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Windsor, August 24.

THE following Addresses have been presented to the Queen, congratulating Her Majesty on the Glorious Victory obtain'd over the French near Audenarde, by the Forces of Her Majesty and Her Allies, commanded by his Grace the Duke of Marlborough.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, and other the Burgesses of Her Majesty's antient Borough of Wilton in the County of Wilts; presented to Her Majesty by Sir Lambert Blackwell, one of their Representatives in Parliament, introduced by his Excellency the Earl of Pembroke, Lord-Lieutenant for the said County of Wilts.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Bailiffs, Common-Council, and Burgesses of the Borough of Monmouth; presented to Her Majesty by Clayton Milborne, Esq; their Representative in Parliament, introduced by the Lord Treasurer.

Both which Addresses Her Majesty receiv'd very graciously.

Berne, August 22. N. S. Our Letters which arriv'd this Morning from the Duke of Savoy's Camp, bring us the following Account. On the 7th Monsieur Rhebinder, General of the Artillery, receiv'd Orders to March with a Body under his Command from Vachette to Sezanne; at the same time his Royal Highness commanded that all the Works on the Col des Echelles should be blown up, and the Ways on that side made impracticable. On the 8th the Army broke up from Bardouache, and encamp'd at Oulx. Monsieur de St. Remis, a Lieutenant-General, continued with 10 Battalions upon the Col de la Roue, and at Bardouache, waiting for Orders to attack the Double Redoubt which the Enemy had made on the Col de Fenestrelle. On the 9th Monsieur de St. Remis sent intelligence, that the Enemy at his Approach had abandon'd their two Redoubts, having burnt the one and blown up the other. Orders were sent to Lieutenant-General St. Remis to march from the Col de la Roue and Bardouache, and join our Camp at Oulx; from whence were detach'd, at the same time, five other Battalions towards Exilles, under the Command of Lieutenant-General de Regal, in order to cover the Siege of that Place, against the Avenues from the higher Grounds. That General sent Advice, he had that Day drawn the first Parallel Line, and that the Cannon of Suza being arriv'd the Day before, he was then battering the Place. We receiv'd Advice from the Enemy, that the Marshal de Villars arriv'd at Briançon on the Evening of the 8th Instant. Major-General Schuylenbourg was likewise detach'd towards Exilles, to cover the Siege on the side of Mount Cenis. The Marquis d'Andouze, Son of the Marquis de Parelle, was sent out with 1000 Foot, in order to oblige the Vaudois of the Valley of St. Martin, who had thrown themselves under the Protection of France, to return to their Obedience. On the 10th, General Rhebinder march'd with his Detachment to Rouilliers and Chancelas, to cover the Valley of Pragelas, and cut off the E-

nemy from Fenestrelle. Monsieur Pannewif, Major-General of the Prussians, had Orders, with six Battalions, to possess himself of the Posts near Sezanne. On the 11th his Royal Highness, attended by some General Officers, went to visit the Posts at Sezanne, which had been taken under the Command of General Rhebinder. Soon after, the Enemy began to charge our Advanc'd Guards with so great numbers, that we were obliged to retire, which we did in very good Order, making frequent Stands, facing and firing upon the Enemy; but seeing the Enemy, who charg'd our advanc'd Guard, join'd by great Reinforcements, and marching towards us in two Columns; it was thought fit to quit our Posts on that side of the Doire, and retire over the Bridge. The six Battalions under Major-General Pannewif, retreated also towards the Foot of the Mountain; which being observ'd by the Enemy, they form'd their Infantry as they came up into Order of Battel, and towards the Evening made a Body of 37 Battalions. His Royal Highness observing this great superiority of the Enemy in that Post, and apprehending more of their Troops might arrive to Charge our Battalions, which were dispers'd in different Stations, or that they might place themselves between Oulx and Sezanne, gave Orders to Major-General Pannewif to quit the Post of Sezanne, and March in the Night with his six Battalions to the Camp of Oulx, which was done accordingly. General Rhebinder had, at the same time, Orders to direct his March again towards the Valley of Pragelas. On the 12th his Royal Highness march'd with his Army from Oulx. At his Approach near Exilles, there was so great a Breach made, that the Commanding Officer beat a Parley in the Evening, and surrender'd himself and Garrison Prisoners of War. On the 13th in the Morning the Garrison march'd out, and his Royal Highness receiv'd Advice, that the Fort of la Perouse, where there had been a Garrison of the Enemy, was possess'd by his Royal Highness's Troops; and that the Valley of St. Martin had submitted to his Obedience. The Army march'd this Day to Chamont. On the 14th our Army march'd to Cheanne, and at the departure of the Courier with these Advices, they were continuing their March to Fenestrelles, where General Rhebinder was before arriv'd with his Detachment, and had possess'd himself of several advantageous Posts. His Royal Highness left the Baron de Regal at Exilles, to command there with 10 Battalions; and repair the Breaches. It is computed, the Marquis d'Andouze, who took the Forts of la Perouse, and of the Valley of St. Martin, had made in those Places 900 Prisoners of War.

From the Camp at Amougies, Aug. 27. N. S. On Wednesday the 22d, between 7 and 8 in the Evening, the Trenches were opened before Lille on the Right and Left of the Lower Deule; the former by Mr. des Roques, and the other by Mr. Dumey, chief Engineers. Four thousand Workmen were commanded for this Service, cover'd by ten Battalions of the Imperial, Palatin and Hessian Troops, commanded by Lieutenant-General Wike and Major-General Volkershoven; ten Battalions more and six hundred Horse were ready to sustain them, but the

the Trenches were carry'd on with so good Success, that our Men had above two hours time to cover themselves before the Enemy perceived them; they then made a great Fire from the Town, but with so little effect that we lost only three Men. The 23d the Trenches were relieved by Lieutenant-General Pettendorff, and Majors-General Töcken and Soble, with ten Imperial Battalions and a thousand Workmen at each Attack; the Parallel was considerably extended both on the Right and Left, and a large Redoubt made against the Porte de Magdelaine, a new Parallel was likewise advanc'd on the Right, with a Communication of 360 Paces, and in the Center a Battery was begun for 350 Pieces of Cannon, against the Bastion on the Right of the Porte de Magdelaine. This Night Lieutenant-General Pettendorff missing his Way between the two Attacks, was taken Prisoner and carried into the Town. Our Loss hitherto does not amount to fifteen Men. The 24th Lieutenant-General Sparr reliev'd the Trenches, with Major-General Collyer, Brigadiers Wassenar and Keppel, and five Battalions at each Attack. About 9 at Night a Disposition was made to attack a House the Enemy were possess'd of on our Right, but finding it was encompass'd with a broad and deep Ditch, it was thought more expedient to cut it off with the Parallel; which was advanc'd so near by Midnight, that the Captain who commanded and fourscore of the Enemy retir'd into the Town, leaving only a Sergeant and twenty Men, who retir'd likewise at Break of Day. At 10 at Night our Men attack'd a Chappel on the Left, where the Enemy had taken Post, and carry'd it in less than an Hour; the two Captains who were in it were kill'd, with a Lieutenant and thirty Men; the rest, being three subaltern Officers and ninety six Granadiers, were made Prisoners. This Night a new Communication of about 380 Paces was advanced on the Right, and a small Battery of 4 six Pounders rais'd, to beat the Enemy out of a Redoubt in the Inundation on that side. On the Left we advanc'd a new Communication of 600 Paces, which took in the Chappel our Men attack'd. The kill'd and wounded of these 24 Hours amount to about 80, among the former was a Lieutenant of the Artillery, and of the latter a Captain of Foot. The 25th the Trenches were reliev'd by the Prince of Holstein-beck, Lieutenant-General, Major-General Zoutland, Sir Richard Temple and Mr. Boiser Brigadiers, with 5 Battalions, and 1000 Workmen at each Attack, and 800 Workmen for the Batteries. As our Workmen were advancing a Parallel on the Right Way near the Enemy's Works, in order to join it with the Deule, they set Fire to a Windmill in which they had put a great quantity of combustible matter, by the Light of which they discover'd our Men and oblig'd us to defer working for two or three Hours. One of our Engineers and a Lieutenant were wounded, with between 30 and 40 Men. The 26th Lieutenant-General Sparr mounted the Trenches, with Major-General Collyer, Brigadiers Wassenar and Du Troffer, with five Battalions for each Attack. About 7 in the Evening the Enemy made a Sally by the Porte de Magdelaine upon our Workmen at the Chappel de Magdelaine, whom they put at first into some Disorder; but the Troops appointed to sustain them coming to their Relief, and several Battalions filing out of the Trenches to receive them, the Enemy endeavour'd to make an orderly Retreat; but the Fire of our Battalions put them into great Confusion, and kill'd several of their Men. Of our Troops that sustain'd them, Captain Maure of the Dutch Guards was wounded, and a Lieutenant of the Artillery kill'd on this Occasion, and 10 private Men kill'd and wounded. At break of Day the Besieg'd sent out a Trumpet to enquire for a Captain that was missing, who is suppos'd to be thrown in among the Fascines. This Night the Parallel on the Right was extended on the Left to the Deule, and on the Right within 150 Paces of the Covered Way of the Horn-work, near the Porte St. André. On the Left the Parallel was extended within 200 Paces of the Horn-work of the Porte de Magdelaine, and a Branch of 100 Paces advanced from the Center. The

kill'd and wounded during the last 24 Hours amount to less than 25. The 27th early in the Morning 44 Pieces of Cannon began to fire from the grand Battery in the Center, together with two other Batteries, one of 13 and the other of 11 Pieces, to batter in breach the Faces of the two Bastions between the Horn-works of the Porte de Magdelaine and Porte St. André; at the same time a Battery of 12 Mortars and 8 Hawtizers began to play from the Chappel de Magdelaine. The Enemy give out they are resolv'd to attempt the Relief of the Place, and on Saturday the 25th the Duke of Berwick march'd with his Army from Mortagne to Bossu between Condé and Mons, where they halted the 26th and 27th, and are march'd this Morning by Mons towards Soignies. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough had an Account Yesterday, that the Duke of Vendome, having left Mr. De la Motte with a Corps for the Security of Ghent and Bruges, pass'd the Schelde near Ghent at 5 in the Morning, and march'd in 3 Columns towards the Dender, and encamp'd at Portelberg; and his Grace has just now Advice that they are march'd this Day to Ninove, in order to pass that River to Morrow; whereupon Orders are given for our Army to be ready to march upon the firing of 3 pieces of Cannon: Our heavy Baggage is sent to the Artillery, and every thing is in a readiness for it. This Morning one of our Parties, which was sent to get Intelligence of the Enemy, met 100 of their Horse near Lenze, whom they attack'd and defeated; our Men follow'd them through that Town, and about a League further kill'd several of them in the Pursuit, and took 36 Prisoners with their Horses. This Afternoon a great Convoy of Provision is come to the Camp from Aeth.

From the Camp at Helchin, August 30. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, having advice Yesterday, that the Armies commanded by the Dukes of Burgundy and Berwick, were ready to join on either Side the Dender, the former lying at Ninove, and the other near Soignies, His Grace sent a Reinforcement of 600 Men to Aeth: And there being a Convoy of about 700 Waggon's laden with Provision and Ammunition ready to set out from thence for the Army and the Siege, Lieutenant-General Robt was order'd in the Evening with 2500 Horse to cover their March to the Camp; where they arriv'd this Morning; and his Grace having certain Advice, that the Enemies Armies would join on this Side the Dender, whereby they declare their Resolution of not staying in Brabant, our Army thereupon decamp'd from Amougies, and having repass'd the Schelde at Portes and Ecanasse, came to this Camp, with the Right near d'Espiere, and the Left at Avelgheme. His Grace has just now an Account, that the Duke of Berwick pass'd the Dender this Morning at Ninove, and having join'd the Duke of Vendome, all their Troops march'd together in Lessines, in the Way to Tournay; and Orders are given for our Army to be ready to march to Morrow Morning towards the Marque, which River we shall pass, in order to join the Troops that make the Siege, in case the Enemy attempt the raising of it.

From the Camp at Helchin, August 30. N. S. August the 27th the Trenches were reliev'd by Lieutenant-General Wilke, Majors-General Veckenback and Volkerhoven, with 10 Imperial Battalions for the two Attacks. A second Parallel was carry'd on from the Center of the Attack, within 86 Paces of the covered Way, and a Sep began on the Right, with about 120 Gabions. We had 28 private Men kill'd and wounded upon this Day's Duty. The 28th we attack'd a Mill on the right, which the Enemy had entrench'd, and carry'd it with the Loss of a Major and Captain kill'd, and about 50 private Men kill'd and wounded: But as we began the Attack late in the Night, the Light of the Moon, and that of the Morning soon following, hinder'd our Men from making a Lodgment. The 29th, the Trenches were reliev'd by the Prince of Holstein-beck, Lieutenant-General, Major-General Zoutland, and Brigadiers Boilet and Keppel, with 5 Battalions, and 800 Workmen at each Attack, and

400 for the Batteries. Our Works approaching the Mill we attack'd the Night before, the Enemy set Fire to it, and retired. A new Parallel was begun from the Deule, and carry'd on within 80 Paces of the cover'd Way of the Horn-work on the right. We likewise began two new Batteries in the Center of the Attack, one for 10 and the other for 9 Pieces of Cannon, to ruin the Defences, the Breaches appearing very large and low.

Brussels, Sept. 1. N. S. General Fagell is arrived here from Antwerp, and to-morrow will proceed towards the grand Army with a Body of near 8000 Men, taken out of Antwerp and this Place. All our Letters from before Lisle, make mention of a Letter sent to the Prince of Savoy, who found himself indisposed at the opening of it, upon which those who were near his Highness suspecting it might be poison'd, made an Experiment of it upon a Dog, that died upon smelling to it. There are Letters from France which say the Duke of Savoy has taken Fendrelles; and that the Duke of Orleans had made so great Detachments to reinforce the Marshal de Villars, that he was at present unable to Act offensively in Spain.

Offend, Sept. 3. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough being join'd by the Prince of Savoy with the Cavalry that was before Lisle, march'd on the 31st of the last Month to Templeuve, and on Saturday his Grace took the Post at Pont a Tressin on the Marque, to prevent the French Army from relieving Lisle, by passing that River by the way of Orcies. The French have pass'd the Schelde with their whole Army at Tournay, and are now within sight of our Army and of Lisle. A Courier is just now arrived from the Duke of Marlborough's Camp, with advice, that our Army was yesterday in sight of the Enemy, with the Right near Lisle, the Left at Pont a Tressin, and Menin in the Rear. He adds, that the Attack will be made on the Counterscarp of Lisle to-morrow, and that it was thought the Armies might Engage about the same time.

Edinburgh, Aug. 21. On the 19th at Evening came in the Pinder and Queen Anne Gallies of, and for London, with Sugars, &c. from Jamaica, they left that place the same Day with the Antegoa Paquet. There are also come in the Doowell, and Jeremiah and Anne, from Barbadoes with Sugars for London. Yesterday came in the Sarah of and for Topsham from Lisbon, with Oil, &c. and the Friends Adventure of London, from Lisbon, with Salt for this place.

Plimouth, Aug. 22. Yesterday came in the Two Friends for London from Oporto, and Swan from Lisbon for Rowey; the Orford; Exeter, August, Worcester, Salisbury and Dover from the Eastward; St. Philip from Rochel with Salt, taken by the August; and a Dutch Caper with two Prizes. This day came in the Macklesfield and Amy Gallies, both for London from Jamaica.

Tarmouth, Aug. 23. Yesterday came into our Road divers laden Colliers from the Northward, who with a Fleet that came into our Road on the 20th, sail'd to the Southward this Morning.

Cow, Aug. 23. Yesterday past through this Road several English and Dutch Ships from Lisbon, the rest of the Fleet past by the back of this Island; amongst them which went through this Road, there was one from the East, and another from the West-Indies.
