Whereas the Secretary of State for the Environment, after giving to the Incumbent and Churchwardens of the Parish of St. James, in the London Borough of Enfield, ten days' previous notice of his intention in that behalf, has, under the provisions of the Burial Act 1853, as amended by subsequent enactments, made a Representation to Her Majesty in Council that, for the protection of the Public Health, burials should be discontinued forthwith and entirely in St. James' Churchyard, in the said Parish, shown hatched on the plan annexed hereto.

Provided that-


(a) In any earthen grave now existing in the said Churchyard, the burial may be allowed of the body of any person for whom or of any member of a family for which such grave space has been reserved and appropriated by Faculty granted before the 1st day of October 1973, with the exclusive right of burial therein, subject to the condition that no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than three feet below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave.



(b) In any earthen grave as aforesaid in which the depth now available for a burial is insufficient to enable compliance with the foregoing condition no part of the coffin containing the body shall be at a depth less than two feet three inches below the level of the surface of the ground adjoining the grave and the coffin shall be sealed by concrete to a thickness of not less than three inches.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give Notice of such Representation and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Privy Council on the 17th day of December next. The Secretary of State for Wales gives notice that he proposes to make the following Orders:

- (1) an Order under section 7 of the Highways Act 1959 providing:
 - (a) that a road (hereinafter called "the new road") which he proposes to construct at Maenan Abbey, near Llanrwst in the County of Caernarvon shall become a trunk road as from the date when the Order comes into operation, and
 - (b) that a length of the Maentwrog—East of Conwy Trunk Road to be superseded by the construction of the new road (hereinafter called

"the superseded road") shall cease to be a trunk road as from the date on which notice is given by him to the County Council of Caernarvon (who will become the highway authority responsible for that length) that the new road is open for through traffic, and

- (2) an Order under section 9 of the Highways Act 1959 authorising him—
 - (a) to stop up a length of the Trunk Road and
 - (b) to construct a new highway to connect the new road with the superseded road
- both at Maenan Abbey aforesaid, and providing for the transfer of the said new highway to the County Council of Caernarvon as from the date on which he notifies the Council that the new highway has been completed and is open for through traffic.
