CIVIC AMENITIES ACT, 1967, SECTION 1

Conservation Areas

Notice is hereby given that the County Council have determined that the parts of the parishes of Benington, Bicker, Fishtoft, Frampton, Kirton, Wigtoft, Wrangle and Wyberton in the Boston rural district described in the Schedule hereto are areas of special architectural or historic interest the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance and have designated those parts of the said parishes as Conservation Areas. Plans showing the Conservation Areas can be seen at the County Planning Department, Carlton Road, Boston, during normal office hours.

SCHEDULE

(a) *Benington*

That part of the village of Benington bounded generally on the north by the northern side of Seas End Road extending westwards from "The Limes" to Lowfields Road, on the west by the property on the western side of the A.52 Boston—Skegness Road to the Church and Vicarage at its southern extremity, and on its eastern side by the property on the eastern side of the A.52 Boston—Skegness Road and the southern side of Seas End Road to a point opposite "The Limes".

(b) *Bicker*

That part of the village of Bicker bounded generally by the frontages development along both sides of Bicker Eau drain from the Village Hall in the north to the Village War Memorial and Sunday School at its southern extremity.

(c) *Fishtoft*

That part of the village of Fishtoft bounded generally on the north by Guthlac's Church and the grounds of the Rectory. On the western side by the grounds of the Rectory, the western boundary of the village playing field, the War Memorial, to include the Red Cow Inn and adjoining property. On the southern side by Fishtoft Grange to the Manor House Club. On the eastern side by the Manor House Club, and northwards to St. Guthlac's Church.

(d) *Frampton*

That part of the village of Frampton bounded generally on the west by the property fronting Thorniman Lane, from and including the property immediately north of the Methodist Chapel to Middlegate Road on the south. On the south by Middlegate Road, the Town Drain, St. Mary's Church, the Vicarage to Hall Lane. On the east by the property fronting on to Hall Lane and on the north and north-east by the grounds of Frampton Hall.

(e) *Kirton*

That part of the village of Kirton bounded generally on the north by the north side of High Street, St. Peter and St. Paul's Church, and the east side of Willington Road to the Church Hall. On the west by the west side of Willington Road to London Road A.16. On the south by the south side of London Road and on the east by the east side of The Green.

(f) *Wigtoft*

That part of the village of Wigtoft bounded generally on the north by the northern side of the Trunk Road A.17 from a point 300 feet east of the "Swan Inn" to include the primary school, Church of St. Peter and St. Paul and Church Road estate. On the west by Church Road estate and the eastern sector of the adjoining field to the A.17. On the south by the property fronting A.17 to the "Swan Inn" and along the southern edge of the A.17 for a distance of 300 feet to its eastern extremity.

(g) *Wrangle*

That part of the village of Wrangle bounded generally on the north by the village hall and Church Close. On the east by the Vicarage and adjoining frontage to Church Road. On the south by St. Mary and St. Nicholas Church and adjoining business premises to the west. On the west by the property around and including the "Angel" public house.

(h) *Wyberton*

That part of the village of Wyberton bounded generally on the north by the northern side of Church Lane from a point 100 yards east of the Almshouses to a point 150 yards north of the junction of Church Lane and Low Road. On the west by the western frontage of Low Road to the Causeway and then by Low Road for a distance of 230 yards south. On the south by the southern boundary of field 207 and the grounds of Wyberton Park. On the west by Wyberton Park, the extension to the graveyard to join Church Lane 100 yards east of the Almshouses.

Haworth Conservation Area

Notice is hereby given that the County Council of the West Riding of Yorkshire, as Local Planning Authority, after consultation with the Keighley Borough Council have designated the area referred to in the Schedule to this notice as a Conservation Area in accordance with section 1 of the Civic Amenities Act, 1967. The area is one which the County Council consider to be an area of special architectural or historic interest, the character or appearance of which should be preserved or enhanced and will be the subject of stringent control of development. The County Council intend to take such action as may be available to them to secure the preservation of the character and the general improvement of the area.

The Conservation Area is defined on a plan which may be inspected free of charge during normal office hours at the office of the County Planning Officer, Raines House, Denby Dale Road, Wakefield, at the office of the Area Planning Officer, Water Street, Skipton, or at the office of the Clerk of the Keighley Borough Council, Town Clerk's Office, Town Hall, Keighley.

THE SCHEDULE

Keighley Borough—Haworth Conservation Area

The Conservation Area comprises the village centre, and extends to the south to include undeveloped land and property to a depth of approximately 60 yards west of Main Street as far as Old Hall. Property on the eastern side of Main Street is included southwards to the Baptist Chapel. Undeveloped land to the east of the village centre is contained within the Conservation Area, which extends to the north to include property on South View, together with Ashmore House and mill, Cook Gate Farm, and Manor House. To the west of the village centre the Conservation Area includes property and undeveloped land on the northern side of West Lane as far as 92 West Lane. The Bronte Parsonage Museum is included, and the Conservation Area boundary extends westward to incorporate property and undeveloped land south of West Lane as far as the Rectory.
