

## CIVIC AMENITIES ACT 1967

## FLINTSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

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*Designation of Conservation Areas*

Notice is hereby given that the Flintshire County Council as Local Planning Authority has designated the areas described in the Schedule below as Conservation Areas under section 1 of the Civic Amenities Act 1967, i.e. areas of specified architectural or historic interest the character or appearance of which it is desirable to preserve or enhance. The effect of designation is that proposals for new development that are likely to affect the character of such areas to any significant extent will be advertised and the Council will consider any representations received when deciding whether or not to grant permission.

Maps showing the extent of each of the designated areas are available for public inspection at Shire Hall, Mold and at the offices of the Council for the Rural District in which each designated area is situated.

<i>Rural District</i>	<i>Location</i>	SCHEDULE	<i>Description</i>
Hawarden...	Marford ...	...	The group of eighteenth century estate cottages and houses along Marford Hill and Springfield Lane at the north end of Marford together with their gardens and infilling plots.
Holywell ...	Caerwys ...	...	The old part of Caerwys village consisting of a grid of streets based on the early Mediaeval pattern of the commercial bastide town. The area is bounded by Drover's Lane, Holywell Road, Chapel Street and the road past the church, and includes several undeveloped plots.
	Cilcain ...	...	The village of Cilcain excluding the new development on the edge of the village.
	Gwaenysgor ...	...	The village of Gwaenysgor including Brynffynnon. It also includes a small undeveloped site near the shop which is important to the village centre.
	Llanasa ...	...	The village of Llanasa, grouped around the church and including The Vicarage, Henblas and Gadlys Farm.
	Nannerch ...	...	The village of Nannerch between "The Cross Foxes" P.H. and the church, including the parkland and trees of Nannerch Hall.
	Northop ...	...	The centre of the village consisting of Brook Street, High Street and the parish church together with the group of houses east and south of the church.
	Whitford ...	...	The village of Whitford from Primrose Cottage to The Vicarage, including an undeveloped field east of the church.
Maelor ...	Ysceifiog ...	...	The whole village.
	Bangor-is-y-coed ...	...	The central part of the village including High Street and parts of Whitchurch Road and Overton Road. The area includes the properties to the North of High Street, Dee House and The Laurels, and the southern boundary is along property boundaries between Plassey House in Whitchurch Road and Orchard Villas in Overton Road. The area also includes the old rectory, the church, river bank and bridge, the boundary following the county boundary with Denbighshire along the centre of the River Dee.
	Hanmer ...	...	The whole village including the old people's dwellings and the open land between the village and Hanmer Mere.
	Overton ...	...	The centre of the village including the High Street, Willow Street and Pen-y-llan Street, and bounded on the east by School Lane.
	Worthenbury ...	...	The whole village including several undeveloped areas which are important to its character.
St. Asaph ...	Bodelwyddan ...	...	The row of stone estate cottages, school, vicarage and St. Margaret's Church (being the original village).
	Bodfari ...	...	The centre of the village around the church, "The Dinorben Arms" P.H. and rectory.
	Rhuddlan ...	...	The centre of Rhuddlan including High Street, Church Street, Gwindy Street, Parliament Street and Castle Street which follow the road pattern of the town laid out by Edward I in 1278. It includes St. Mary's Church, the northern corner of the Town Ditch, The Vicarage, Banqueting House and Hendre Farm and Rhuddlan Castle. The Norman Castle (Twt Hill) is also included, and the western boundary follows the west bank of the River Clwyd and includes Rhuddlan Bridge.
	St. Asaph ...	...	The centre of the cathedral city being mainly the High Street, Cathedral and Bishop's Palace and including the old parts of the town along Gemig Street and Lower Street.
	Tremeirchion ...	...	The centre of the village including the church, vicarage, "The Salisbury Arms" P.H. and the open space known as the Hen Ochr.
