ER Majesty having granted a Commission under the Great Seal, impowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord-Chancellor, and feveral other Lords, to pass the Royal Affent to several Bills agreed to by both Houses of Parliament, yesterday the Lords Commissioners sent a Message to the House of Commons, by Mr. Aston. Deputy Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, to define the House to come up to the House of Peers, with their Speaker, to be present at the passing the said Bills into ACIs. The Speaker and the House went up accordingly, and the Lords Commissioners passed the Royal Affent to the several Bills following, viz.

Vienna, February 20. N. S. The Advices from Transilvania bring an Account, That the Castle of Sebeswar had surrendred to Count Montecucoli, Major General of the Emperor's Forces. Berlin, February 23. N. S. The Duke of Mecklinburg arrived here last Sunday in the Evening, and went to the House of his Minister, Monseur Cline. Upon Notice of the Duke's Arrival, the King ordered one of his Coaches, and his Privy Council by Printz, to wait upon his Lieback. on his Highness, and conduct him to the Apartment prepared for him in the Castle, where all things were in a readiness for his Reception, during his Stay here 'till Tuef-day Morning; he dined and supped privately with the King and Queen in his Majesty's Closes to avoid the Inconveniencies of Ceremony. On Monday he dispatched a Courier to Count Schonborn, to excute his not meeting him on the 20th, as he promised; and assure him, that he would not fail to see him the 20th at Boitsenburg, between Swerin and Hamburg; at which time he did not doubt, but that having already concerted Measures with this Court, he should fatissie his Imperial Majesty, who had thought fit to interest himself in the Disputes behad thought fit to interest himself in the Disputes between his Highness and his Nobility. It is said, the Prussian Troops will suddenly receive Orders to evacuate the whole Country of Mecklinburg, and are already removed out of the Estates of the Nobility, into those which immediately belong to the Duke. Monsieur Marshal, Minister from this Court to King Augustus, advises, that the Ministers of that Prince give him Affurinces, that his Majesty has not the least Design to enter into any new Enpasement with the Czar. or to do ter into any new Engagement with the Czar, or to do any thing contrary to the Treaty of Alt-Ransfadt. By some Letters from Venice, we have reason to expect, that the King of Denmark will come hither in his Return to Copenhagen; but 'tis thought his Majesty will visit Rome, Florence and Genoa, before he leaves Italy.

Hague, March 5. N. S. Several Letters from France advise, that Monsieur Bernard, who was principally con-cerned in the Remittances of the French Court to their Armies, and the chief Manager of their Foreign Credit, is become Bankrupt for 25 Millions of Livres. from Brussels say, his Grace the Duke of Marlborough defigned to leave that Place this Day or to Morrow, in order to embark at Oftend for Great Britain: Eugene is to take his Leave of the Court of Vienna this Week, and is suddenly expected in the Low-Countries. The States-General have resolved to raise two Millions of Florins by way of Lottery; the Conditions of which are

to be printed this Week.

Corneval and Cheffer, with about 40 Merchant Ships, failed from thence the 2d Inflant for England.
