Windsor, October 11.

THE following Address was presented to Her Ma-
jesty by the Right Honourable the Earl of Essex,
Lord Lieutenant of the County of Hertford.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Right Honourable Algernon
Earl of Essex, Lord Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum
of the County of Hertford, and the Deputy-Lieuten-
ants and Justices of the Peace of the said County.

WE your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects,
being truly sensible of the wonderful Successes of your
Majesty's most Illustrious Reign and thankful to God for
them, cannot omit Congratulating your Majesty upon the late
signal Victory.

In the Campaign of this Year, the strong Town and Ci-
ty of Tournay have been reduced in the sight of a nu-
merous and vigilant Enemy, who were Witnesses of the Glo-
ry of that Action, and too cautious to dare any thing to-
wards the Relief of that important Fortress.

The Enemy thought it more secure to endeavour to prevent
the Siege of Mons, than to attempt the Relief of Tournay.

However your Majesty's General, the Prince and Duke of
Marborough, (conspicuous in Prudence and all Military
Virtues) having formed a Design to Besiege that Place,
and to show the Enemy, and the World that no Woods or In-
trenchments, in a word, no Difficulties whatsoever were suf-
ficient to prevent his Purpose, Attack'd, and, as it were, Be-
sieg'd their Army, drove them from their Intrenchments,
and opened himself a way to another Siege; which must
convince even those who unwillingly believe every Success,
that your Majesty's Arms and those of your Allies obtained
a complete Victory.

It is to your Majesty's Sacred Influence we owe these won-
derful Events.

Go on, Great Queen, to Subdue your Enemy, and the
common Enemy of all the Nations round him; and if it is
possible your Majesty can have Enemies at home, may they
have no other Consolation, but what they can find in the
vain Attempt of endeavouring to lessen an Action as great
in every part of it, as ever was, and perhaps can be per-
formed in any Age of the World.

The humble Address of the Lord-Lieutenant, Deputy-
Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and Officers of the
Militia in the County of Chester, was presented to Her
Majesty by the Honourable Lieutenant-General Cholmonde-
ley, in the Absence of the Right Honourable the Earl of
Cholmondeley, Lord-Lieutenant of Cheshire.

Which Addresses her Majesty received very graciously.

Florence, October 1. N. S. On the 29th of the last
Month two Prizes were brought into Leghorn, one from
Tripoli laden with Silks, and the other with Corn from
the Archipelago, both bound to Marseilles. Letters from
Rome of the 28th of September say, that before Mon-
sieur Albani set out for the Imperial Court, it was resol-
ved in a Consistory that he should proceed from Vienna
to the Court of King Augustus in Poland, to take care of
the Ecclesiastical Authority in that Kingdom. It was also
agreed at the same time to provide Winter Quarters for
twelve thousand Imperialists in the Territories of the

Church, four thousand being allotted to Quarter in the
Bolognese and Ferrarese, four thousand in Romagna, and
four thousand in the Neighbourhood of Ancona; but it
is reported that his Holiness hath offered the Emperor
eighty thousand Pistoles instead of providing those Winter
Quarters. These Advices add, that Circular Letters had been
dispatched from Rome to all the Archbishops and Bishops
of Spain; enjoining them not to obey the Orders of the
Council of that Kingdom, which forbids any Money to be
sent from thence to the Court of Rome. His Holiness has
also declared the Choice of the Bishop of Lerida, to act in
Matters relating to the Revenues of the Bishoprick of
Avila, to be invalid, though that Prelate was Elected
by the Chapter, at the Instance of the Duke of Anjou.
The Pope has not lately appeared in Publick Business,
which some attribute to the Absence of his Nephew, and
others to his present Indisposition.

Venice, October 5. N. S. The Procurator Guistiniani
died lately in this City, aged seventy five Years, and was
buried in the Church of the Franciscans, with a Solemn-
ity suitable to his Quality and Merit. Messieurs Morosini
and Delphino, Ambassadors Extraordinary from this Re-
publick to the Court of Vienna, are expected here every
Day; we hear that their Excellencies are already arrived
at Padua. Monsieur de Vendosme, Grand Prior of France,
is arrived here from Geneva; it is believed, that after some
Stay in this Place, he will proceed to Malta, in order to
take upon him the Command of the Gallies of that
Nation. We are advised, that Monsieur Albani is come
to Padua, from whence he is speedily expected here, in
his way to Vienna. They write from Naples, that a
Convey of thirty Tarranes, bound for that Place, and
laden with Corn and Oil from Apulia, were arrived at
Sarento. Since the Discovery and Execution of several
Persons at Messina, who were supposed to have carried
on a Correspondence for the Service of his Catholick Ma-
jesty, an Order hath been published throughout the
Kingdom of Naples for Confiscating the Goods of all such
as have appeared to favour the Pretensions of the Duke
of Anjou.

From the Camp at Havre, October 17. N. S. The
Weather continuing favourable for the Siege, we are mak-
ing the best Advantage of it, in pushing on our Attacks
with all possible Vigour. Yesterday Morning at break of
Day we made an Attack on the second Counterscarp of
the Hornwork, at the Gate of Havre, with four hundred
Granadiers, sustained by five hundred Fusiliers and seven
hundred Workmen; the Enemy quitted the Covered-way
after a very short Resistance, and our Men lodged them-
selves there; they have since perfected their Communica-
tions, and are now removing the Batteries to the Palis-
ades, in order to batter the Hornwork in Breach. At the
Attack of Bertanont our Batteries have fired since Mon-
day with so good Success, that the Breaches in the Face
of the Hornwork and Ravelin were yesterday very
practicable. We ruin'd likewise, at the same time, a
Dam, by which Means the Ditch was so far drained,
that it was resolv'd to attack these Works to Day; ac-
cordingly three Galleries were last Night perfected for
that purpose; and the necessary Dispositions being made
about seven this Evening, the Attack begun with a great
Discharge of Bombs and Granadoes, which ply'd the En-
emy so warmly, that when our Men mount'd the Breach-
es, they found, to their surprize, that the Enemy had
entirely quitted both the Ravelins and Hornwork, which
gave us an Opportunity to lodge our selves with inconsid-
erable Loss, the Enemy making but little Fire from their o-
ther

other Works, and most of it too high to do us Hurt, while we were making this Attack, one of our Bombs, at the Attack of the Gate of Havre, fell into one of their Magazines. We likewise made our selves Masters, at that Attack, of a little Outwork on the Right of the Horn-work, commanded by a Lieutenant and fifteen Men, without any Loss. The Enemy having finished their Lines between Valenciennes and Quesnoy, are now demolishing the Defences at St. Amand, Morragne and Hatron, to prevent our lodging Troops there in the Winter. The Prince of Savoy is returned this Evening to the Camp from Brussels.

Hague, October 18. N. S. The Army of the Enemy continues encamped between Quesnoy and Valenciennes. The Body under the Command of the Chevalier de Luxemburg remains near Charleroy; that General has summoned great numbers of Peasants to work on the Fortifications of the Town. The States of Holland are at present assembled, and it is believed they will not break up their Session before they have fully settled the Dispositions for carrying on the War the ensuing Year. They have already proceeded very far in that Work. This day several Military Employments were disposed of. The Prince-Royal of Prussia has been in this Place for some Days, and it is said his Highness will begin his Journey towards the Court of Prussia to Morrow Morning. There are Apprehensions of a sudden Rupture between the Kingdoms of Denmark and Sweden, and a Manifesto is now in the Press, wherein the Court of Denmark explains it self on that Subject. Sir Philip Meadows designs to set out for the Brill to Morrow, in order to embark for Great Britain. Monsieur de Rosenkranz, who has Orders to go into Great Britain, has received Directions to stay here for some time, by reason of the present Indisposition of Monsieur van Stouchen, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Denmark to the States. The Count de St. Severino, Envoy of the Duke of Parma, arrived here last Week; and Monsieur Foscarini, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Republick of Venice, is expected every hour.

Plymouth, October 9. Yesterday came in from the Eastward the Lord Dursley in the Winchester, with the Royal Oak and St. Albans; they brought in a French Privateer of four Guns and thirty Men. Came in a Spaniard with Iron from Bilbao, bound for this Place. This Day arrived from Spithead her Majesty's Ship the Breda, with three Vessels with Groceries from London, two Victuallers and about ten Corn Vessels, all for this Place, and four Ships bound to Guiney.

Yarmouth, October 10. On the 8th sailed out of our Road her Majesty's Ships the Falkstone and Advice's-Prize, with a Fleet of Merchant-ships under their Convoy bound for Holland. Yesterday passed through our Road divers laden Colliers from Newcastle to the Southward, and this Morning several others passed by.
