**S**ignor Lorenzo Tiepolo, Ambassador in Ordinary from the Republic of Venice to the Imperial Court, made his Publick Entry here on the 22d Instant. The Season of the Year being far advanced, he did not begin his Entry at the usual distance from the Town, but was received in the Suburbs, at the Convent of the Minims, by Count Marmintz, Great Marechal of the Court, with two of the Emperor's Coaches, accompanied by the Coaches of the chief Nobility and Ministers of the Court. In this manner the Ambassador was conducted thro' the Town to his own House; where he was taken up next Morning by Count Caraffa, Gentleman of the Bed-chamber to his Imperial Majesty, with two of the Emperor's Coaches, and conducted to his Publick Audiences of the Court, with the usual Ceremonies. The Abbot Santini, the Pope's Auditor residing at this Court, is returned from Presburg, whither he went to execute a Commission from his Master to the Cardinal of Saxe-Weitz. Three Deputies are arrived here from the Lutherans in Silisia, to settle with this Court the Places where they are to build the six Churches, which his Imperial Majesty has lately granted them, at the Request of the King of Sweden. We hear from Hungary, that Prince Ragotzi has called an Assembly of his Followers at Catehaw; but we do not yet know what Resolutions they have taken. The Marquis of Obizzi, Governor of this Town, and one of his Imperial Majesty's Privy-Counsellors, died here Yesterday. Prince Emanuel of Savoy, who came hither with the News of the Duke of Savoy's Successes on the Frontiers of Dauphiné, is returned to Turin. Mr. Weyberg, the King of Denmark's Envoy to this Court, arrived here Yesterday, to notify to the Emperor his Danish Majesty's Journey thro' the Empire, and thro' some parts of the Hereditary Countries of the House of Austria to Venice. This Minister intends to follow the King his Master in a few Days.

**Berne, December 1. N. S.** Our last Letters from Milan say, that Ferrara, as well as Bologna, Faenza, and several other Places in the Pope's Territories, had received the Imperial Troops; and that Rome it self was in a Tumult, and threatened to follow the same Example, if the Pope did not soon enter into an Accommodation with the Emperor. We hear from Alsatia, that the Duke of Berwick left the Army in Flanders on the 16th of the last Month; and that he was expected at Strasburg on the 21st. Letters from Spain say, that the Duke of Orleans had with great Difficulty been persuaded to go to Madrid before he went to Versailles; and that it is believed he will quit the Command of the Army in Spain.

**Berlin, December 1. N. S.** On the 24th of the last Month the King and Queen dined and supped in Publick at Oranienberg. The next Day his Majesty returned hither. On the 26th the Queen came from Oranienberg to Schonhausen. On the 27th, about two in the Afternoon, the King met her on the Road to this Town, into which they made a magnificent Entry; their Majesties sitting together, and the Princess sitting backwards in the same Coach. The Queen's own Coach followed empty. The Prince-Royal, attended by all the Gentlemen of this Court, rode on Horseback before his Majesty's Coach. When their Majesties came to the Palace, the British Ambassador made his Compliments to the Queen, and was the only foreign Minister received that Evening. On the 28th the King and Queen went in Procession, each of them under a Canopy of State, to the Great Church, which was adorned on this Occasion with the utmost Magnificence. After the Bishop had joined their hands, and pronounced his Benediction on the Marriage, the Court returned to the Castle, while all the Cannon and small Shot were fir-

ring in three successive Rounds. Their Majesties supped that Evening in great State. After Supper, their Majesties, the Prince and Princess-Royal, with all the chief Officers of State, and Persons of the first Quality, performed the usual Ceremony of moving with lighted Flamboys in their Hands round the Hall of the Palace, to a Measure of Music made for the Occasion. After which the whole Court waited on their Majesties to the Queen's Bed-chamber, and took their Leave. On the 29th all the Deputies and Ministers of State made their Compliments of Congratulation to the King and Queen in their particular Apartments. The Deputies of the Provinces made their Presents, to the value of 100000 Crowns. This Court and City appear in the greatest Joy imaginable, and are preparing Publick Diversions in honour of his Majesty's Marriage. We have received a further Confirmation of the Advantage gained by the Muscovites over the Swedes, under the Command of General Lewenhaupt, in which the latter lost 3000 Men in the Field of Battel, besides those who were killed in the Retreat.

**From the Camp at Beirleghem, December 10. N. S.** Yesterday Morning the Duke of Marlborough had an Account from Prince Eugene, that upon our Batteries being ready to fire upon the Body of the Citadel on Saturday the 8th Instant, the Marechal de Boufflers had that Morning beat a Parley; that Hostages were thereupon exchanged; and that, at the coming away of the Express, it was agreed one of the Gates should be delivered to the Prince yesterday. His Grace is in hourly expectation of receiving from his Highness the Articles of Surrender. To Morrow his Grace will march, with the Army under his Command, and invest Ghent on the side of Brussels. Lieutenant-General Dedem, with his Detachment, and 10 Battalions that are ordered to join him, is to do the like between the Lys and the Scheide. Count Hompech is to take Post with his Troops between the Lys and the Canal, and Major-General Murray on the other side the Country of Waes. The French Army continues encamped behind the Scarp, between Valenciennes and Doway. The Princes, according to our last Advices, were still with the Army, having reinforced the Body of Troops commanded by Monsieur de Cheladet.

**Brussels, December 10. N. S.** An Express which arrived here yesterday in the Evening from Lille, brings Advice, that the Marechal de Boufflers beat a Parley for the Citadel on the 8th in the Morning, when Hostages were exchanged on both sides. Those gone into the Citadel are Brigadier Wartenleben, Lieutenant-Colonel Hamilton, and Major Runk; and the Brigadier Comte de Bellile, Lieutenant-Colonel Charade, and Major Bouffy, are sent into the Town from the Enemies, with the Articles of the Capitulation, which are expected every Moment. Major-General Cadogan, with three of the Dutch Deputies from the Army, being come hither on the 7th to concert some necessary Measures for the Reduction of Ghent, are returned to the Camp at Beirleghem.
