Pay in the Water Supply Industry

An agreement has recently been reached providing for pay increases to manual workers in the Water Supply Industry. Increases were also given to crafts-men in the industry which maintained existing cash differentials.

differentials.

Report No. 29 of the National Board for Prices and Incomes noted that there were at that time a considerable number of workers on the lowest earnings levels in the pay structure. The Report them attention, however, to the scope for improved labour utilisation and for the introduction of industry-wide productivity schemes. The recent settlements do not appear to provide for further progress in efficiency or to reflect any re-examination of the present pay structures or differentials.

Accordingly, in pursuance of their powers under section 2 (1) of the Prices and Incomes Act 1966, the First Secretary of State and Secretary of State for Employment and Productivity, the Secretary of State for Scotland and the Minister of Housing and Local Government hereby refer to the National Board for Prices and Incomes for their examination and report the pay, pay structure, and productivity of the Water Supply Industry in Great Britain.
