They have Advices there, that Count Cifuentes, Viceroy of Sardinia, had put Cagliari, and the other Forts of that Island, into a good posture of Defence, and had raised a considerable Body of Men for the Service of King Charles. His Royal Highness having received Advice of the Reduction of Ghent by the Allies, and that the Enemy had abandoned Bruges, ordered Te Deum to be Sung in the Cathedral Church on Sunday halt, and caused all other demonstrations of publick Joy to be shown of that occasion.
