The Scheme which follows this note amends the Telegraph (British Commonwealth and Foreign Written Telegram) Regulations, 1959 (S.I. 1959/No. 2099) which have effect under paragraph 3(1) of Schedule 9 to the Post Office Act, 1969 as if they were provisions of a Scheme made under section 28 of that Act. The amendment of the Regulations is consequential upon the decision to withdraw the general delivery of telegrams on Christmas Day and New Year's Day (in Scotland) and on Christmas Day and Boxing Day (in other parts of the British Islands). (This note is not part of the Scheme).
