## Anno Septimo ANNÆ REGINÆ.

An Ast for Preserving the Privileges of Antbassadors, and other Publick Ministers of Foreign Princes and States.

Hereas feveral turbulent and diforderly Persons having in a most outresions and diforderly Persons have ving in a most outragious manner insulted the Perfor of his Excellency Andrew Artemonowitz Mattueof. Ambaffidor Extraordinary of his Czarish Majesty, Emperor of Great Ruffes, Her Majesty's good Friend and Ally, by Arreling him, and taking him by Violence out of his Coach in the publick Street, and detaining him in Custody for feveral Hours, in Contempt of the Protection granted by Her Majefiy, contrary to the Law of Nations, and in prejudice of the Rights and Privileges which Ambassadors and other publick Modifiers, authorized and received as fuch, have at all times been thereby possessed of, and ought tobe kept facted and inviolable; Be it therefore declared by the Queen smost Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Confess of the Lorde Spiritual and Temporal and Commons in Parliament affemoled, and by the Authority of the fame, That all Actions and Suits, Writs and Proceedes commenced, fued or profecuted against the said Ambassador by any Perion or Perfons whatfoever, and all Bail Bonds given by the faid Ambaffador, or any other Perfon or Perfons on his behalf, and all Recognizances of Bail given or acknowledged in any fuch Action or Suit, and all Proceedings upon, or by pretext or colour of any fuch Action or Suit, Writ or Process, and all Judgments had thereupon, areutterly Null and Void, and shall be deemed and adjudged to be utterly Null and Void, to all Intents, Constructions and Purpofes whatfoever.

And be it Enacted by the Authority aforesaid, That all Entries, Proceedings and Records against the said Ambassador, or his Bail, shall be vacated and cancelled.

And to prevent the like Infolencies for the future, Be it further Declared by the Authority aforefaid. That all Writs and Processes that shall at any time hereaster be Sued forth or Profecuted, whereby the Person of any Ambassidor, or other Publick Minister of any Foreign Prince or State, authorized and received as such by Her Majesty, Her Heirs or Successors, or the Domestick, or Domestick Servant of any such Ambassidor, or other Publick Minister, may be arrested or imprisoned, or his or their Goods or Chattels may be distrained, seized or attached, shall be deemed and adjudged to be utterly null and void to all Intents, Constructions and Purposes whatsover.

And be it further Enacted by the Authority aforefaid, That in case any Person or Persons shall presume to Sue forth or Prosecute any such Writ or Process, such Person and Persons, and all Attorneys and Solicitors prosecuting and soliciting in such case, and all Officers executing any such Writ or Process, being thereof convicted, by the Confession of the Party, or by the Oath of one or more credible Witness or Witnesses, before the Lord Chancellor, or Lord Keeper of the Great Scal of Great Britains, the Chief Justice of the Court of Queens Benchthe Chief Justice of the Court of Queens Benchthe Chief Justice of the Court of Lord Keepers of the Laws of Nations, and Disturbers of the Publick Repose, and shall suffer such Pains, Penalties and Corporal Punishment, as the said Lord Chancellor, Lord Keeper, and the said Chief Justices, or any two of them shall judge sit to be imposed and insticted.

Provided, and be it Declared, That no Merchant or o ther Trader whatfoever, within the Defeription of any of the Statutes against Bankrupts, who hath or shall put himself into the Service of any such Ambassador or Publick Minister, shall have or take any manner of Benesit by this Act, and that no Person shall be proceeded against as having arrested the Servant of an Ambassador or Publick Minister, by vertue of this Act, unless the Name of such Servant be first Registred in the Office of one of the Principal Secretaries of State, and by such Secretary transmitted to the Sherists of London and Middless sur the time being, or their Under-Sherists or Deputies, who shall, upon the Receipt thereof, hang up the same in some Publick Place in their Offices, whereto all Persons may refort, and take Copies thereof without Fee or Reward.

And be it further enacted by the Authority aforesaid, Il at this Act shall be taken and allowed in all Courts within this Kingdomas a publick Act; And that all Judges and Justices shall take nonce of t without special Pleading; And all Sheriffs, Bail ffs and other Officers and Ministers of Justice concerned in the Execution of Process, are hereby required to have regard to this Act, as they will answer the contrary at their Peril.

Lisbon, May 4. N. S. Letters from the Camp on the Caya, of the 26th of April last, tell us, the the Army under the Command of the Earl of Galway marched on the 23d, and encamp'd at Cancan, about a League from Elvas. The 26th the Army moved again, and encamped on the Caya, about 3 Leagues from Flvas, and two from the Enemy, who lay on the Left of Badajos. Our Army consists of about 17000 Foot, and 5000 Horie, and appears in very good Order. According to the Accounts we have received from Deserters we are in number much superior to the Enemy.

Berne, May 4. N. S. The Letters from Milan of the 27th past say, his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy being resolved to begin the Campaign betimes, had given Orders for the speedy Preparation of every thing that was necessary, and that the Troops would soon march to the general Rendezvous; that those who had been detached for Barcelona were still at Final, their departure from thence being uncertain, by reason that Admiral Byng, who was to have taken them under his Convoy, was gone with his Squadron to the Reliet of the Cassle Alicant. A general Dyet of the Thirteen Cantons is summon'd to meet at Baden for the 15th Instant, upon the occasion of the Affair of Tockembourg, which seems to grow every day more perplicated.

Brussels, May 13. N. S. Prince Eugene went from hence on the 11th for the Hague, in order to meet his Grace the Duke of Marlborough at that Place. On the 8th another great Convoy. confifting of 100 Veffele laden with all forts of Provision and Forage, set forward from Ghent towards Courtray, Menin and Liste. Letters from Paris of the 10th fay, the Duke of Neailles was gone for Rouffillon, to take upon him the Command of the Troops in that Country. The Duke of Orleans has deferred letting out for Spain; and fome Advices fay, he returns no more into that Kingdom. The first Battalion of the French and Swifs Guards began their March on the 9th towards the Frontiers. The want of Corn is fo great throughout the Kingdom of France, that frequent Tumults happen in all the great Towns, notwithstanding the Care of the Magistracy to prevent such Disorders. The Troops of the Allies are marching from all Quarrers, in order to the affembling the Army, and taking the Field with all expedition. Letters from Maerid dated April the 23d foy, that on the 20th Instant the Duke and Dutchess of Anjou, and the Prince of Afturias, returned from Buen-Retiro, and made their Publick Entry into that City with great Pomp and Magnificence. The Chevalier of Haracit hath had divers Conferences fiace his arrival with the Dake of Anjou. and Monfieur Amelot the French Ambaffidor, concerning the Operations of the next Campuign. They heard from Efframadura, that fix Battalions of Spanish and Walloon Guards had joined the Army at Gevora, where the Marquis de Bay had affembled his Troops, and delign'd to advance towards the Frontiers of Portu-

Hague, May 14. N. S. On the 12th Inftant Prince Eugene arrived here from Bruffels. The Prince of Naffau having notified to the Sa es his Marriage with a Princess of Heffe-Caffel, their High Mightineffes have writ him a Letter of Congratulation in the most obliging Terms. New Ministers daily arrive here from Foreign Princes. This Grace the Duke of Marlborough is expected with great impatience. Yesterday the Ambassador from his Czarish Majesty received an Account of two Engagements between the Swedes and Muscovites, one on the 10th, the other on the 14th of February, in both which his Mafter had the Advantage. The fame Day his Excellency communicated this Advice to the States, and all the Foreign Ministers residing here. Two Battalions of the Blue Guards, which were Quarter'd in this Place, are marched towards Flanders; and they write from Lifle, that the remain ser of the great Convoy of Provisions and Ammunition was arrived there, without any Opposition from the Enemy; and another was fuddenly expected.
