THE following Address of the Provost, Bailies, and Town-Council of the City of *Glasgow*, in the Name of themselves and the Community thereof, was presented to Her Majesty by *Robert Rogers*, Esq; their Representative in Parliament; being introduced by the Right Honourable the Earl of *Sunderland*, Principal Secretary of State.

To the QUEEN'S most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Provost, Bailies, and Town-Council of the City of *Glasgow*, in Name of themselves and the Community thereof.

May it please your Majesty,
WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, beg Leave most humbly to Congratulate your Majesty upon the great and successful Efforts of the Campaign; in all which, as the extraordinary Abilities and incessant Application of your Generals, and the unbounded Resolution of your Troops, have been most conspicuous: So, by the Reduction of Mons, it is to a Demonstration made evident, how groundless the Pretences of the French have been to any Advantage in the Battel of Blaregnies, and how malicious the Insinuations were, which have been made to lessen the Glory of one of the greatest Achievements of your Majesty's Arms; an Action, which, to the Observers of its Circumstances, must needs appear a Prodigy.

Thus the Vigour, which your Majesty gives to the Condescency abroad, nobly exerts its self to advance the Liberty and Peace of Europe; while at the same time, your Majesty's prudent Administration at Home, piously promotes the Good, and establishes the Ease and Happiness of your Subjects.
To which great Ends may your Majesty long be preserved to reign over us, and in the End obtain an everlasting Crown, as a Reward to your Royal Virtues, is and shall be the earnest Prayer of, may it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most humble, most faithful, and most obedient Subjects and Servants.

Milan, December 7. N. S. Our Regency are daily employed in finding out Funds for raising the Sum demanded of this State by his Catholick Majesty; but they meet with so many Difficulties in this Affair, that it is believed Count *Thaun* will be sent to *Vienna*, and some other Person of Distinction to *Barcelona*, in order to desire some Mitigation of that Demand. The Inhabitants of the *Parmentan* and the *Flaisantin*, having represented to the Imperial Commissaries that they have not Provisions sufficient for the Maintenance of the Troops which have been sent to Quarter in their Provinces, the Commissaries have proposed, that, instead of those Provisions, the Inhabitants shall pay one Pistole a Month for every Soldier. Letters from *Ferrara* of the second Instant say, that five hundred Imperialists, who were sent to reinforce the Garrison of *Comachio*, had marched through their Territories. Advices from *Leghorne* of the 29th of the last Month import, that Vice-Admiral *Whitaker* had taken a French Vessel on the Coast of *Provence*, and brought it into that

Port. When that Admiral hath Embarked the Company which the English Consul at *Leghorne* hath bought up for the Subsistence of the British Forces in *Catalonia*, he will sail for *Final*, in order to take on Board the Recruits that are there in readiness to be Transported, and proceed on his Voyage from thence to *Barcelona*. Advices from *Naples* say, that they had an Account, by an Express from *Barcelona*, of the safe arrival of a great Convoy of Ammunition and Provision which Cardinal *Grimani* had sent thither; and that General *Vaubonne* was to succeed General *Caraffa* in the Command of *Calabria*.

Vienna, December 11. N. S. On the 9th Instant Prince *Eugene* arrived here, and the same Day was admitted to a Conference with the Emperor, wherein he acquainted his Imperial Majesty with the Disposition of his Troops in their Winter Quarters, and the vigorous Measures that were taken by the Allies for the Prosecution of the War, and particularly the Resolutions taken by the States-General for raising the necessary Funds for the Service of the ensuing Year. His Highness, since his Arrival, assisted at several Councils which have been held for regulating the State of the War. The Recruits for his Imperial Majesty's Troops are levied with great Success, and it is hoped the Regiments will be entirely compleated before the next Spring.

Berlin, December 14. N. S. It having been observed that the Plague doth not approach this City, Persons that pass in and out of the Town are not so strictly examined as formerly. But all our Advices from *Prussia* confirm the melancholy Accounts we received from thence of the great Destruction occasioned by that Distemper, which rages most violently at *Koningsberg*. The Prince-Royal in *Flanders*, and the Recruits for his Majesty's Troops in the Service of the Allies are levied with great Success. Monsieur *Marshall* is appointed his Majesty's Envoy-Extraordinary to King *Augustus*; and yesterday his Excellency set out for *Dresden*. We have no certain Account of the King of *Sweden*, nor hath his Minister residing in this Court lately received any Letters either from *Stockholm* or *Bender*. The last Letters from *Copenhagen* advise, that Monsieur *Steinbock*, and Monsieur *Meyerfeld*, had lately a Conference with his Danish Majesty, and had obtained a Truce between the Danes and the Swedes; and that, during that Truce, Orders were issued out for assembling the States of *Sweden*. Letters from *Mittau* say, that *Riga* was to be bombarded on the 28th of the last Month with eighty Mortars; that General *Czeremtoff* would attend his Czarish Majesty to *Moscow*; and that the Siege would be commanded by the Generals *Hollard* and *Baver*. The Troops quartered in *Courland* have Orders to pay the Inhabitants for every thing they receive for their Subsistence.

Copenhagen, December 17. N. S. Our Troops are so advantageously cantoned in their Winter Quarters, that it is not believed the Swedes will endeavour to disturb them; and if they should make any such Attempt, it would in all Probability be without Success. The Danish Quarters are extended seven Swedish Miles in length, and about four in breadth, and reach from *Engetholm* to a Village beyond *Landcroon*; they have the Sea behind them, and are covered in Front, as well as in their Right and Left, by Rivers. The Troops are very well furnished by the Inhabitants of *Schonen* with all things necessary for their Subsistence, except Bread, which is transmitted

to them once a Week from this Place. On the 14th Instant Baron Knyphausen, Envoy-Extraordinary from the King of Prussia, had his first private Audience of his Majesty, as also of the Royal Family. The Minister of his Electoral Highness of Hanover hath desired his Danish Majesty's Vote at the Diet, which will soon be held of the States of the Circle of Lower-Saxony, for making the Elector Colonel of that Circle; which Request his Majesty seems inclined to favour. The Dutch Envoy had Instructions to complain that the Hamburg Fleet from Archangel had been stopped by the Danish Admiral at Gluckstad: To which this Court returned answer, That they intended only thereby to take the Corn on Board that Fleet for their own Use at the ordinary Price; and that all those Ships, except one, had been since released. The British Envoy to his Danish Majesty hath obtained a Promise of Leave for several English and Swedish Ships laden with Naval Stores, which have been detained in this Port, to set Sail.

Brussels, December 28. N. S. Letters from the Frontiers advise, that the Duke of Bavaria is suddenly expected at Namur, and that the Misery among the Enemy's Troops encreases every day. Great Disorders are frequently committed in their Quarters, by reason of the Scarcity of Provisions. There are yet no Orders given out for Clearing and Recruiting the Forces which are quartered in the Neighbouring Garrisons. It is confirmed, that the Spanish and Wallon Troops will speedily march into Spain; but we hear that the Officers positively refuse to enter into that Service, before they are paid their Arrears, and until sufficient Security be given for their regular Payment for the future. They write from Valenciennes, that the Regiment of Bonnel, which lies in that Garrison, will not be in Motion towards Germany before the latter end of January next. Forage is extraordinary scarce in that City, and the publick Magazines are quite exhausted; so that the Commissaries for Provisions are obliged to buy of private Persons for the immediate Subsistence of the Troops.

Portsmouth, December 20. Sir John Norris is still detained at St. Hellens by contrary Winds, on Board her Majesty's Ship the Ranelagh, with the Elizabeth, Nottingham, Gosport, Berwick, Grafton, and Suffolk Hagboat.
