

The Prince and Landgrave of *Hassia* is gone from hence to *Rome*, his Princes and Son have taken their way towards *Germany*.

On Saturday last the Dutches of *Cori* was brought to bed of a Daughter, in presence of Eight persons and a publick Notary, whom her Husband the Marquis de *Saintinelli* ordered to be present as witnesses of the truth of the birth.

The great Feast which was to have been in *St Marks* place on Thursday last was by reason of the ill weather deferred till the Sunday following, on which day the Bulls are to be hunted in the Court of the Dukes Palace, and afterwards an entertainment to be given to the Ladies and persons of the greatest quality.

Katisbonne, Feb. 18. The diversions of the Carneval have put a stop to all affairs of graver concernment, The 16th instant the Emperours High Commissioner entertained all the rest of the Plenipotentiaries and Deputies from the Electors and Princes of the Empire with an extraordinary Feast and Banquet; the *Brandenbourg* Ministers only absenting themselves upon some contention of precedence which is not yet stated between them and the said Prince and Bishop of *Aichstadt*.

The business of the publick security of the Empire is in the same posture as formerly; the Directors of the College are labouring at a Project to satisfy all interests, and answer all objections arising upon that subject; the greatest obstacles of this affair has been the private quarrels and animosities amongst several Princes, which tis believed may in little time admit of reconciliation; those between the Electors of *Saxony*, *Palatine*, *Mens* and *Triers* being already compoised, and those between other Princes in a fair way to be speedily determined.

Monsieur de *Graville* the French Minister has been received and Treated with much respect and civility at the Court of *Bavaria*, and is by this departed thence for *Newbourg*, intending to return by *Wurtzburg*, and to have some conference with the Elector of *Munich*.

Hambourg, Feb. 28. As yet the Commissioners for the compoising of the differences between the Crown of *Denmark* and the Duke of *Holstein Ploen* have not made any considerable advances in that affair, the Duke having no inclination to part with what he conceives to be his right, as to the succession of *Oldenbourg*, though very considerable overtures have been made to him in lieu of his pretensions.

Letters of the 5th instant from *Stockholme* tell us, that the extremity of the cold which has frozen up for above two Months, all the entrys into the Countrey, has hindered Marshal *Wrangel* from his intended return to that place.

The Senators of the Crown were expected at *Stockholm* the 15th instant to consult about the present concerns of the State.

Letters of the 7th instant from *Warsaw* tell us, that five of the preparatory provincial Diets are broken up with dissatisfaction upon the point of the Kings Marriage, which some persons labour to perswade the people to be dangerous and prejudicial to *Poland*, and the prelude to great and expensive wars. The Dietine of Great *Poland* is also broken, where the contentions amongst the Nobility, were so very great, that frequent Duels passed amongst them, and they were twice obliged to shut up the Church where the Convention was held, to avoid greater and more general disturbances. The Bishop of *Cracovia* endeavouring, but in vain to exhort them to a more quiet temper.

The King being informed of the departure of his Royal Spouse with the Empress Dowager, and a Train of near Ten thousand persons from *Vienna*, having first given out fresh Commissions for new Assemblies to be held in the Provinces and Palatinates, whole Diets were by the disunion of the Nobility broken up, left *Warsaw* the 7th instant in the afternoon, and with a great Train of the principal Lords and Officers of the Crown, set for-

wards for *Czenstokow*, having sent before him the Bishop of *Plosko*, to receive the Queen upon the frontiers, and to compliment her in his Majesties name.

From *Leipssa* they write, that the pretended Prince *Cigala* has been removed with a Passport from the Prince Elector of *Saxony*, from thence to *Nuremberg*.

From *Kosloff* they write, that the Post of *Pomerania* was robbed on his way thither, and wounded, and left for dead by two persons who having committed the fact, and thinking themselves secured from discovery by the death of the Post, came with much confidence into *Kosloff*, but the wounded person recovering his senses, and brought into the Town, discoverd the Villains, who were presently apprehended, and may be in little time proceeded against according to justice.

Paris, Mart. 1. His Majesty continues his Resolution of marching this Spring into *Flanders*, but not with that number of foot guards as was at first designed, intending only 50000 continuance in those parts.

Here is lately arrived a Courier from Cardinal de Retz, who is intrusted with the management of the French concerns in the Conclave, with Letters to his Majesty, giving him an account of all his affairs there, but as yet no prospect can be taken of the Election. The faction of the *Chigi* appears to have most prevalency, and Cardinal d'Elci the person they seem most inclined to promote to this high Dignity, but tis believed also, the other faction may be powerful enough to exclude him.

The Arch-Bishop of *Thoulose*, formerly Bishop of *Beziers*, his most Christian Majesties Ambassadour to the Court of *Spain*, has been desired by the Queen Regent not to take his way by *Saragosa* the place where *Don Juan* keeps his Residence, whereupon he has altered his intended course taking the way of *Valence*.

The Marquis de *Chatillon*, his Majesties Lieutenant in *Roussillon* has ordered the Governor of *Ville Franchoise* in the County of *Cansians*, to be sent Prisoner to *Perpignan*, for delivering up 15 Bandits which he had Prisoners in his Castle, to a greater number of those Robbers who surprised him in the night, and by threats obliged him to set at liberty their Companions.

The people of *Cansians* in *Roussillon* having disorderly got together and killed 14 persons, who where there over-severely leavying the Taxes layd upon them, His Majesty has ordered the Count de *Chamilli* his Lieutenant General to march thither with 4000. men to reduce them to obedience, and to search out and punish the principal offenders of that disorder.

Deal, Feb. 26. Two days since arrived in the Downs a Fleet of about Eighty sail of Merchants Ships from several parts, and since about Forty sail more, whereof Twelve from the *Streights*.
