The humble Address of the Provost. Fellows and Scholars of the College of the Holy and Undivided Trinity of Queen Elizabeth near Dubin; presented to Her Ma-jesty by his Excellency the Earl of Wharton, Lord-Lieurenant of Ireland.

May it please your Majesty,

IN the midst of our just Concern for the unspeakable Loss which your Majesty and all your Subjects have had in the Death of the Prince of Denmark, it is no small Comfort to us that we can Congratulate your Majesty upon the glo-rious and uninterrupted Successes of your Arms under the Command of the Duke of Marlborough.

We do mith all Sincerity and Graticude own and acknowledge the many Bleffings of your most auspicious Reign: And we have bately, by a Declaration signed by us in a sull Cougregation, given publick Testimony of our Thankfulness to Gas for that happy Revolution which brought your Majesty to the Throne, the greatest Blessing your Subjects ever had; of our great Veneration for your Sacred Person; and of our firm Adherence to the Succession as by Law Established; and we could wish the Loyalty of our Hearts were as open to your Majesty, as it is to God who sees them.

We do with fervent Zeal pray for your Majesty's Health and Prosperity, and shall take all Occasions of shewing our utmos Abborrence and Detestation of all things which expressy or by insinuation tend to the Disturbing the peaceable Course of your Government, or even to the least Disquiet of your Mind.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

Vienna, February 16. N. S. On the 6th Instant at Night arrived here the Marquis of Prie's Secretary from Rome, with the Articles of the Treaty of Peace concluded between the Emperor and the Pope. The Treaty was figned on the 15th of January, by Cardinal Paolucci in the Pope's Name, and by the Marquis of Prie for the Emperor. The Pope was to Disband all his new-raifed Troops in 14 Days after the Conclusion of the Treaty; to reduce his Forces to the antient Establishment, and to dismissout of his Service all foreign and suspected Officers. He is to proceed immediately to an acknowledgment of King Charles III. He is to fend a Nuncio to the Court of Barcelona, and to receive from thence an Ambassador at Rome. He is to grant King Charles all the Prerogatives which depend on the See of Rome, such as the Nomination to Bi-thopricks and Church Benefices, as also to the Cardinal's Cap. Comacchio is to remain in the Hands of the Emperor, 'till the Pretentions of the Empire and of the See of Rome to that Place be examined, and decided in a Conference to be held for that purpose, between a Deputation of Cardinals and the Marquis of Pric. The Right to the Sovereignry of Parma and Placentia is to be debated in the same Conference. The Pope is to use all posfible Endeavours to hinder the Malecontents of Naples, who have taken shelter in the Ecclesiastical Territorics, from carrying on any Plots or Machinations to disturb the Quiet of that Kingdom. The Insperial Troops are to leave forthwith the Pope's Territories. Prince Hercolani. the Emperor's Ambaliador at Venice, and the Marquis del Valto, the King of Spain's Ambassador at this Court, have. through the Emperor's intercession, obtained their Par-don from the Pope. The Affairs of Religion in Silesia are now finally ended, and the Imperial and Swedish Commissioners, who have had the Direction of that Affair, are exchanging mutual Acts thereupon. The Imperial Commissioners give to the Swedish Minister the Empe-

ror's Order to the Governors and Magistrates of Silesia. for supporting and maintaining the Lutherans in the peaceable Enjoyment of what they have been now put in Possession of by Vertue of the Treaty of Alt-Ransfadt. the other hand, the Swedish Minister delivers to the Inperial Commissioners a Declaration in the King of Sweden's Name, acknowledging the Treaty of Alt-Ranftair to be fully executed by the Emperor in all its Points.

Berlin, February 16. N. S. Orders are given to several Regiments to be in readiness to march towards the Frontiers of Mecklemburg; but 'tis hoped the Potentates con-cerned in the Protection of the Nobility of Mecklemburg will not press things to an Extremity, since this Court and the Duke of Mecklemburg do declare they are ready to enter into any Measures, which shall be proposed to end that Affair amically, and to avoid any occasion of Disturbance in the Circle of Lower-Saxony. The Duke of Mecklemburg, who is now at Cassel, is expected here the latter end of next Week, in his return home. The Queen presented this Day to the King, Monsieur Rheden as her Chamberlain. Certain Peasants on the Frontiers of his Majesty's Dominions, and those of the Ekctor of Hanover, have lately had a Quarrel, in which there were 8 or 10 killed, and about 30 wounded on both fides; but this Affair is likely to have no other Consequence than that Commissioners will be appointed on both sides to examine into the Matter, with Power to punish the Aggres-They write from Saxony, that the late Chancellor Beuchling was lately fet at Liberty, upon an engagement not to go out of Saxony. Letters from Novogrodeck of the 13th of the last Month tell us, that the Conferences were begun at Zamos for an Accommodation; the principal Points infifted upon by the Confederates are. That they shall renounce on both sides the Protection of the King of Sweden and the Czar; That King Stanislaus shall submit to a new Election; and I hat the Swedes shall quit the Kingdom. The same Letters speak of the Victory obtained by the Swedes; the Mulcovites are faid to have lost 18000 Men, and the Swedes 13000; after the Battel, it is faid, the Swedes continued their March towards Moscow. Prince Eugene is expected here within 10 Days. King Augustus observing that the frequenc Conferences which are held with his Ministers, and those of the Czar at Drefden, have occasioned much Jealousies has ordered his Minister in this Court to fignifie, that the Reason of those Conferences are only to settle some mutual Pretentions remaining between him and the Czir. Among other things, his Czarish Majesty has demanded the Papers of Monsieur Patkull, and makes also an enquiry after Writings which were in the Hands of a Muscovite Commissary, who died some Months ago in Saxony.

Berne, February 20. N. S. The last Letters from Milan brought us some of the Conditions of the Treaty lately concluded between the Emperor and the Pope, which are as follow. I. That the Pope shall acknowledge Charles the III as King in general. II. That a Congregation of 15 Cardinals shall be appointed to determine whether the Pope ought to acknowledge him for the Catholick King, that is to fay, for King of Spain; and that the Pope shall be obliged to stand by their Decifion. But not the Emperor. III. That the Pope shall not keep in Arms above 5000 Men in all his Territories. IV. That he shall pay Contributions for 10000 Imperia-lifts. V. That he shall appoint a Congregation of Cardinals and Ministers of the Emperor or Empire, to examine whether Comacchio, Ferrara, Parma, Placentia, and the other Territories possessed by the Roman Princes, are Imperial Fiels, or not. VI. That the German Garrison shall continue at Camacchio till the Decision of that Affair. VII. That the German Troops fliall march out of

the Ecclesiatical State, and shall retire beyond the Po. Persons to Ecclesiastical Benefices, and that the Pope shall be obliged to disparch them accordingly. IX. That the Emperor shall annull the Decree passed upon the Affair of Parma and Placentia. Those Letters add, that the Pope had begun to disband his Troops, and the Marquis of Prié had sent Orders for the Emperor's Forces to evacuate the Euclesiastical State. It was expected that the Succours which are to be fent from Naples to Barcelona, would very faddenly embark. They write from Genoa, that Admiral Byng arrived at Post-Mahon on the 23d of the last Month; that they had received Advice, that four British Men of War were canonading the Town of Alicant by Sea, and that the Castle fired upon it at the same time. Some Advices from Lyons of the 10th say, that the Garrison of the Castle of Alicant had made a Sally upon the Troops of the Blockade, which they believed thereupon to be railed.

Hamburgh, February 22. N. S. The Dispute concerning Precedence among the Subdelegate Ministers of the Imperial Commission here, which had very much obstructed their Assars, seems to be reserved to a more convenient Scason; and, 'tis hoped, their Conferences may now be re-assumed. The Burghers of this Place, in their last Meeting, unanimously resolved upon several Contributions for railing sufficient Mony to pay their Contingent to the Empire, the Charge of the Guards of the present Commission, and one Year's Pay to their own usual Garrison. The Commission have appointed a new Advocate for Dr. Krumholtz, and Orders are given to bring in his Defence within eight Days. The Count Schonborn defigns to go within four or five Days to Britzenburg, a Place about eight German Miles from hence, in order to wait on the Duke of Mecklenburgh, who is expected there on the 26th Instant. The Accounts we have had of late from Stetin of two great Victories obtained by the Swedes about the end of November last, and that the King of Sweden was marching directly to Molcow, are confirmed neither by the Letters from Molcow, or any other Parts; and the full full form of the Swedes and Mulcovites keep their Winter-Quarters in Ukrania.

Hague, March 1. N. S. The States of Holland and West-Friseland, having disposed of several Military Employments, adjourned on the 16th of the last Month, and will not come together again 'till the 15th Instant. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough arrived here on the 19th of the last Month in the Evening, where his Presence has very much hastened the Disparch of the publick Affairs. Duke for out towards Bruskels on the 26th, and, it is said, his Grace defigns to go into Great Britain upon the Arrival of Prince Eugene in the Low-Countries.
