The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council

Whereas a Representation duly made to Her Majesty in Council by the Secretary of State for the Environment that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued as hereinafter directed in St. Dunstan's Churchyard, Canterbury, has in pursuance of an Order in Council made the 28th day of July 1971, and duly published, been taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council:

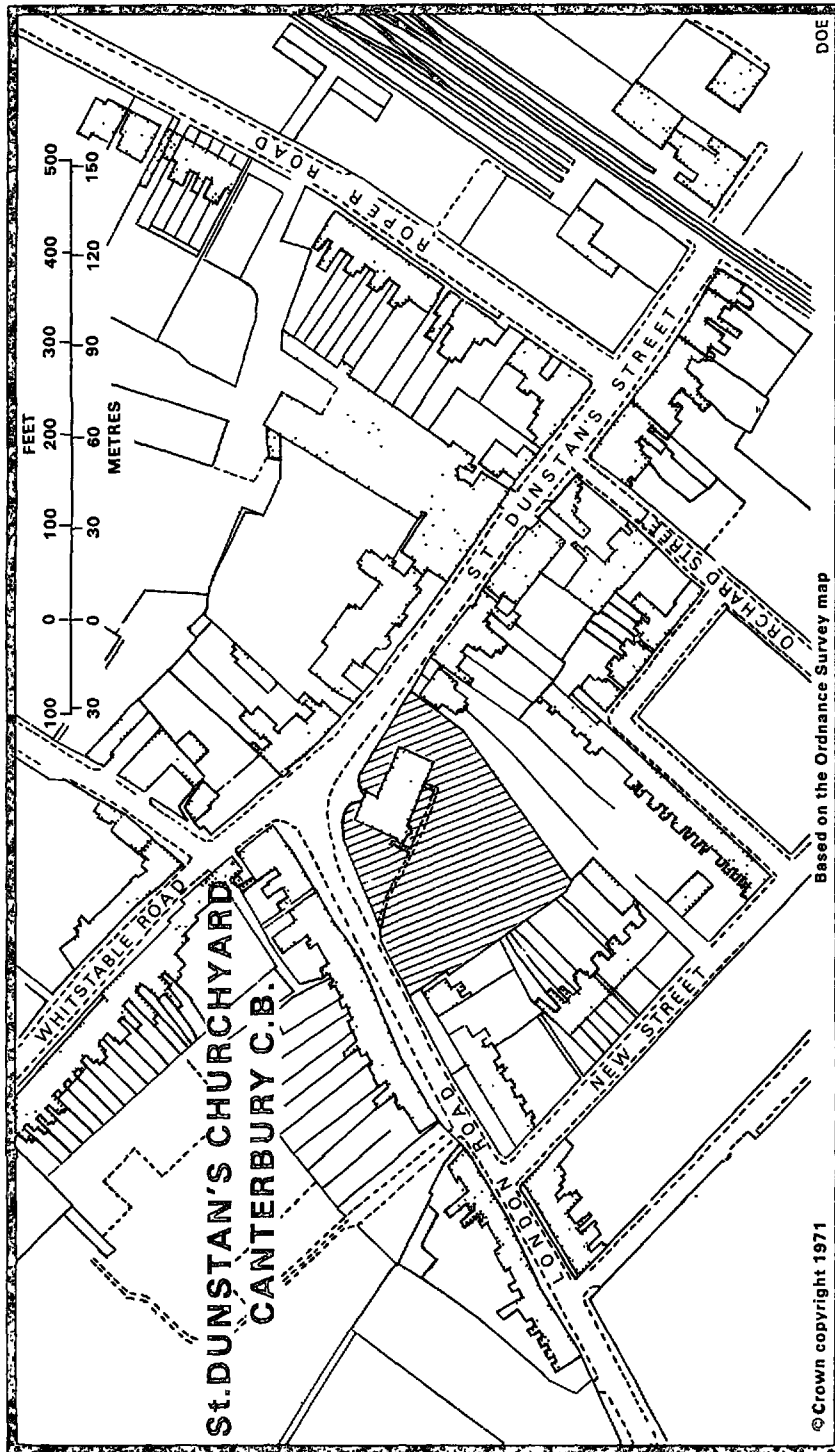
Now, therefore, Her Majesty, in exercise of the powers conferred on Her by section 1 of the Burial Act 1853 and of all other powers Her enabling, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, as follows:

1. Burials shall be discontinued forthwith and entirely in St. Dunstan's Churchyard, Canterbury, which is shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

2. This Order may be cited as the Burial Grounds (St. Dunstan's Churchyard, Canterbury) Order 1971.
