The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas by the Burial Act 1855 (1855 c. 128) it was, amongst other things, enacted that it should be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, from time to time to postpone the time appointed by any Order in Council for the discontinuance of burials, or otherwise to vary any Order in Council made under any of the Acts recited in the said Act, or under the said Act (whether the time thereby appointed for the discontinuance of burials thereunder, or other operation of such Order, should or should not have arrived), as to Her Majesty, with such advice as aforesaid, might seem fit:

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 8th day of February 1890 (hereinafter referred to as "the principal Order") directing the discontinuance of burials in Bovey Tracey Parish Church and Churchyard, in the County of Devon:

And whereas an Order in Council was made on the 28th day of November 1910 varying the principal Order so as to allow the burial of the bodies of members of the Hole family, at their decease, in that portion of the said Churchyard which was added thereto in or about the year 1887 and which is hereinafter referred to as "the Hole Family Burial Place":

And whereas it seems fit to Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that the principal Order as varied should be further varied:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:—

1. The principal Order as varied shall have effect subject to the following exception or qualification, viz.:—

That notwithstanding anything in the said Order the burial may be allowed in the Hole Family Burial Place in the said Churchyard, at their decease, of the bodies of the Reverend George Owen Charles Duxbury and Mrs. Molly Nora Armstrong Duxbury, provided that no part of any
