The Trunk Road (High Street, Sittingbourne) (Pro-hibition of Waiting, Loading and Unloading) (Experimental) Order 1970.

(Experimental) Order 1970. The Secretary of State for the Environment has made an Order under section 9 of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1967, as amended by Part IX of the Transport Act 1968, the effect of which is to prohibit the waiting of vehicles at any time and their loading or unloading between 7.30 a.m. and 9.30 a.m. on Mondays to Saturdays inclusive on the south side of that length of the A.2 Trunk Road, known as High Street, in the Urban District of Sittingbourne and Milton, which extends from its junction with Bell Road to a point 34 yards west of that junction. Exemptions are provided in the Order to enable a

Exemptions are provided in the Order to enable a vehicle to wait for so long as may be necessary for a person to board or alight from the vehicle, to enable goods to be loaded on to or unloaded from the vehicle except as stated above, or to enable the vehicle to be used in connection with any building operation or demolition, the removal of any obstruc-tion to traffic, the maintenance of the road or the services therein.

The Trunk Road (Prohibition of Waiting) (Clearways)

Notice is hereby given that the Secretary of State for the Environment proposes to make an Order under section 1 (1), (2) and (3) and (6) of the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1967, as amended by Part IX of the Transport Act 1968, the effect of which will be:

1. to prohibit waiting on any of those main carriageways forming part of the London—Fishguard Trunk Road (Golden Valley By-Pass) (A.40) which are specified in the Schedule hereto; and

2. to prohibit waiting by any vehicle for the purpose of trading, unless the goods are immediately delivered at or taken into premises adjacent to the vehicle, on any verge or lay-by adjacent to the said main carriageway. The prohibition imposed by the Order will not apply:

(a) to a vehicle waiting upon the direction or with the permission of a police constable in uniform;

(b) so as to prevent a vehicle from being used in with any building operation or connection

demolition, the removal of any obstruction to traffic, the maintenance of the road or of any of the services therein;

- (c) to a vehicle being used for fire brigade, ambulance or police purposes;
- (d) to a vehicle being used for the purpose of delivering or collecting postal packets;
- (e) to a vehicle being used by or on behalf of a local authority for the purpose of collecting household refuse or clearing cesspools;
- (f) to a vehicle waiting while any gate or other barrier at the entrance to premises to which the vehicle requires access or from which it has emerged is being opened or closed, if it is not reasonably practicable for the vehicle to wait elsewhere; and
- (g) to a vehicle waiting in any case where the person in control of it:
 - (i) is required by law to stop;
 - (ii) is obliged to stop to avoid an accident; or (iii) is prevented from proceeding by circumstances outside his control and cannot remove the vehicle from the main carriageway.
