 Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Minister of Housing and Local Government that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in St. Peter's Churchyard, Tawstock, in the County of Devon, has, in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 18th day of March 1969 and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 (1853 c. 134), and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in St. Peter's Churchyard, Tawstock, in the County of Devon, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that—

- (a) one further burial may be allowed in any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave; and
- (b) two burials may be allowed in any grave space in the said Churchyard in which no interment has heretofore taken place, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Peter's Churchyard, Tawstock, Devon) Order 1969.
