to besiege *Exilles* and *Fenestrelles*, which can hardly be reliev'd but by *Mount Genevre*, where his Royal Highness has posted about 6000 Men strongly intrench'd; and 12 Pieces of Cannon; at the same time the *Duke* has left 5000 Men in *Savoy* at *St.*

Julien en Mortenne, to hinder the Enemy from drawing all their Forces from that Country against him.

From the Camp at Helchin, August 16. N. S. On Monday the 13th Instant, the Day the Town of Lille was Invested, the Prince of Savoy order'd 12000 Peasants, who were summon'd from the Country some days before, to begin immediately to work on the Lines of Circumvallation, which are in so good a forwardness, that his Highness has sent to Menin for the Train of Artillery to be brought from thence to-morrow for the Siege; and all the Preparations are carrying on with vigour equal to the greatness of the Undertaking. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough has order'd Lieutenant-General Withers to March to-morrow Morning, with a Detachment of 3000 Foot, and 1000 Horse, to take Post near Templeuve, to cover the March of the Train against any Attempt, either from the Garrison of Tournay, or the Duke of Berwick's Army, which continues encamp'd near Mortagne; as, according to our last Advices, the Duke of Burgundy does near Ghent. On Tuesday in the Evening Count Legnaffo and Major-General Schulemberg came hither with a Compliment from King Augustus, as did also Monsieur Schiven from the Landgrave of Hesse, to acquaint his Grace with their Arrival at Brussels, with a design to pass part of the Campaign in the Army, and at the Siege; the two latter went back Yesterday Morning to inform their Masters of the care that is taken for their Escort on the Road, and both the Princes are expected here this Evening, or to-morrow Morning.

London, August 17. N. S. The Queen of Portugal arriv'd at Rotterdam at 10 of the Clock before Noon on Wednesday last. There are Advices that the King of Sweden hath forc'd the Intrichments of the Muscovites; in which Action great Numbers of them were kill'd. Some Letters from Vienna advise, That the Malecontents in Hungary have been defeated by General Heister. By our last Letters from Spain, we hear that the Duke of Orleans had dispers'd his Troops into Quarters of Refreshment; and that he had lost great Numbers by Dittempers arising from the excessive Heat.

London, August 10. Letters from Dover say, That Sir George Bing was come in thither, and having taken with him the Transports, in which the Dragoons were embark'd, had again set Sail towards the Coast of France.
