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St. James's, February 18.

THE humble Address of the High Sheriff, Deputy-Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, Militia Officers, and other Gentlemen of the County of *Monmouth*; Condoling the Queen upon the Death of his Royal Highness, and Congratulating Her Majesty on the Glorious Successes of the last Campaign; was presented to Her Majesty by the Earl of *Cholmondeley*, Lord-Lieutenant of the said County.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Turin, January 24. N. S. His Royal Highness has taken so great care to Recruit his Forces, that all the Troops are already compleat; and 'tis said, other new Regiments will be raised for the Service in the next Campaign. Letters from *Dauphiné* say, that the Harvest has this last Year been so bad in France, that they are under apprehensions of a general scarcity of Corn, and have forbidden the Transportation of it on the Frontiers; with severe Penalties on all who shall be found to offend in that kind. They write from *Léghorne*, that the Fleet of the Allies was returned thither from *Barcelona*. They have Advices there, that Count *Cifuentes*, Viceroy of *Sardinia*, had put *Cagliari*, and the other Forts of that Island, into a good posture of Defence, and had raised a considerable Body of Men for the Service of King *Charles*. His Royal Highness having received Advice of the Reduction of *Ghent* by the Allies, and that the Enemy had abandoned *Bruges*, ordered *Te Deum* to be Sung in the Cathedral Church on Sunday last, and caused all other demonstrations of publick Joy to be shown on that occasion. The Winter has been so severe in the Country that many have dy'd of Cold; but his Royal Highness has from time to time ordered a distribution of Firing to supply the Necessities of the Poor in this City.

Hamburgh, February 8. N. S. The Differences between the Magistracy and People of this City are not in so fair a way to a good Conclusion, as we lately had reason to hope they were. The Burgeoisie show great Dissatisfaction upon the least Disorder which happens among the Soldiers of the Garrison, and accuse their Magistrates, as having brought them under a Necessity of receiving Troops into the City. Dr. *Kramholtz* has been more strictly confined of late than at first; and it has been feared, some of his Followers have entered into Measures to rescue him out of Prison. They write from *Poland*, that the *Marquis de Bonac*, Envoy from the Court of France, has used all the Arts imaginable to engage the Grand General of the Crown in the Interests of King *Stanislaus*, but has had no Success in that Negotiation. Those Letters add, that the Account we have lately had of a Battle between the Swedes and *Muscovites* is not confirmed. The extreme Cold has made the Plague cease in some Parts of Upper *Poland*, but it has appeared again in others. It is computed, that the Sicknefs has swept away, in the Town of *Warfaw* only, 17000 Persons.

Hague, February 15. N. S. Our last Advices from *Switzerland* say, that the Cantons of *Zürich* and *Berne* were come to a Resolution to send Deputies to *Aras*, where they will take into Consideration the Emperor's Letter concerning the Affair of *Tockenbourg*, and the Memorial of Count *Traumansdorf* on the same occasion. They write from *Basil* of the 30th of the last Month, that the great Winds, which had blown for some Days, had put

them in Apprehensions that the Snows on the Alps would be forced down, and cause great Inundations. We hear from *Berlin* that his Prussian Majesty is intirely recovered of his late Indisposition. A Gentleman of the King's Bed-chamber has lately been dispatched to the Court of *Saxony*, but his Instructions are kept secret. The Prince of *Anhalt-Dessau* continues to solicit his Majesty for the Command of the Prussian Troops either in *Italy* or the Low Countries; but it is said the King is so well satisfied with his present Generals in both places, that the Prince will not succeed in his Applications.

Falmonth, February 13. Yesterday failed hence for *Lisbon* the Queen Packet-Boat, Captain *Culverdon* Commander, with two Mails.

Plimouth, February 15. Yesterday failed my Lord *Dursly* in her Majesty's Ship the *Kent*, with the *Plimouth*, *Monk* and *Medway*, to the Westward; and the *Exeter* and *Chatham* to the Eastward. This Day failed also the *Crown* to the Eastward. The *Medway* hath just now sent in a French Privateer of 12 Guns.

Dartmouth, February 15. The Weather hath been so violent in these Parts, and stormy with Winds and Snow, that we have not had a Vessel put into this Harbour for almost two Months, till this Day, when there came in a Dutch *Pink* and a Dutch *Dogger*, both from *Bourdeaux*, laden with Wine and Brandy, bound for *Holland*.

Cowes, February 18. The Fleet for *Lisbon*, under Dutch Convoy, passed thro' our Road this Morning, consisting of 40 Sail.

Portsmouth, February 17. Yesterday the Dutch Convoy of 9 Men of War failed from *Spithead* with about 80 Sail of Merchantmen thro' the *Needles* to the Westward, with a fresh Gale which still continues. There are at *Spithead* her Majesty's Ships the *Royal Oak*, *Bedford*, *Newcastle*, *Gosport* and *Saphir*, with 4 Dutch Men of War.

Tarmouth, February 19. On the 16th Instant failed out of our Road her Majesty's Ships the *Ruby* and *Greyhound*, with divers laden *Colliers*, *Coasters* and *Russia* Ships under their Convoy for the *River of Thames*. There continue in our Road her Majesty's Ships the *Falkstone* and *Advice-Prize*.

Deal, February 19. Here lye her Majesty's Ships the *Norfolk*, *Revenge*, *Dreadnought*, *Guernsey*, *Garland*, *Queenborough*, *Gosport*, *Tartar* and *Mary Gally*, with several outward-bound Merchant Ships.

There are three Mails due from *Holland*.
