

ternon his Grace had an Account, that the Enemy had detached ten thousand Men towards Warmeron, in which Place we have a Garrison of seven hundred Men; whereupon a Body of Troops were immediately ordered from our Army to their Relief.

From the Camp before Tournay, July 8. N. S. The Enemy having possid themselves of the Post at Warmeron, and obliged our Troops in Garrison there to surrender themselves Prisoners of War, before Lieutenant-General Wilke could arrive with the Detachment sent to their Succour; they likewise endeavoured to possid themselves of Comines and Fort Rouge, in the former of which we had a Major and a hundred and fifty Men, and a Captain with fifty in the latter, which were twice attacked with great vigour; but they made so good a resistance, that our Troops came in time for their relief, and the Enemy were obliged to quit their Enterprize, and retire with precipitation. On Saturday six Battalions and ten Squadrons were sent from hence to Duillemon, to relieve the Detachment ordered out upon the first Notice of the Enemy's appearing before Warmeron, and to observe the Motions of the Enemy on that side; whereupon that Detachment has rejoined the Army. In the Evening we took a Lieutenant-Colonel of the Enemy near the Outworks of the Town, as he was endeavouring to get in. Last Night we broke Ground at the three several Attacks; that against the Cittadel is commanded by Count Lottum, that against the Town on this side the Schelde by General Schullenbourg, and the third on the Hainault side of the River by General Fagel: At the two former the Trenches were carried on within three hundred, and at the latter within a hundred and fifty Paces of the Counterscarp, with no greater Loss than about thirty Men killed and wounded.

Hague, July 9. N. S. The States of Holland separated on the 29th of the last Month, but design to come together again within few Days, in order to proceed in the Act of Naturalization of all Protestant Strangers. The Squadron designed for the North, to convoy the Merchant-ships to the Baltick, is still detained in the Texel by contrary Winds. Three Men of War are also appointed to sail with fifty Merchant-ships to Archangel. They write from Flanders, that the Marechal de Villars has detached the Chevalier de Luxemburg at the Head of ten thousand Men, which are to join a Body of Troops marching from Germany, and the whole to be commanded by the Elector of Bavaria. It is said, these Troops are to attempt making an Incursion into Brabant. We have undoubted Intelligence that there is an Inturrection in the Cevennes and Vivarez, which grows every Day more, considerable. Advices from France say, the King has recalled his Troops out of Spain.

Whitehall, June 30. This Day Her Majesty dined at Kensington, after which the Court removed to Windsor.
